E-books, e-readers and the public library by Jon Walker

The proliferation of e-readers, tablets and e-books seems to be spreading like wildfire.

This past holiday season, the popularity of the Kindle e-reader was so great that Amazon named it their best-selling product of all time. Barnes & Noble found so many Nook e-readers attempting to activate at once, their servers crashed. Several major publishers said that e-books had climbed to about 10 percent of their total sales, and some predict that they will rise to 25 percent in the next two to three years. The New York Times even has started publishing an e-book best seller list. And, of course, I almost don't even need to mention the popularity of the Apple iPad (and, now, the iPad2).

E-readers and e-books have been around for many years, but now it seems to be different. The digital world is clearly impacting the world of books, and we seem poised on the threshold of a major shift. Just as music and movies are moving online, so, too, are books.

I have been hearing regularly recently from community members interested in discussing their e-readers and e-books. Customers have a clear expectation that their library will have a significant role in all of this. And, after all, shouldn't we?

E-information is certainly near the heart of our mission. To see examples, see our online offerings of music and e-audiobooks at http:// www.pueblolibrary.org/pld digital and online reference resources and periodical archives at http://www.pueblolibrary.org/ pld search/er main rm.asp. Plus, our public-access Internet services have been very popular now for the past several years.

PCCLD's investment in e-books so far has been modest. We are providing access to some e-books via NetLibrary and Project Gutenberg. But we plan to do much more later this year. A group of library employees began planning for this late last year. The effort this group is making will shape a program for PCCLD as we begin providing customers with access to e-readers and a more robust collection of e-books. We are using the proceeds from a grant from the federal government to help pay for this program.

So, stay tuned, and please know that although we are not quite there yet, PCCLD does have more planned this year for this quickly surging phenomenon.

The documentary captures, poignantly, the struggles and triumphs of the sanitation workers as they worked to achieve equality in the workplace.

One-on-one adult literacy classes



Encouraging the joy of reading and supporting lifelong learning are two parts of Pueblo City-County Library District's mission that come to life via a new Adult Literacy Program. This program incorporates a series of classes and individual tutoring for those who want to improve their reading, spelling, writing and comprehension skills. Learners meet with their tutors at least two times a week for one to two hours per session. The tutor and student meet for a minimum of six months.

The National Assessment of Adult Literacy estimates that 11 million Americans are not literate in English--7 million who are English speakers performing below basic literacy levels and 4 million who have English language barriers. Students in the program typically have not finished high school, but after working with their tutors, gain enough confidence to pursue a GED certificate and even start working toward a college degree.

The Adult Literacy Program is also seeking volunteer tutors. To qualify, volunteers must complete tutor training, volunteer orientation and complete an hour of online training each month. For more information, to schedule a tutor session or to explore volunteer options call 553-0206.

VITA tax preparation

Wednesdays Feb. 2 through April 13 from 1 to 5 p.m. Rawlings Library, Training room - 3rd floor

VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) volunteers will be present to prepare and E-file both federal and state taxes for 2010, free of charge for low-income individuals and families. The income cap this year is \$49,000 or below. Taxpayers are seen on a first-come, first-served basis.

Taxpayers should bring Social Security cards for themselves and each family member, photo identification, correct birth dates, correct spelling of each dependent's name as it appears on their social security card; all wage and earning statements including 1099s for contract work, the Tax Identification Number of the daycare provider (if daycare was used), the bank account number and routing number if they choose to have their refund direct deposited and a copy of last year's return if possible. If married, filing jointly, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms before the return can be E-filed. A 14-day turnaround is expected from the time of filing, to receiving the refund.

The VITA program was established in the late 1960s by the Internal Revenue Service as a way to assist lowincome taxpayers in preparation and filing, and eliminating the cost involved with a private tax preparer. Lowincome taxpayers are encouraged to use this free service, saving sometimes hundreds of dollars in preparation fees. VITA will not prepare tax forms that include rental properties, inheritances, small businesses or partnerships. Trustee Talk by Roy Miltner

As the f r e s h m a n member of the Pueblo City-County Library District Board of

Trustees, this is my first opportunity to address those of you who are Friends of the Library. While new to the board, I am not a stranger to the library district or its functions. Upon moving to Pueblo in 1998, my volunteer service began with a few hours each week at the Barkman Branch, restocking books. Later I served two terms on the Friends board, working strenuously each year preparing for our annual book sale at the university, and finally realizing the dreams of having a yearround book-store. In those capacities I came to know the library directors, many of the staff, and some of the work done behind the scenes.

Serving as a trustee for the past six months has provided me many additional insights into the functioning of the library district, and the almost bewildering number of programs and issues the staff and the trustees deal with on an ongoing basis. I am so very impressed with the forward thinking nature of the library leadership, and the dedication of all the library staff at main and the several branches.

Let me share some of the items on which the trustees have been working in recent months. Technology has advanced rapidly in all areas of life, including library services. We all know this as we check materials out using barcode scanners. We are now exploring what is called Radio Frequency ID Scanning, for possible implementation in 2012. Such a program will reduce material handling, require fewer staff hours to process materials, and improve customer self-service. The library's new director of information technology, Charles Hutchins, will be a vital resource if the decision is made to proceed with this program.

New technologies in the area of

communications have developed telephone systems which far surpass what we presently have in place. We have contracted with a supplier for a new telephone system, one important feature of which will allow library staff to receive calls on their headsets while in the building, away from their desks.

For some time, the idea of establishing a library foundation has been in the minds of the library directors and many others. Such a foundation, if adequately endowed, could insure the continuation of library services during periods of severe economic retrenchment and give the general public an opportunity to invest in the library's future.

To improve and enhance the functioning of the board, the trustees have agreed upon a statement of ethics for our own terms of service; are discussing ways to continue to further educate ourselves in the practice of management; and have reduced the amount of paper by using laptop computers for our meetings. We hold at least one board meeting each year in one of PCCLD's libraries to learn of the libraries accomplishments and needs.

The trustees are very grateful for the work and contributions of the Friends of the Library, which now numbers nearly one-thousand members, and is one of the strongest and most vibrant in Colorado. Together, we will continue to offer citizens of our district the best possible library services available.
