Public Service and Collection Development

- 533 items were used in Special Collections. 203 document delivery requests were filled in May. 26 books from the circulating collection were checked out.
- Tabitha Davis is continuing to work on John Korber's business binders. She has completed the reorganization of the approximately 80 volumes of John Korber's business binders and has completed the index for the first ten volumes.
- Tabitha Davis is still working on updating the online obituary database. She has uploaded 5,861 files and has prepared 13,392 more to be uploaded. She is proofreading the 2011 obituary list and is currently manually entering the names from 1914 into the online database.
- New Mexico Collection bibliography has been created for distribution.
- Training new Material Handler.

### Digitization

- Blake Hatton is working on the CHRRAB Grant funded Colorado Rock Art Project. Blake has been digitizing, processing, and adding metadata to the collection. A total of 358 images were digitized for the rock art collection along with a further 498 being processed. Work has begun on adding metadata to the collections = 3.
- Blake Hatton is working with Tabitha Davis to begin digitization of VHS tapes in the library's collection using the
  equipment in the Memory Lab. 50 VHS tapes have been digitized, with a total length of 35.5 hours of footage
  digitized.
- On May 4, Blake Hatton created and hosted the "Obsolete Media Petting Zoo" for IDEA Con, which allowed patrons to see and interact with obsolete media formats. Approximately 50 people over the course of the day visited the exhibit.

Seniors Make! Creative Aging at the Library

- Amy Nelson applied for a grant from the Next Fifty Initiative and was awarded \$10,000 to fund a new creative
  aging project, Seniors Make! at PCCLD. This project will create maker and arts-based learning opportunities for
  residents of Pueblo County who are over the age of 50.
- Funds from this grant will be used to hire local artists and makers to facilitate weekly workshops, as well as to purchase materials and equipment for maker kits that can be circulated around the district and used for outreach programs in senior centers.
- Senior Planet Colorado & Age Without Borders
  - Amy Nelson hosted a focus group in partnership with Senior Planet Colorado on 5/21 with 15 people in attendance. This focus group was a great opportunity to gather feedback about what life is like in our community for adults 60+ and what resources and programs are most needed to support healthy and active aging in Pueblo County.
  - Age without Borders has provided RRA with free access to an online training program, Learn, Love &
    Leverage Aging, which will be used by staff to host monthly meetings with older adults, their families and
    caregivers, and service providers to discuss current topics in aging and hear presentations from world
