The library district is moving forward in a big way, and we need your help. As trustee Jim Stuart recently pointed out, we are about to embark upon perhaps the largest single expansion in the history of our community with the addition of

three new full-service public libraries: Pueblo East Side Library, St. Charles Mesa Library and Greenhorn Valley Library.

The project to build, furnish and equip all three new libraries requires a \$6.1 million capital investment. The library district has more than 90 percent of the necessary funds in place for the new libraries. However, we need another \$535,000 to "top off" the fundraising and provide the money required to complete the project.

We need your help to raise this money. The public library represents among the greatest of

American traditions with its focus on lifelong learning and open access to information for all. It has been called the most democratic of institutions. In terms of "Return on Investment," a 2009 study concluded that public libraries return five dollars or more for every one dollar invested (http://www.lrs.org/documents /closer_look/roi.pdf).

Libraries are often viewed as an important measure of a community's cultural success. If this is true, Pueblo County is on the move. Our libraries in Pueblo County have never been more popular. More people are visiting our libraries than ever before. More books and other materials are being checked out from our libraries than ever before. More people are attending library programs and events than ever before. The need has never been greater than now.

Trustee talk by Phil Mancha, Ph.D.

I have been a member of the Pueblo City-County Library District since 2005. My second term is completed in December 2014. Like all board

members, I was interviewed and appointed by a joint committee consisting of two county commissioners and two members of the Pueblo City Council for a five-year term. Individuals wishing to renew their board membership follow the same path by which they were initially appointed.

My first big challenge upon joining the board was to help restore confidence in library administration following a series of controversies at the highest levels within the library. The Ryals Room at the Rawlings Library was packed every board meeting until mid 2005. However, by August of that year, confidence seemed to be returning, as the room was virtually empty and the presence of the media was heavily reduced. Trust was restored after many months of good work and difficult decisions.

Other highlights of my time on the board included a number of decisions to expand and build new libraries—first in Pueblo West and more recently in Colorado City, the East Side of Pueblo and St. Charles Mesa. I always feel the responsibility of voting for the yearly budget and annual plan for the library at the end of every calendar year. This year took on a special budgetary importance to me as we voted to support financially and in other ways, the three new libraries in our district.

PCCLD Board of Trustees feel very protective of the library. My protective

instincts broke to the surface when the Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority began to re-direct property-tax revenue from the library to the coffers of Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority. Negotiations between Urban Renewal on one side, and the library, School Districts 60 and 70 and the county government on the other side, have not been successful thus far, but we have not given up.

Upgrades of our technology, human resources policies and procedures and many other efforts to provide the very best library services to the citizens of our district have all been a part of my time on the board. I believe it is fair to say that in the last eight years we have moved from being a strictly book depository to a modern cultural and information center for our community.

One very impressive feature of my time on the board, is that the board has also worked very well together as a team. And, the board has worked very well with the executive director, Jon Walker, and his staff. Of course there have been differences of opinion between us all, but the best interest of the library has never failed to resolve whatever differences appeared.

The board and the library have become highly respected by the Pueblo community and the larger library community throughout the state. One year before I joined the board, the County Commissioners and City Council dissolved the library board during a time of rancor and controversy. Today, there are many applicants for board membership whenever a vacancy occurs, and the library is viewed with pride by the citizenry. The future of PCCLD looks very bright.
