Coming soon: New teen area @ the library

The Colorado State Library, through the Colorado Department of Education, has awarded the Pueblo City-County Library District nearly \$21,000 for a Teen Center at the Rawlings Library.

The proposal, "Room to Grow: Building an Environment That Encourages Teen Learning," includes adding eight computers that support video/audio editing, online research and word processing. Two teens will also be hired to work part-time monitoring and improving the Teen Center.

The Teen Center will provide multiple environments, supporting individual and group studying. From elevated stools along the cafe-style counter to floor-level reading chairs, the Teen Center will have multiple levels of seating. This creates an inviting and sleek feel, providing a comfortable environment where at least 35 teens can be seated. Tech-savvy teens are sure to appreciate the computers that will include video/audio editing equipment as well as hours of open source music that may be burned to CD free of charge.

The goal of the Teen Center is to provide resources and programs encouraging teens to value education. Pueblo City-County Library District believes readers are leaders, and this new Teen Center will begin to provide the support our students need to succeed.

Pueblo West Library Expansion by Jon Walker

I am so proud that the Friends of the Library have stepped forward to become a founding donor for the recently-announced campaign to expand the Pueblo West library.

Their recent decision to contribute \$10,000 toward the \$2 million fundraising goal to expand the library is a testament to their dedication to help provide the best possible library services to the residents of Pueblo County. The Friends are one of several donors who have committed to making the new library a reality.

The architectural firm of Denver-based Humphries-Poli is now on board working on the expansion project. They have provided initial schematic drawings and models for the new library.

The plans are for a building of 22,014 square feet in size. The new library will incorporate the existing building of 4,920 square feet, and will feature two sizable public-use conference rooms and courtyard, a large children's learning center and storytime room, space for teens, more than fifty Internet computers, several study nooks and study rooms, a comfy reading room, an art gallery, a business center, and a reading garden. Of course, the new library will include significantly enlarged space for more books, newspapers, and magazines.

Another positive development is the Pueblo West Metro District now is finalizing plans to provide the library with additional land to accomodate the bigger building.

Finally, we are happy to announce that the Pueblo West library expansion project was recently approved as an Enterprise Zone Project by the Colorado Economic Development Commission. **Oualifying** donations to the expansion project of \$250 or more may be eligible for a state tax credit of 25% of the donation up to \$100,000, depending upon each donor's tax situation. By way of example, this special tax credit along with standard federal and state deductions means that a donation of \$250 can have a net cost to the donor of as little as \$93. This is a lot of bang for the buck.

The Pueblo West library expansion is moving forward, and we remain on target to break ground in 2007 and open the enlarged facility in 2008. If you are interested in more information on this exciting project, I encourage you to contact Midori Clark at 562-5605.







- Presented \$20 Books Again gift certificates to the authors of the 16 winners of the library's Poetry Contest.
- Provided gift certificates for winners of the Create Your Own Dr. Seuss Contest. There were 1,050 entrants.
- Sponsored the Pueblo Girl Essay Contest. Fourth and fifth grade girls submitted 83 entries.
- Presented Most Improved Reader Certificates to 793 children during awards ceremonies at 42 schools.
- Donated \$5,500 to the 2006 Summer Reading Club.
- Established a \$3,000 yearly scholarship for a library district employee seeking a Masters of Library Science.
- Provided \$5,000 for printing and mailing *News & Events*, of which more than 12,000 copies were mailed in 2005.

- Donated \$750 to purchase globes for the main and branch libraries.
- Gave \$450 to purchase audio cassette and compact disc players to support the Homebound program.
- Sponsored adult programs on topics ranging from diabetic cooking to Pueblo's future.
- Paid for the Library Districts' Staff Development Day luncheon.
- Honored Joyce A. Vigil and Debbie Rose at the 24th Pueblo Women's History Week celebration.
- Held the Annual Meeting, where Barbara Daubenspeck performed as "Baby Doe Tabor."

To make these contributions possible, the Friends raise funds through memberships and the sale of used books.

- Memberships totaled 356 (109 individual, 74 family, 21 business, 116 gold card, 36 benefactor, and 1 patron). Membership proceeds totaled \$10,360.
- Books Again, a used book store, replaced the annual book sale. Net income from this enterprise was nearly \$28,000. A Project Selection Committee was established to recommend how Books Again income would be used in support of the library district.
