How it works

Everyone will then have 24 hours to shoot, edit and submit their film. Films must be submitted between 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 11 at the Sangre de Cristo Arts Center.

Filmmakers Registration Deadline


Early registration for all filmmakers ends on Wednesday, Nov. 7. The cost to register is \$10 for adults, \$20 after Nov. 7. There is no cost for teens to register for the Young Filmmakers Division. Registration forms may be submitted at any Pueblo City-County Library branch or at the Sangre de Cristo Arts Center. Additional forms are available at pueblolibrary.org/contests.

Films will be screened and judged at two screenings. The Young Filmmakers screening will take place on at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 15 at the InfoZone of the Rawlings Library, and is free and open to the public. The screening for the adult division will take place at 8 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 16 at the Sangre de Cristo Arts Center. Tickets are \$10. Awards will be given immediately following the screenings.

Library Enhancement Project

Our library has a long and rich tradition as an important institution in the community. This story dates to 1891 when the first public library was established here. Over the years, the library has evolved and changed. Today the Pueblo City-County Library District resembles that library from the 19th century, but the differences are significant.

In 1891, public libraries were mainly about storing and accessing books, but access came with a price. Items were checked out to individuals who were able to afford an annual five dollar fee to belong to the library. Today, checking out books from the library is free and open to the public. This is not the only thing that has changed about the library. From one location, now there are many, and the modern library has moved far beyond books — PCCLD offers a variety of information formats, including magazines, newspapers, DVDs, CDs, eReaders, laptops, tablets, special collections and archives, and more. Public access computers, online resources, complimentary multi-purpose meeting rooms as well as programs and events intended to connect the members of our community with opportunities for lifelong learning, the joy of reading, and the exchange of ideas are very popular and important parts of today's library.

The use of library resources continues to increase—in 2012 our library will check-out nearly two-million books and other materials through more than one million visits to the library this year. Nearly 500,000 will log-on to library computers, and some 150,000 will attend library-sponsored programs and events. As use has increased, the library has evolved and changed to keep up with demand.

In the coming months, the library will "re-tool" by implementing new book tracking and management equipment to more efficiently check-out, check-in and sort books and other

library materials. This new technology is known as Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) and Automated Materials Handling (AMH). RFID and AMH equipment installed in our libraries will allow us to reduce materials handling, ease collection inventory maintenance, reduce staff time to process materials, and improve customer self-service.

In the past year, we have worked with experts in this field to assess PCCLD's current library material procedures, and develop strategies for selecting and implementing an RFID and AMH solution. We prepared a Request for Proposal for announcement to RFID and AMH vendors and awarded contracts to the winning bidders earlier this year and are now are acquiring the necessary hardware and software, and are beginning implementation.

We will be redesigning aspects of our libraries to best integrate the new equipment and utilize retail marketing techniques to highlight library materials and circulation activities to attract customers and increase use of library materials. We are working with an architectural and design firm to improve some aspects of the layout of the Rawlings, Barkman, Pueblo West, and Lamb Libraries in order to promote use. We are preparing to incorporate these design recommendations to reduce clutter, build brand awareness, offer pleasing displays, and create a positive "greeting zone" for customers.

This library enhancement project is significant and the unveiling of this new service model will take place in early 2013. We believe it will better enable us to meet our mission of encouraging the joy of reading and providing free and open access to information for all. For more than 120 years the library has been advancing in its mission to the community. In the coming months, this tradition of growth and improvement will continue as the Pueblo City-County Library District takes an important step into the 21st century.





The Homebound Program

The Homebound Program is a free service designed to provide temporary or permanent library service to residents of Pueblo County who are confined to their home or care facility because of illness, injury, condition, or physical disability. The Homebound Office will endeavor to match customers with a volunteer who can deliver and retrieve materials to the customer's home once a month.

Who can apply for the Homebound Program? Any person in Pueblo County who is unable to travel, temporarily or permanently, to the library without assistance due to illness, injury, condition, or physical disability may apply.

How to Apply: Visit www.pueblolibrary.org/homebound to print an application or call/email the Homebound Office at (719) 553-0233 or homebound@pueblolibrary.org for the application to be mailed to your address. The completed application can be dropped off at the library or mailed to the following address:



After the application is reviewed you will be contacted by a library staff member.

Homebound Status: The temporary or permanent homebound customer can check out any materials that circulate through normal library practices, with the exception of High Demand videos, within the Pueblo City-County Library District with extended checkout time of twenty eight days. No fines will be assessed to homebound customers for late fees because of overlap time from volunteer deliveries; however, fees for damaged or lost materials will apply.

The library card may be maintained by the homebound office or the customer's volunteer for check out purposes. Homebound status will resume to regular library customer status upon the recovery of a temporary homebound customer and in the event that the policy/agreement is misused.





Friends of the Library president's corner

This past summer, *The Pueblo Chieftain* took a month to find out what its readers liked best about their hometown. More than 6,000 responded to the survey. Among the many topics they voted on, was one dear to the Friends' interests. What is the best bookstore in town? Lo and behold,

Books Again earned Silver, after the local store of one of the largest national bookstore chains. Admittedly, comparing the two is like talking of apples and oranges, but it still remains a feather in the cap of the many dedicated volunteers at our bookstore who achieved this accolade.

Early in October, Books Again held its three-day semi-annual "books-by-the-bag" booksale. For seven dollars, anyone, not only Friends' members, could fill a grocery bag with books and walk away with a reading treasure. And did they! Books Again celebrated its best (in terms of proceeds) sale ever. Depending on how many books, on average, went

into a grocery bag, the store sold somewhere between 7,000 and 10,000 books in three days. It would be interesting to know what the chairman of the national chain would have said when his Pueblo store advised him of such an enormous success.

Most of the books at Books Again look like new, at most, as if they have been read once. These books are all donated, not bought. Yet, they are virtually all marked down from their original price by 75%. Members of The Friends of the Pueblo Library get to take a 10% or 20% additional discount, in accordance with their membership status. The result is, that Books Again is a better bargain than nearly all printed book sources AND all online books available. That is not to say, that borrowing a book at your library is not one of the best reading deals around. But check it out, the Books Again volunteers are knowledgeable and will help you find just what you are looking for. And remember: all proceeds go to support the Pueblo City-County Library District.


