Libraries in times of economic uncertainty by Jon Walker

It is a troubling time our country is experiencing. The economy seems to

lose momentum almost daily.

phenomenon of economic One downturns is that this is precisely a time when library use typically goes up. Of course, this is nothing new for our library district. Our use has been increasing in recent years. In fact, the number of library checkouts has grown nearly 25 percent since 2005.

Plus, we know that as family budgets become tighter, the services of the free public library become even more appealing. New-book prices are averaging \$25 or more. When disposable income is less, checking out a book is more appealing.

But the library is not only about books. We also offer DVDs and audiobooks, public access computers, cultural events and comfortable places for people to come together to meet, study, learn and exchange ideas. All this and more is free to the public at the library.

Across the country, libraries are making a difference. A 2003 study by OCLC showed that U.S. libraries spend \$14 billion annually. This compared with \$12.3 billion in annual video sales and \$13.6 billion in athletic footwear sales. At the same time, U.S. libraries had five times more cardholders than Amazon.com has customers, and each day U.S. libraries checked out nearly four times more items than Amazon handles. In fact. U.S. libraries checked out more items than FedX handles, and five times more people visit U.S. libraries than attend all professional and college football, basketball, baseball and hockey games combined. We are confident that your return on investment for the public library is strong. A study conducted in 2002 showed public libraries returned up to \$10 for every \$1 invested (Glen Holt and Donald Eliot, "Cost Benefit Analysis: A Summary of Methodology," The Bottom Line: Managing *Library Finances* 2002, pp. 154-158).

Clearly, your public library is a value and as we navigate the current uncertain economic times, rest assured we will continue to do all we can to serve our community.



Barkman book-discussion group

Touch and Go: A Memoir by Studs Terkel Monday, April 6 at 7 p.m. Barkman Library 1300 Jerry Murphy Rd.

Terkel takes us through his childhood and into his early experiences—as a law student during the Depression, as a young theatergoer, and eventually as an actor himself on both radio and the stage—offering a brilliant and often hilarious portrait of Chicago in the 1920s and '30s.

Describing his beginnings as a disc jockey after World War II, his involvement with progressive politics during the McCarthy era, and later his career as an interviewer and oral historian, *Touch and Go* is a testament to Terkel's "generosity of spirit, sense of social justice and commitment to capture on his ever present tape recorder the voices of those who otherwise would not be heard" (The New York Times Book Review). It is a brilliant lifetime achievement from the man the Washington Post has called "the most distinguished oral historian of our time." Born in 1912, Studs Terkel is the bestselling author of twelve books of oral history, including Working, Hard Times, and the Pulitzer Prize-winning "The Good War".



Based on a novel by Nicholas Sparks, the film is unapologetically sentimental, and enjoyable completely on its own terms--a small gem of an escape, complete with stormtossed coastline. Diane Lane plays Adrienne, a wronged wife whose husband (Christopher Meloni) was a heel, but begs for another

chance. She goes to clear her head at a remote North Carolina inn, where the sole occupant is Paul, a doctor, played by Richard Gere, who is battling his own demons. If the writing is on the wall about what will become of our two leading actors, it's to Lane's and Gere's deep credit that they make their tentative connection, wariness, and growing feelings human and guite believable. Love is messy, and grown-up love, even more so. As they get to know each other. Adrienne shows Paul a small wooden box that holds her keepsakes: "I made it to keep special things safe." Paul turns to



her, looking her squarely but gently in the eye, and says, "What keeps you safe?"

National Car Care Month

April is National Car Care month and to help you take good care of your car, the Pueblo City-County Library District offers an online resource called Auto Repair Reference Center. All of the content in ARRC has been created or reviewed by ASE certified technicians. A key part of caring for your car is to keep up with its scheduled maintenance, and the ARRC includes maintenance schedules specific for each car. One of the additional features included in ARRC is "AutoIQ" which features full-motion video and animated technical diagrams to demonstrate the purpose, functionality and service requirements of any vehicle system.

If you have problems with your car, the Auto Repair Reference Center includes repair information on more than 33,100 vehicles from 1945 to present. The repair procedures include step-by-step instructions, complete with diagrams & images, and new repair procedures/ updates are added continuously. Also included are more than 144,600 enhanced wiring diagrams that contain complete schematics on the electrical system of a vehicle. Technical Service Bulletins (TSB) are issued by manufacturers to identify issues/problems found in automobiles and are added to ARRC on a quarterly basis. Many times, TSBs identify issues pertaining to new vehicles that are still covered under warranty, so for newer vehicles, TSBs can be more important than a repair manual. Even the most skilled do-it-yourselfer would prefer to use a new vehicle's warranty and have the dealership address the problem.

To access the Auto Repair Reference Center and our other do-it-yourself resources, go to www.pueblolibrary. org, click on "Online Resources," click on "Do-It-Yourself," and then click on Auto Repair Reference Center. If using this resource from outside of the library, you will need to enter your library card number when prompted.



Trustee Talk by Fran Terrazas-Alexander

I am often asked why I wanted to be on the library board. This is a story I love to tell. I have always enjoyed libraries and all they have to offer, especially as a student when I was growing up with their volumes of research materials, libraries are a one-stop-shop for most students. As a professional in human resources, I came to realize libraries

had much more to offer...access to technology. In today's environment, most employers will only accept online applications and use computer software to screen applicants for specific qualifications. I found myself working for such an organization in Pueblo faced with a plethora of job applicants but a lack of access to technology that would allow the qualified applicants to apply. My searches for resources led me to the Pueblo City-County Library District, but now I was faced with wait times, availability, and lack of training.

About this time there was an opening on the library board. I knew this was my calling. Technology in libraries, in my view, levels the playing field for applicants and students alike in our community where there is not a computer in every household.

Under the direction of Desmond Grant, the library's information technology manager, my dreams of community access to technology are being realized. The state-of-the-art infrastructure will increase speed and access for both employees and patrons, while protecting the confidentiality of employees and patrons. Where did the district come up with the money? Grant's pursuit of E-Rate funding that provided a \$500,000 savings to the library district and his education to the board on how we could phase in technology to be current and still manage our fiduciary responsibility to the citizens of Pueblo was nothing short of a win-win for our community.

The next time you are at one of Pueblo's premiere libraries, look beyond the books to the new state-of-the-art technology as we continue to phase in this invaluable resource. What's next for me...improved community training on technology.
