Dr. Richard Corwin's scrapbook could be 2014 most significant artifact

Pueblo, Colo. — Pueblo City-County Library District's Special Collections houses Dr. Richard Corwin's Scrapbook. The document was nominated recently as one of Colorado's 10 most significant artifacts, and now it has a chance to be number one. To achieve this, it will takes lots of votes from the public. This scrapbook contains historical information about places throughout Colorado between 1881 and 1929 including Greeley, Pueblo, Denver, Upper and Lower Arkansas River Valleys and San Luis Valley plus important information about Minnequa Hospital's growth. Dr. Corwin was a fascinating character who settled in Colorado with a deep interest in taxidermy sharing his collection with the public. As CF&I added coal and iron mines to its operation, Dr. Corwin's medical department became responsible for their care. In designing the hospital he used many innovative features for the time adding new knowledge for making hospitals fireproof and more efficient in their layout.

This scrapbook is significant because it shows the academic views of some medical doctors during the time Dr. Corwin lived (1852-1929). The scrapbook has items that have not been saved anywhere else from the time including images, clippings and ads. In 1881, General William J. Palmer, hired Dr. Corwin, 28, and two male nurses to work at Minnequa's six-bed hospital, which was a joint venture with the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad. By 1902, under the design and direction of Dr. Corwin, chief surgeon, the CF&I opened its new 200-bed Minnequa Hospital to replace the one that opened in 1881.
