Pueblo libraries get technological makeover

Pueblo City-County Library District (PCCLD) is excited to be undergoing major changes that will greatly enhance our ability to provide customer service. Library locations at Rawlings, Pueblo West, Barkman, Lamb, and the Library @ the Y will soon be using Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) system-enabled check in and check out. The use of Automated Material Handling (AMH) will also be implemented at the Rawlings, Pueblo West, Barkman, and Lamb libraries. These changes require that we temporarily close Lamb and Barkman libraries sometime in early January for about a month.

The goal of implementing RFID and AMH is to enhance customer service by allowing customers to check in and check out materials almost immediately, greatly improving the accuracy of our returns, and making returned materials available more quickly. Security of library materials will also be increased by new RFID tags and new efficient gates at all library locations.

One of the future benefits of RFID is that it will equip us to perform a future inventory, which will lead to a more accurate library catalog.

Throughout the next couple of months, we will be affixing RFID tags to all of our books, movies, CDs and video games. These tags are RFID antennae and are programmed with the item number only. Lamb and Barkman Library materials have been tagged and tagging has already begun at the Pueblo West Library. When the project is done, approximately 430,000 items will receive new tags.

AMH is a machine that works with RFID to provide almost instant self-check in and automated sorting via a conveyor belt. The conveyor belt deposits materials into sorting bins reducing the time it takes to return materials to the shelves. The use of RFID and AMH will give staff more time and opportunity to work directly with customers.

New payment stations will make it possible for customers to use cash, credit and debit cards to pay fines independently or with assistance from staff.

To accommodate the use of RFID and AMH, significant physical changes will take place in the circulation and greeting areas at the Rawlings, Lamb, and Barkman Libraries. Staff at our information and help desks will be available to help customers use the new self-check ins and payment stations.

In addition to the new RFID and AMH equipment, the Barkman and Lamb Libraries will be receiving a makeover including new carpet and paint. The Barkman and Lamb Libraries will be closed starting around the beginning of January and reopening toward the end of January or early February. Construction work done at Rawlings and Pueblo West will be done at night so that customers will be able to access these libraries during this time of transition.

We appreciate your patience and flexibility as these enhancements are made to the Rawlings, Pueblo West, Barkman, Lamb, and Library @ the Y libraries. Library Enhancement Project

The Pueblo City-County Library District has a special focus on reading. This comes

as no surprise. Other aspects of library service are important. These include providing free and open access to materials in audio and video formats plus public programming and events. But reading remains central to the library.

This is why it is noteworthy when library efforts to promote reading are successful. Certainly, the number of books and other library materials checked-out is one important indicator. This number continues to climb at a healthy rate. The library will approach two million items checked-out in 2012. This is a

record-setting pace and some 6.8% ahead of last year.

Two other services to watch in this regard are the library's summer reading program and All Pueblo Reads. Each project aims to promote increased reading in our community. In 2012, both of these signature library reading projects demonstrated growing popularity with members of the community. Total participation in this past summer's young people's reading program was over 27,000. All Pueblo Reads in 2012 also hit a new all-time high mark with more than 32,000 participants in the project.

It is the intent of the Pueblo City-County Library District to spotlight reading as a central part of our community's culture. The results in 2012 demonstrate good progress toward this goal.



First Place — Nathan D. Weiss


