Black History Month brings American Civil War stories to the library

PUEBLO, Colo. – The Pueblo City-county Library District and InfoZone Museum are hosting a series of events related to black history month and the American Civil War. Events include two Chautauqua performances featuring a black Civil War solider and Abraham Lincoln, historical Civil War stories and black history-themed movie series. All events will be at the Rawlings Public Library, 100 E. Abriendo Ave.

Angus Augustus Burleigh (Civil War solider) will be portrayed by Hassan Davis on Feb. 6 at 6:30 and Abraham Lincoln, portrayed by Dennis Boggs, will be Feb. 13 at 6:30. The Burleigh Chautauqua focuses on his extraordinary life as an ex-slave serving in the 108th United States Colored Artillery. The Lincoln Chautauqua details the life of an American president during the Civil War and the struggles that took place to insure that "all men are created equal."

History and Personal Stories of the Civil War will be led by Dawn DiPrince on Feb. 16 at 6:30 p.m. This program focuses on how individual perspectives can change history; participants will be given the opportunity to some of their own history through memoir-writing.

Life During the Civil War takes place on Feb. 25 at 4 p.m. and includes a dance performance by the Victorian Society of Colorado Springs and a presentation from historian and scholar, Michael Engle.

Less than a month after Lincoln was elected President in 1860, the nation plunged into four long years of Civil War. Lincoln knew that to survive as a nation and to protect the right that "all men are created equal," we needed to make terrible sacrifices. Thus, upon his shoulders not only rested the future of our nation, but as Lincoln saw it, the future of all mankind.

In this program, Dawn DiPrince will examine personal perspectives and how they have the ability to change history. This program will discuss the book *March* by Geraldine Brooks, a historic fiction novel that explores the Civil War.
