





Trustee Talkby Rhonda Gonzales

I believe libraries change lives. Most of us who are library supporters share a love of libraries. For many of us, libraries have played an important role in our lives. My own story is a good example. One of my earliest memories of the library occurred during the summer between 1st and 2nd grade. My family lived

in Corpus Christi, TX and a family friend was babysitting my infant sister and me during the summer. Much to my annoyance, the family friend had a son who was in my class and loved to pester me endlessly! It so happened that a branch of the public library was several blocks away from the friend's home and we visited the library one day. The library was hosting a summer reading program centered on the theme of Egypt. I checked out several books from the display and took them home to read. When I finished the books, the babysitter gave me permission to walk to the library to return the books and check out more. (It was a different time then, when children could walk several blocks alone safely!) Before long, I was walking to the library every day. The library became my safe haven that summer—I literally spent most of the summer at the library. That experience was the start of a life-long love affair with libraries.

The Pueblo City-County Library District also changes lives. In fact, PCCLD impacted individual residents of Pueblo County in the last year in many ways. In 2011, the library district's branches had more than a million visits. Its programs reached over 90,000 attendees throughout last year. Public computers were used over 400,000 times. The library's initiative to open the Centers for New Information Technology is allowing many residents who would not otherwise have access to the latest computing technologies to use iPads, laptops and other devices free of charge. Perhaps an unemployed person who needs to check out a laptop to create a resume for that perfect job will be able to land that job thanks in part to the library's services. Perhaps there are children in Pueblo who, like me back in 1974, find a safe haven at the library and enjoy summer reading programs. Perhaps an elderly man whose vision has become impaired is able to check out large-print or audio books so that he can continue to read. These are just some of the ways we can impact our community and change lives.

Just as I am grateful for all the ways libraries have changed my life over the years, I'm especially grateful now for the opportunity to serve as a trustee for the library district. I hope my efforts will contribute in some small way to the success of the library and its impact on the community. If libraries have changed your life in some way, we would love to know.
