Since 2005, the Pueblo City-County Library District has

been on a mission. We set broad goals in 2005 to reach out more to specific populations in our community, to begin to address some library capital needs, and to increase use of the library.

How have we done in reaching our goals? Let's take a look at some of the results.

We have been trying hard to improve services for targeted groups. We established Teen Central areas at our libraries geared toward the tastes of young adults. The Library's Summer Reading Program continuously has won acclaim throughout the state of Colorado for its service to younger people. All Pueblo Reads celebrated its fourth (and best) year in 2008 with the recent visit to Pueblo by best-selling author Amy Tan. Established in 2007, Nuestra Biblioteca at the Rawlings Library is focused on recognizing our community's rich Hispanic culture and traditions. Books in the Park touches some of our less affluent neighborhoods such as Mitchell Park on the East Side and Minnequa Park in Bessemer. This year's implementation of Accessible Avenues enables the library to better serve those with disabilities. We reinvigorated PCCLD's Homebound Program in 2006 in delivering books to people who are unable to come to the library. We reached out to the nonprofit community in Pueblo with the establishment in 2005 of the Nonprofit Resource Center at the Rawlings Library.

Measuring Results by Jon Walker

We also are planning a new Vocation and Business Center at the Pueblo West Library to assist those in our community seeking to improve their economic standing.

We have been addressing library capital needs, too. Early in 2009 we will open the greatly enlarged and wholly renovated Pueblo West Library. Later in 2009, we will open a new branch library on the YMCA campus on the westside of Pueblo. Earlier in 2006, we renewed our commitment to the nine School District 70 and Pueblo City Schools Satellite Libraries, and also upgraded our Satellite in Colorado City when it moved into the Craver Middle School there.

These and other efforts have resulted in increased use of libraries throughout the county. The number of books and other library materials that customers check-out has increased from 1,028,792 in 2005 to 1,138,689 in 2007. This is an increase of 10.7 percent. So far this year in 2008, use is up another 15.6% compared with last year. Attendance at Library-sponsored programs increased from 56.3 percent during the same period, and is up another 21.5% this year. Clearly, library use is on the upswing.

It is useful to set goals. Those we set in 2005 provided us direction to work toward. It is gratifying now to look back and see how well we have done in achieving the goals we set.



Trustee Talk by Jim Stuart

It has been amazing to me to watch the transformation of libraries from the sort of dusty book depositories of my youth in the forties and early fifties to the cutting edge community centers of our new century. Earlier this year I attended the Public Library Association Convention in Minneapolis and what an eye-opener that was. I attended

lots of workshops on many aspects of library science. And, at each and every one of them I was impressed with the way in which the moderators and attendees were examining everything they do in an effort to find better and new ways to meet the public needs. No subject was sacred to these folks or above critical examination. Everything from trying to decide if they should scrap the duodecimal system to checking out books with radio frequency markers to make checking out materials so easy about all you have to do is walk out of the building with them, were discussed in detail. During all these seminars I did a mental grading of our own Library system as to how it measured up to the many changes going on in the library world. In my opinion we came out very good, somewhere in the top 15%.

This is an industry, I am from the business world so I like to use words like "industry", that has been reinventing itself at an ever increasing rate and doing so to the benefit of the public. Books remain the backbone of what we do, and I expect that will remain true for many years to come, but I would guess that about half of the people that enter our doors these days do so for some reason other than checking out a book.

In closing I would like to say a final word about the citizens of Pueblo and their respect for, and support of, our Library District. Time and again I speak to people from outside our community who are absolutely amazed at our huge, beautiful Rawlings Library and the quality of the entire library district. They say things like "Wow, this really shows how much your community values education and supports your library's mission". I think this level of per capita support is unparalleled in any other community in Colorado and perhaps the nation. I hope you all are as proud of this as I am.

Graciousness, thy Name is Diann by Edna Shoaf

Can you say lovely and enthusiastic? How about dedicated, energetic, and excited? Surelyyou canhandle intense and animated! How else does one describe the supervisor of Lamb Public Library? Perhaps empathetic or knowledgeable, and don't forget well-educated, kind, and highly motivated, I was so impressed with Diann Logie, when I was visiting last month in order to prepare an article on Lamb, that I decided to return and really try to determine what makes this elegant lady so impressive. I was awe-struck, and at the end of our interview I was flying high. Just being with Diann is an energizing experience!

This terrific lady considers herself almost a native of our fair city, but she was actually born in Taos, New Mexico. Diann has five brothers and four sisters, and when her father passed away when she was nine, her mother decided to move to Pueblo in order to raise her family in a small town atmosphere. So, Diann went through school here and graduated from Central High School.

After graduation, Diann went to what was then USC in Pueblo and majored in, of all things, Automotive with a minor in Business Administration. She met her husband-to-be in classes there. Her husband then went to Alabama to flight school to become a helicopter pilot. Diann worked for Ford Motor Co. in Houston during this time. Because of her passion for books and education, she received her Master's degree in Library Science from Central University of North Carolina in Raleigh-Durham. Unfortunately her husband passed away in 1998, and she moved back to Pueblo.

Diann has never remarried, and she said that she doesn't even have a pet any more since her Black Lab

died a few years ago. However, she remains extremely close to her mother, who she describes as, "--- the love of my life, and she is a phenomenal mother." She would have to be a super mother to have raised such a special daughter.

As I visited with Diann, she leaned across the desk, never breaking eye contact with me; her hands moved constantly; and her dark eyes sparkled as she spoke. She said that her job is the most wonderful thing that has happened for her. "People search their entire life to find where they belong, and I have found it. When you make a difference with children, it is wonderful!"

When Diann first moved back to Pueblo, she said it took her two years to find a job. She started in Rawlings as a full time Children's Librarian in 2001. This was when the library was still housed downtown while the new library was being built. She used a lot of hand puppets, which she bought herself in order to keep them. She still today does story time with the children. That is one thing she misses by being an administrator - spending all her time with the clientele of the library. But she finds time to visit with parents and grandparents, to listen to their problems, to admire new babies or offer condolences when someone loses a family member.

Diann stated that she has a wonderful staff, and they all are dedicated to making Lamb a library where everyone in the community feels welcome. I hope that you readers who frequent Lamb understand just how fortunate you are to have this lovely lady as the director of your library.
