Keeping busy

Swanson named outstanding senior citizen

Adult literacy, alcohol awareness, bike touring and books are some of what's kept this volunteer busy.

Puebloan Robert Swanson, 81, is being honored as 2013 Senior Citizen of the Year for decades of volunteer and community ser-

vice. He will be recognized during the Saluting Pueblo Seniors luncheon at 11 a.m. May 3 at Pueblo Union Depot. The Pueblo Area Agency on Aging and Pueblo Advisory Council on Aging chose Swanson for the honor over six other finalists.

Swanson retired in 1991 as president of Affiliated First Colorado Bank of

Pueblo. He and his wife, Shirley, then wanted something to do, he said.

"The two main things we did were through VISTA — Volunteers in Service to America. We went to Texas for a year and worked in an adult literacy program, took a break and then went to California for

a year where we worked in an alcohol-reduction program. We were helping to get a campaign going to let people know not to overdo it.

"Boy," Swanson says, "it was a battle."

He has been active in many Pueblo community groups, including Kiwanis, ACOVA, March of Dimes, Cooperative Care Center (where he was co-director for seven years), University Park Neighborhood Association (where he served on the board, and was secretary last year), Pueblo Chamber of Commerce and Books Again.

Swanson and his wife both still volunteer at Books Again — he sorts books in the back and she shelves them up front.

The couple met at South Dakota State University in Brookings and have been married for 56 years and have lived in Pueblo since the early 1960s. They have two children, Bret and Jill.

Swanson was an avid table-tennis player and bicycle rider, arranging biking trips with his wife and friends in Colorado, Missouri, California, Vermont — and in Austria, on the Blue Danube river trail.
