Library begins e-book service

Electronic books can be rented, reserved over Internet.

Too cold to trek down to the local library branch?

No problem, just log in and download a book.

The Pueblo City-County Library District this week launched its online e-book service allowing patrons to borrow electronic books and audio books via the Internet.

Last fall, the district started checking out 44 laptop computers and 20 Barnes & Noble Nooks pre-loaded with selected titles. The latest move comes through Overdrive, a firm that serves a

number of libraries and provides as many as 7,000 titles, according to Midori Clark, director of community relations for the library district.

To use the service, it's necessary to install Overdrive's console on a device. The publications come from different sources: Amazon, Adobe Acrobat and EPub libraries, including Amazon's Kindle library as well as public domain volumes.

They can be downloaded to computers, tablet computers like the iPad, which provides a free application through its App Store, or electronic readers. Clark said there was some concern that the Kindle books would not load on tablets but it turned out they will if the Kindle application has been installed.

Users also have to have a library card number and use their personal identification number,

which is their birthdate.

Even though the books are virtual, the library does pay for each copy that's used. So the item may often show up as being checked out. Clark said that people should place it on hold and that will have some impact on how many copies the district eventually purchases.

She also encouraged people to use the "wish list" buttons, too, and that there soon will be a separate request box for people to type in titles. "If you're watching Oprah and you see a book that you want to read, we want you to ask for it," she said.

She added that people also can make requests at the library's own website. norton@chieftain.com

Council rejects North Side plan

Proposal called too vague, ill-prepared.

In an unexpected but sharp decision, City Council unanimously voted down Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority's plan for a North Side project area Monday night.

Council faulted the development authority on several fronts, charging the North Side plan was too vague and offered too little to the poorest neighborhoods it included in the

project — Peppersauce Bottoms near the Arkansas River and Goat Hill near Interstate 25.

But there also was the underlying tension that the authority hadn't been able to reach an agreeable compromise with Pueblo City Schools district (D60) and the Pueblo City-County Library District on sharing property tax revenues in the planned North Side project area.

No one from the authority was at the council meeting to hear the verdict. The decision means the authority cannot bring back a
