Pueblo libraries to now require masks inside

PUEBLO, Colo. (KKTV) - Effective Wednesday, you must don a mask if visiting one of Pueblo's libraries.

The Pueblo City-County Library District says this rule applies to everyone, regardless of COVID-19 vaccination status. Both the city and county of Pueblo have seen cases and hospitalizations jump in recent weeks, and vaccine rates lag behind the state average.

It is important for us to put into place for now a masking requirement for everyone entering local libraries given the current mounting increase of COVID-19 transmission locally. This aligns local libraries with the recent health order regarding schools and day cares, and it is consistent with the actions of other local public institutions to help address this problem," said Jon Walker, executive director of PCCLD.

The libraries will all have disposable masks on hand if you forget to bring one. Patrons unable to wear a mask can use the library district's curbside service, including internet hotspots, curbside printing, and online reference assistance. Pueblo County Library mandates masks as COVID-19 cases rise

PUEBLO Colo. (KKTV) - Effective today, the Pueblo County Library has mandated that masks be worn inside its walls. This is the third mask-mandate in Pueblo this week, following schools and city buildings.

The Director of Public Health for Pueblo County, Randy Everts says that his board is not considering a universal mask mandate in Pueblo right now. He did say that if cases continue to rise they may have to look at that option.

He is hopeful that mask mandates in places like schools and libraries will help curb the rising infections.

Right now most cases in the county are among unvaccinated people, particularly children and teens. There were 894 cases of Covid in Pueblo County in August. That is higher than case numbers in August 2020, and is comparable to levels in October last year.

Everts says that Pueblo residents shouldn't be afraid of the virus but they should be mindful of exposing themselves to it until cases start to decline.

He says that vaccination is the most powerful weapon against Covid. right now 58% of Pueblo County residents are vaccinated which trails the 75% of Coloradans who are vaccinated.

Masks required at Pueblo County libraries

PUEBLO, Colo. (KRDO) -- All Pueblo City-County Library District locations began requiring patrons and staff to wear masks at all times inside library buildings, regardless of vaccination status.

This went into effect Wednesday, September 1. Library officials say the measure will keep the environment safe from the spread of COVID-19 amid a concerning spike in Delta variant cases.

"It is important for us to put into place, for now, a masking requirement for everyone entering local libraries given the current mounting increase of COVID-19 transmission locally. This aligns local libraries with the recent health order regarding schools and daycares, and it is consistent with the actions of other local public institutions to help address this problem," said Jon Walker, executive director of PCCLD.

For those who are unable to wear a mask, the PCCLD is providing curbside pickup materials, including tablet and internet hotspots, curbside printing, and online reference assistance.

A variety of digital material is available for download through the [library's website](#).

All locations have disposable face masks, as well as hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes. At this time, there are no limits in place for browsing and computer use.
