Library honors Pueblo's Outstanding Women

Thirty women will be recognized at annual luncheon

Thirty women, each of whom has made a contribution to the quality of life in Pueblo, will be honored today when the Pueblo City-County Library District holds its 2019 Outstanding Women's Banquet.

The event will take place at noon on the second floor of the Rawlings Library, 100 E. Abriendo Ave.

For more than three decades the library district has recognized the efforts of women

in the community. Including this year's honored list, the library district has honored 694 women over the years. Photos and brief bios of this year's honorees are listed on Page A11.

"It was part of our Women's History Month celebration," said Midori Clark, the library district's director of community relations.

The event and its format have changed through the years. In 1986, a women's history committee selected the honorees. That first year, 24 women were honored, Clark said, although there was no banquet. Another group of women were honored in 1987.

For reasons lost to history,

the event did not take place in 1988 and 1989, but when it resumed, the event was bigger and better than ever, taking on the format that remains in place today.

"The Outstanding Women event re-emerged in 1990," Clark said. "That when the selection was opened up to the community. Any individual or organization could nominate a woman, unlike the past where all the women were recognized through the women's history committee."

* The luncheon developed and has grown because people want to celebrate the contributions of women to the community.

"The luncheon allowed

the women to be recognized in front of a large group of people," Clark said. "That's what's special about the event. Non-profits or individuals who wanted to recognize someone special, often didn't have the forum to do it. The Outstanding Women's event gives them that forum."

Besides, Clark said, "It's nice that we can collectively recognize all of the women. It's an inspiring afternoon."

Clark said women, living and dead, can be nominated.

"They had to live in Pueblo at some point in time," Clark said.

The best part, Clark said, is seeing the women when they are presented with their award.

Cultural bragging rights for Pueblo

If you have friends who live in other parts of Colorado, at some point you may have heard some not-so-kind comments from them about Pueblo being a cultural backwater. The next time that topic comes up, you might want to point out that El Pueblo History Museum is a finalist for a national medal from the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

This is an extremely high honor. For a quarter century, the institute has awarded the medals to museums and libraries that provide extraordinary service to their communities. The medals are a sort of gold standard for those types of institutions.

And should El Pueblo win, it would be the second straight year Pueblo is represented at the medal ceremony, which is scheduled for June 12 at the United States Botanic Garden in Washington, D.C. Last year, the Pueblo City-County Library District was one of 10 recipients selected for a national medal.

Elizabeth Holtan, the institute's communications manager, said it's not unprecedented for a community to have institutions selected as finalists in consecutive years. However, it is extremely rare.

And when it happens, the winning institutions typically are located in much larger cities like Chicago or Orlando.

El Pueblo, located at 301 N. Union Ave., certainly has a strong case to be considered for a medal. It hosts a variety of exhibits showcasing the region's history and cultural heritage, including a 1840s-vintage replica of an adobe trading post and plaza, as well as the archeological excavation site of the original 1842 El Pueblo trading post.

The museum also was the temporary home last year for part of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, the document that ended the Mexican-American War and extended the United States southern border from the Arkansas River south to the Rio Grande.

That was the first time any part of the treaty had been displayed in Colorado. Prior to that, it had been several years since any portions of the treaty were exhibited outside of its permanent home in the National Archives Vault in Washington.

The medalists will be selected through a thorough vetting process involving experts in museum and library services.

However, local residents can support El Pueblo's bid by sharing their stories about the museum on social media. They can do so by visiting facebook.com/USIMLS or twitter.com/us-imls with the hashtag #IMLSmedals.

Last year, local residents showed strong support for the library district by voting in an online competition that ended with the district winning the top national honor. El Pueblo is no less deserving of our support.

Let's hope El Pueblo receives a national medal. But even if it doesn't, our community's cultural institutions have been making a stronger showing on the national stage lately than some of their more highfalutin neighbors.

And there's not a thing wrong with letting those neighbors know that.
