





Early Pueblo County Colorado Postal History Display



The Pueblo City- County Library District is hosting an exhibit by the Pueblo Stamp Club, Chapter No. 338 of the American Philatelic Society. The display features early Pueblo County postal markings on covers and post cards and also contains Pueblo County historical maps identifying locations of Pueblo County post offices operating as early as 1861.

The exhibited postal materials were researched by Pueblo Stamp Club members using mostly reference materials contained in Special Collections. Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program



The VITA Program offers free tax help to low- to moderate-income (generally, \$40,000 and below) people who cannot prepare their own tax returns. Certified volunteers sponsored by various organizations receive training to help prepare basic tax returns in

communities across the country.

Items you need to bring to the VITA sites to have your tax returns prepared:

- Proof of identification
- Social Security cards for you, your spouse and dependents and/or a Social Security Number verification letter issued by the Social Security Administration

- Birth dates for you, your spouse and dependents on the tax return
- Current year's tax package, if you have one
- Wage and earning statement(s) Form W-2, W-2G, 1099-R, from all employers
- Interest and dividend statements from banks (Form 1099)
- A copy of last year's Federal and State returns if available
- Bank Routing Numbers and Account Numbers for Direct Deposit
- Total paid for day care provider and the day care provider's tax identifying number (the provider's Social Security Number or the provider's business Employer Identification Number)
- To file taxes electronically on a married filing joint tax return, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms


Accessible Avenues: An Assistive Technology Project

A Pueblo City-County Library District staff committee (Richard Tucey, Kathy Knox, Kay Loeber, Barbara Brown, Mary Wagner and Bill Seidel) was formed last year to develop and implement an assistive technology project at the Rawlings Public Library. The library committee partnered with Assistive Technology Partners and a local community advisory board.

The project's goal is to remove barriers to the library's resources for persons who are blind or deaf or have a visual or hearing impairment. The project is also designed to improve library access for persons who have learning disabilities or who have physical limitations or mobility impairments.

Creating accessible public library collections, computer workstations, and meeting rooms is fundamental to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Funding for this project comes from two sources, a \$20,000 Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant and a \$1,250 Friends of the Library grant.

Library activities planned include a needs assessment, an "Accessibility Awareness Day" and the implementation of two adjustable-height Internet workstations at the Rawlings Public Library. ow! What a year at Books Again. Our gross sales, including sales tax, were \$77,499. That's \$19,352 or 33% more than 2006. In my opinion there are a number of factors that contributed to this increase. First, and foremost, the leadership of our new manager Melanie Tappen, who pushed through the second reason for the increase, the doubling of our retail display space by remodeling part of our old warehouse area into sales area. I understand Del Milne also deserves a lot of credit for this expansion as he was the



first to suggest it and helped plan the layout of the area. And, of course the small army of volunteers who moved all the books, several times, to make it what you see today. I think the other reasons are less direct but include good special-sales, more advertising, more user friendly layout of the store, better signage inside and out, terrific volunteers who keep the books sorted and neat and easy to find on the shelves, and word of mouth about what a terrific store we have. In other words the store has improved in all areas, and those efforts have had the desired results, a big increase in sales.
