FindIT Colorado

PCCLD was excited to help launch FindIT Colorado, a new mobile app designed to provide a better user experience for online library resources. The app was released locally here on April 1. FindIT Colorado allows customers using mobile technologies like smart phones to connect more readily online to PCCLD and with screen displays more conducive to the more compact displays. In addition to discovering library digital resources, customers are also able to do a variety of things with this app including searching the online catalog; placing items on hold; viewing individual user accounts; checking the library calendar of programs and events; finding individual library locations, hours, and contact information; connecting with PCCLD on social media, and accessing online resources including Hoopla, OverDrive, Mango, EBSCO, Freegal, and ContentDM. FindIT Colorado allows customers to use PCCLD more easily via mobile devices. Android users can download the app through the Google Play Store, and Apple-device users can download it from iTunes.

Thinking Money

The American Library Association (ALA) Public Programs Office and the FINRA Foundation announced recently that PCCLD's Rawlings Library has been selected as a site in the upcoming traveling exhibition Thinking Money. The tour begins in August 2016 and continues through 2018. An itinerary with tour dates and locations are forthcoming. The grant supporting the exhibit includes an all-day orientation workshop for the exhibit on June 24, 2016 in Orlando, Florida. A staff member from the Special Collections and Museum Services team will represent PCCLD at the workshop. PCCLD also was awarded a stipend of \$1,000 to support public programs related to the exhibit. Maria Tucker (Special Collections & Museum Services Manager) oversaw PCCLD's application for this grant award.

Copper Panels at the Rawlings Library

A few copper panels on the Rawlings Library were loosened in a windstorm in early April. Alan Rocco (Facilities Superintendent) and other PCCLD staff worked expeditiously to ensure proper repairs were completed in a timely manner. In the interim, the Facilities team roped-off the area near where the panels were loose. This included library grounds near the South Union Avenue (north) side of the Rawlings Library.

RAWLINGS LIBRARY

Special Collections & Museum Services

- March total attendance was 4,217 with year-to-date attendance at 11,756 compared with 12,808 one year ago.
- 395 Document Delivery requests were answered in March compared with 284 one year ago.
 1,665 items from the collection were counted used by customers in March compared with 1,171 one year ago.
- Volunteers in the department are working on a number of projects including the Bill Buckles, Princess Yolanda and John Korber collections, and completing support work for the book <u>Along</u> <u>The Huerfano River</u>.
- The Colorado Chieftain and The Colorado Daily Chieftain are available online via the Colorado Historic Newspaper Collection through 1874. PCCLD worked with Steelworks Museum to digitize 1869-1873 (809 pages). PCCLD also is working digitize from microfilm 1894-1899 (2,072 pages) in collaboration with The Colorado Historic Newspaper Collection.

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- The InfoZone hosted 31 film screenings with 352 attending.
- The InfoZone *Exploring Human Origins* exhibit was installed, opened to the public, and programming commenced:
 - Jill Scott presentation on Homo Naled with 76 attending.
 - o Irish Culture Festival with 68 attending.

 - A Genealogy Class was offered on March 8 with a focus on New Mexico genealogy with four attending.
- Maria Tucker (Special Collections & Museum Services Manager) is working with the firm Exhibit Design on plans for updates to InfoZone permanent exhibits. Conceptual design is complete and content is being delivered to the designers.

Reference and Readers Advisory

- On March 24, Samantha Hager and Amy Zimmer from the State Library led a seminar on government document resources. The Rawlings government documents collection also was weeded with outdated items removed.
- Local painter Mo Keenan-Mason and photographer Linda Cates were featured artists for March with the "Women Who Love Life" exhibit on display during Women's History Month.

- On March 5, Colorado poet and professor, Rita B. Kiefer, presented a reading of her work.
- Advanced English Language Learner classes started at the end of February with good attendance. The library will be starting an afternoon beginning class and an intermediate morning class on April 4.
- Citizenship classes will be restarting in April. Maria Smyer (Hispanic Resource Coordinator)
 has been developing a citizenship section in the department with citizenship books, class
 schedules, and information about applying for citizenship.
- Homebound Services added one new volunteer. Homebound had 35 items delivered to 38 customers by fourteen volunteers.
- March Madness NBA2K16 Tournament held on March 5 had 47 participants.
- Lonnie McCabe presented a Chautauqua-style program entitled *The Life and Legacy of Madam CJ Walker*.
- HopeLine Phone Drive resulted in 47 items collected in the month-long drive. The phones will be recycled and refurbished for victims of abuse as a lifeline to safety.
- As part of the Human Origins exhibit, David Hartkop (Technology Trainer) and Derrick Mason (Idea Factory Librarian) turned the Idea Dome into a prehistoric cave with the Maker Club, including 3D-printed "artifacts" such as stone tools and homo species remains.

Youth Services

 Supporting Parents in Early Literacy through Libraries (SPELL) efforts reached 420 in March including programs at Kinderkirk, St. Therese, CSU-

Pueblo, Thatcher, Children's Palace, Trinity Lutheran, Ascension Preschool, and Beulah Heights.

- The library offered two centralized family programs in March—a party for Dr. Seuss's Birthday and a visit from Pete the Cat. Dr. Seuss events reached 293 participants, and Pete the Cat reached 386.
- MinecraftEDU had total attendance of 90 in March.
- Tweens made color-changing worms and more at Mad Science with 72 participants.
- Teens relaxed with aromatherapy and coloring with 45 participants.
- Rawlings offered a Preschool Dance Party for 16.
- More than 57 participated in Afterschool Hangouts.
- Generation Creation had a great month with four Pete the Cat plays his guitar at Barkman awesome and well-attended programs: Storytelling Project, Tinkering Project, Knitting Project, and Art with 68 participants. Read Dog, Read! had 13 participants. The Tween Imagination Chapter had 20 participants.

LAMB LIBRARY

- Lamb had 12,734 visitors to the library in March. There were 62 events and reservations in March.
- Lamb had total attendance of 635 with 517 youth, 35 teens, and 83 adults.
- The Lamb Library continued to have strong attendance at two weekly storytimes. Storytime accounted for 235 attendees in March. Lamb also had good success with a craft event "Make

- it Fly" this month with 29 participants. This month Lamb also had good attendance at a Dr. Seuss Party and Pete the Cate Storytime event.
- For the month of March, Lamb Teen event attendance increased over the previous month. In March, Lamb put on a craft/movie event geared around Women's History month called T-shirt and a Movie. During this event, participants watched the move, A League of Their Own and decorated white t-shirts they could keep. This event had 23 participants. Lamb also hosted its first Open Mic Night on Saturday, March 12 which was attended by ten people with a band, and one teen went home to get his guitar and amp and returned to participate. Lamb hopes to offer additional Open Mic times later in the year.
- In the adult events, the Lamb Library continued to show improvement in attendance. The Anime Club continues to draw around 5-10 participants each session. The Self-Help Legal Clinic also draws about 7-8 participants each month and continues to have every available slot filled each month with many walk-in participants that cannot be accommodated. In March, Lamb also saw great success with its first Craft Club event created by Rachael Parlier (Library Specialist) attracting 25 participants who made dream catchers they could keep and use.
