Six-year-old Zachary Parks had come down to Pueblo from Littleton this week for a family Thanksgiving celebration, but he got an added bonus Wednesday morning when he got to meet Skippyjon Jones at the Barkman Library.

Walking up to the hero of a dozen books, with a stuffed version of Skippyjon Jones in his hand, he said: "Tm your No. 1 fan!"

Allison Parks, his aunt, explained: "His uncle got him addicted to Skippyjon Jones. As soon as we heard about this, we grabbed his Skippyjon Jones doll and came down here."

"He's awesome and he wears a mask," said Zachary. "He has a cape and it's green — my favorite color."

Skippyjon Jones is a character in a series of b o o k s b y J u d y Schachner. He is a Siamese kitten with an identity problem: His unusually large ears have led him to think he's a Chihuahua.
