On Your Mark, Get Set . . . READ!

PCCLD staff have been planning this year's Summer Reading Program, which kicks off in June. Program planning and marketing for this signature annual PCCLD project features the themes of sports and exercise, *Get in the Game READ, Exercise Your Mind READ,* and *On Your Mark, Get Set . . . READ.* Programming activities will take place at all library locations, some local parks as well as other venues in the community. The InfoZone Museum is featuring an exhibit entitled *Eat Well, Play Well* produced by the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry and the National Institutes for Health. This effort is the work of staff from throughout the library district, including special work by Maria Kramer (Rawlings Youth Services Manager), Ellie O'Keefe (Teen Services Librarian), and Sara Schwartz (Programs and Events Manager). The Friends of the Library are a major sponsor of this project. Other sponsors include Black Hills Energy, Menchie's Frozen Yogurt, The Party People, the City of Pueblo, Sangre de Cristo Arts & Conference Center/Buell Children's Museum, Loaf 'N Jug, Pueblo Ice Arena, Applebee's, Fox 21, Historic Arkansas Riverwalk of Pueblo, Kiwanis, CW SoCo, the Pueblo Zoo, HUB International, Parkview Medical Center, and the Pueblo YMCA.

Read Out Loud 2016 Featuring Tony Abbott

Tony Abbott, author of over 100 books for young readers, visited Pueblo for the 7th annual Read Out Loud! Twenty-two schools in both local school districts participated by reading Abbott's *The Hidden Stairs and The Magic Carpet*. This book is Book 1 in the popular Abbott *Secrets of Droons* series. 3,629 people participated in programming over the course of the project, which culminated in Abbott's two-day visit on April 20-21. The 2016 effort was coordinated by Maria Kramer (Rawlings Youth Services Manager) with assistance from Special Collections/Museum Services, Collection Development, Youth Services and others. The Friends of the Library are a major sponsor of this project.

Record-setting Results: Creating a Culture of Accountability to Ensure Long-term Success

Jon Walker (Executive Director), Sara Rose (COO), and David Hayden (Data Analyst) will join with Partners In Leadership's Jeff McMullin to present at the MPLA/CAL conference on October 21. This year the Mountain Plains Library Association and the Colorado Association of Libraries are jointly sponsoring this conference to take place October 20-22, 2016, in Loveland near Denver, CO. The title of the PCCLD team's presentation is *Record-setting Results: Creating a Culture of Accountability to Ensure Long-term Success.* The presentation will feature an overview of the work done to create a work culture of accountability and goal setting, which has helped the library district overcome a modest one percent growth in service-area population to drive record-setting increases in use of library services over a five-year period. The presentation looks at factors from the perspectives of leadership, human resources, data-driven decision making, and library trends.

Association of Research Libraries Conference Grant

Maria Tucker (Special Collections and Museum Services Manager) was selected as part of a competitive process to receive a 2016 National Diversity in Libraries Conference (NDLC '16) travel award. She was awarded this honor by the Association of Research Libraries (ARL). ARL is a nonprofit organization of 125 libraries at comprehensive, research-intensive institutions that share similar missions, aspirations, and achievements. ARL member libraries constitute the largest and most comprehensive academic and research libraries. Maria was commended by ARL for her

outstanding application and impressive accomplishments thus far. As a recipient of this travel award, she receives a cash award of \$1,000 to cover NDLC '16 conference registration and travel costs. NDLC '16 will take place on the UCLA campus on August 10-13, 2016.

- Eat Well, Play Well is a traveling exhibit from the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry and will be on exhibit through the summer.
- Special Collections is organizing and developing two of the Summer Reading exhibits that will
 rotate through the branches, Historic sports figures and events and Ansel Adams photos. An "I
 am Joqauin" exhibit about the poem written about Corky Gonzales is on exhibit. Students from St.
 Therese have displayed their stories and mannequins about immigration to America.

- Artists Terry Cates and Steve Mason displayed paintings on the 2nd floor of the Rawlings Library in "Landscapes and Still Life."
- <u>Hispanic Resource Center:</u> Spanish Classes were held Saturdays with eight attending, ELL class attendance was 85, citizenship classes attendance in May was 120.
- <u>Adult Literacy:</u> Jackie Swanson (Adult Literacy Coordinator) continued reaching out to community organizations, including PCC, Catholic Charities, Pueblo County Department of Social Services, and Blue Sky in May. Volunteer assistance has increased to 22 with 25 learners waiting for tutor volunteers. Adult Literacy Tutors gave 650 hours to the library.
- Idea Factory & Technology Training: Idea Factory program attendance in May was 259. During May, David Hartkop (Technology Trainer) offered ten technology training classes with 53 people in attendance. David's work with RepRap Libro, Instructions and Balloon Launch on Thingiverse 3D Printing plans and instructions continue to be viewed in Thingiverse with 865 views and 87 downloads in May. David also offered two beginning computer classes to English Language Learners (ELL) with seven in attendance. VHS to DVD conversion use has increased. Derrick Mason (Idea Factory Librarian) reports a number of customers who are able to use the application successfully. Work with Central High School completed with students learning about stop motion video and editing effects via library support. The Steel City Makers Club, Startup Pueblo and CSU-Pueblo are active in the maker community. Groups are meeting regularly in the Idea Factory. Total Digital use with Idea Factory in May was 1,652.
- <u>Homebound Service:</u> Homebound had 57 circulations provided to 38 homebound customers. Seventeen volunteers spent 13 hours delivering materials to homebound customers.
