

### Library annual report



PCCLD issues a yearly comprehensive report, which may be characterized as providing an overall health

assessment of public library services in the county. I

recently delivered the library's 2011 Annual Report to the Pueblo County Commissioners and the Pueblo City Council. It is a good news story that I would like to overview now for you.

In 2011, the library was fully focused on its mission, which is to encourage literacy and the joy of reading, offer continuing opportunities for lifelong learning, and provide free and open access to information. The staff's adopted motto, which engages with this mission, is: "Ideas, Imagination & Information." The vision for PCCLD includes books but also goes beyond such traditional library materials to include other forms of information media, like access to the Internet and digital information.

The library staff in 2011 worked consistently to implement services under these guiding principles. This started at the top with the library's leadership, including the members of the PCCLD Board of Trustees: Sherri Baca, Marlene Bregar, Rhonda Gonzales, Dr. Philip Mancha, Roy Miltner, Fredrick Quintana and Jim Stuart.

Governed by these principles and this leadership, PCCLD accomplished a great deal in 2011. Some of our firsts for the year included establishing the Centers for New Information Technology (www.pueblolibrary.org/technology), the Pueblo Library Foundation (http://www.pueblolibrary.org/foundation), and the Adult Literacy Program (www.

pueblolibrary.org/adultliteracyprogram). addition, the library continued to offer its awardwinning public programming and events. These included signature events such as the Summer Reading Club (www.pueblolibrary. org/summerreading), All Pueblo Reads (www. pueblolibrary.org/allpuebloreads), the Voices of the Valley Chautauqua, and Read Out Loud! In total, 91,692 people participated in librarysponsored programs and events throughout the district in 2011. The library's information delivery services also continued to excel in 2011. 405,359 logged-on library computer systems during the year. 1,130,546 visited libraries in the county in 2011. 1,759,499 books and other library materials were checked out from the library in the twelve month period.

It is important also to applaud our Friends. The PCCLD Friends of the Library have contributed much to library service in the county over the years, and 2011 was another banner year in this regard. Under the leadership of Annette Warfield (President), Michael Voute (Vice President), Brenda Fickey (Secretary), and Mary Simmons (Treasurer), the Friends of the Library generated more than \$111,000 in revenues in 2011, all of which ultimately benefits public library services throughout the county.

2011 was a great year for PCCLD (see http://www.pueblolibrary.org/sites/default/files/2011\_PCCLD\_Annual\_Report\_audited.pdf to review the entire 2011 Annual Report), and now we remain hard at work to keep the positive momentum going in 2012. Our ultimate goal is simple: we aim to provide the best public library service in the nation. Our community deserves nothing less.

Author Daniel Blegen will present an illustrated talk on Bob Sakata, whose family owned and operated Sakata Farms near Brighton, Colorado, for many years. He overcame poverty, prejudice, and personal hardship to become a successful and innovative farmer.

### Hard Travelin': Woody Guthrie's Life & Songs


### Saturday, Oct. 6 at Noon Rawlings Library, InfoZone - 4<sup>th</sup> floor

Woody Guthrie was the Oklahoma balladeer whose simple but evocative songs have enriched the American musical repertoire. Roaming the country in the 1930s, Woody connected with America's working poor and dignified their lives in song. His signature tune, "This Land Is Your Land," emerged again as a rallying cry during the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s. This year (2012) is Woody Guthrie's centennial year, a great time to hear the life story of this humble singer songwriter. In Hard Travelin', historian Daniel Blegen discusses Woody's life and sings his songs. This unique, one-hour lecture/miniconcert includes Woody's Dust Bowl ballads, his songs of the West, and his tributes to America's farmers, factory workers and service men. Included are a dozen tunes, including Hard Travelin', Roll On Columbia, Union Maid, Sinking of the Reuben James, So Long It's Been Good to Know Ya, and, of course, This Land Is Your Land. Refreshments will be provided.

and Politics. He is an internationally renowned expert on the rights of indigenous peoples, and has been active at the United Nations, advancing the rights of indigenous peoples since 1985.

