'A significant donation to the library district'

Metro district's land gift fits trustees' plan for Greenhorn Valley

One of Pueblo County's new library branches will be located at the corner of Colorado 165 and Cibola Drive in Colorado City.

The Pueblo City-County Library District Board of Trustees voted unanimously at its recent meeting to accept property donated by the Colo-

rado City Metropolitan District for the new Greenhorn Valley public library. The 4.1-acre site is adjacent to a 24-acre park.

The library district plans to build a 7,500-square-foot branch designed by Denver-based OZ Architecture with the groundbreaking planned for early to mid-2013. The branch should be open by 2014. The district will launch a fundraising cam-

paign this year. The projects will be leveraged with land donations like that made by the metro district and helped by \$100,000 in donations for each new building expected to come from the library district's new foundation.

OZ's design also will be used, with some exterior changes, for new branches on the St. Charles Mesa and Pueblo's East Side.

Locations have not been announced for those.

Jon Walker, executive director of the library district, called the land "a significant donation to the library district (that) will result in a wonderful public amenity dedicated to literacy and lifelong learning for the greater Greenhorn Valley for years to come."

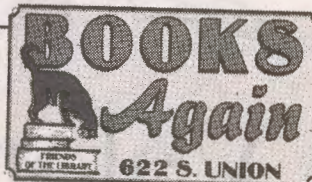

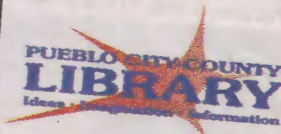

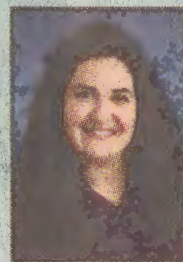