Did you know that in 1910, one in every five homestead claims filed in Eastern Colorado were filed by women? Young and single, widowed or divorced, alone or with families and friends, thousands of women flocked to claim land on the eastern plains. Why they came, what they experienced, how they succeeded—these are just some of the questions Colorado Humanities scholar Rebecca Atkinson attempts to answer in her documentary, Homesteading Women of the Colorado Prairies. Following the 50-minute film, stay for refreshments and discussion, both of Atkinson's research and film, as well as Kent Haruf's and other western writers' portrayals of these women as characters in their novels. The Tie that Binds is Haruf's haunting story of one woman's harrowing life on a Colorado homestead.



Recently, I read that libraries in the city of Chicago were designated as "safe havens" during the teachers' strike there. Having worked in that city for eleven years and being aware of its crime statistics, I can well imagine this was a wise decision.

Here in Pueblo, we are blessed with a safer community climate. Yet, there is something to be said for libraries as "safe havens." Safe, in the sense of being less exposed to the mediocrity and banality of electronic communication gadgetry, much of which is increasingly occupying the time and attention of the younger generation.

We, at the Friends of the Pueblo Library District, support the intellectual and enriching programs and the stress on literacy, both in the form of reading and of writing, which our libraries offer.

We do so financially, as volunteers, and as participants in events, such as the "All Pueblo Reads" series of events, which will have started on September 28, and last a full month.

At its most recent meeting, the board of the Friends committed to support the Pueblo Library Foundation with \$50,000 in funds over a five-year period, including \$10,000 already donated earlier this year. The board designated these funds to help defray the costs of acquiring a site for the planned new East Side Library.

### **Dewey Profile featuring C.S. Lewis**



Fall [027] is the beginning for many things—such as the first day of school—and proof that reading and using the library all summer helps one read better in the fall. Our city has benefited greatly from our public libraries, and as I reflect, (which is quite a lot when one reaches my age) it's time to get some things done and over, including weeding! Summer weeding. Now sweeping and raking and clean-up begins another fall activity. This day, with the wind whispering an inkling of fall and Roger Williams, playing *Autumn Leaves* [780], I was clearing the house after summer company went home, and weeding—yes, weeding—my library collection.

I looked at books that shaped my life for example, *The Screwtape Letters* by C.S. Lewis [230]. Many children remember him still for his *Tales of Narnia*. Also, I remember *The Goops*, a cautionary tale which was the adult way of teaching manners to children. "The goops they lick their fingers, the goops they lick their knives, they wipe their hands on table cloths and tell ungodly lies." Also the book *What do you say Dear?* This was a picture book about manners. For example, what if a big dragon approached you and said, "Do you want me to eat you up?" "What do you say dear?" "No, thank you." And now, children are not only learning their manners, but also the manners and languages [400] of many countries.

As a child I was aware of...not much. I thought the 600s in the Dewey Decimal system was horses, like *King of the Wind*, *The Black Stallion*, all Marguerite Henry's horse books and Terhune's great collie dog stories. Later, to my chagrin, I learned it also meant carpentry, electronics, gardening, composting, cooking, parenting and housekeeping.

Thank goodness there was music. There was always music. Playing an instrument, learning about composers



and their lives, and can you believe opera? Opera was on the radio on Saturdays, and, I believe it still is.

Then, as I was aged and educated, I learned more and more history. Remember H.G. Wells', *History of the World*? You've probably read Wells', *War of the Worlds*. Wells was a famous author who wrote about history and also the future, through his science fiction tales. I was always interested in books and literature [800] at an early age, not only when they were written but also who wrote them and why. The 900s being, of course, geography and history. The more I learned, the more I learned to appreciate. So, loaded with the folk tales, geography, history and love, I began to travel, and to appreciate—no to crave it! So here I am, the bottom line—I did not discard or weed any of my books although it was a wonderful trip.



### **Camp Amache: The Story** of an American Tragedy with producer/authors **Don & Sandy Dexter**

In 1942. President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066, which forced more than 110,000 Japanese-Americans, and people of Japanese ancestry, living on the west coast to move to 10 internment camps. This is a story of survival of more than 7,000 people who lost everything and were unjustly interned by the United States government. Don Dexter is an Emmy-winning director/producer and his wife Sandy Dexter is a local author who wrote the screenplay for the Camp Amache documentary.
