A Look Back at 2009 by Jon Walker

2009 was a phenomenal year for the library. In fact, it was the Pueblo City-County Library District's best year, yet. How do I

know? There are a few different ways.

One way to know 2009 was great is the numbers. In 2009, we checked out 1,441,387 books and other library materials to members of the community. This is a new all-time record for checkouts, representing a healthy 12.7 percent increase compared with the year before and a whopping 40 percent increase in the last five years. The total number of library visitors in 2009 was 955,406. Again, this is a record number. More than 75,000 people attended library events and programs in 2009. Yet another record. The numbers clearly show people are engaged with the library and 2009 was special.

Last year was important for other reasons. The beautiful new Pueblo West Library opened in April and the community responded warmly to this new library with more people using this LEED-certified "green" facility. We are pleased the Pueblo West Library also is home to the newest library service—the R.M. Watts Business and Vocation Center operating under the guidance of librarian Cindy Shimizu.

The new Library @ the Y opened in November 2009. We hope this library, located in the YMCA's new community recreational center, will become a popular spot for people on the northwest side of Pueblo.

Another new service for 2009 is downloadable e-audiobooks. Now, you can download audiobooks to your computer, MP3 player or IPod using this new service made possible with a generous grant from the Friends of the Library. More information on e-audiobooks is available online at http://www.pueblolibrary.org/DownLoadableAudio/frontpage/frontpage.asp.

Finally, we debuted a mini-bookmobile

service in 2009 called Books a la Cart. This books-on-wheels program brings the library to many underserved areas of our community.

Of course, these new services are in addition to many continuing programs. We again hosted Booklovers Blacktie Ball, this year featuring author Sandra Cisneros who spoke to Puebloans on the 25th anniversary of the publication of her classic book *The House on Mango Street*. The Booklovers Blacktie Ball is the highlight of a month's long series of events we call All Pueblo Reads. 2009 was a record year for All Pueblo Reads with nearly 18,000 participants.

Speaking of programs, PCCLD's award-winning Summer Reading Club continues to attract a large audience of young people. In 2009, there were 13,472 participants in the program. It's our goal to keep kids reading all summer long.

This only touches on some of the new and continuing services and programs available in 2009 from the library. The list is long, and includes the InfoZone News Museum, Western History and special collections, Doris D. Kester/Southern Colorado Community Foundation Nonprofit Resource Center, Nuestra Biblioteca: The Hispanic Resource Center and more.

We are pleased to bring these programs and services to you at the Rawlings Library, Barkman Library, Lamb Library, Pueblo West Library and Library @ the Y, along with satellite public libraries at Avondale Elementary School, Beulah School, Cesar Chavez Academy, Craver Middle School, North Mesa Elementary School, Risley Middle School, Rye Elementary School, South Mesa Elementary School and Vineland Elementary School.

2009 was an exceptional year for your library. Our best year, yet.





Friends of the Library president's corner by Jim Stuart

This year is a very special one for the Friends of the Pueblo City-County Library District as we will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of our founding in 1960. We were originally founded to raise funds to replace the original McClelland Library. At the time, the library was funded by the City of Pueblo. The old library had been used for around 60 years and needed major repairs. It was too small for a modern library, at least modern for 1960. The city had no funds for a new library, so a group of citizens founded the "Friends," rolled-up their sleeves and put on a fundraising campaign. And, I might add, they were successful, even though it took five years. The library built in '65 served the public until the Rawlings Library opened in 2003. Actually, part of the old building is still in use as the east wing of the Rawlings Library.

The major function of all library "Friends" organizations throughout the country, and ours is no exception, is the recycling of the books that are taken

out of the library's collection. For the first 45 years, our organization did that by holding an annual used book sale at various locations. These sales, at least in the last couple of decades, usually netted



somewhere around \$15,000. Then in 2005, we opened Books Again used bookstore at 622 S. Union and our sales have grown to more than \$110,000 annually. In total, the Friends have donated well over \$600,000 to library projects since 1960 and the amount we contribute to the library grows each year. We now give around \$60,000 annually.

I think by all possible measures you would have to call the Friends of the Pueblo Library District a hugely successful organization. I hope you will join us April 17 for our 50th Annual Meeting and Dinner. We are planning a very special event to equal this very special milestone.

Just Keep Movin' On by Edna Shoaf

Moving around seems to be the life story of Jock (Scottish) D. (Irish) Peters (German). His father decided his only child needed an unusual name, and fate seems to have decreed that he spend only a few years at each place he worked during his career after receiving a bachelor of science degree from the University of Houston with a major in architecture and a minor in history. Jock said he has interviewed for positions with companies from New York to California to Florida. That just about covers the entire country, but most of his time was spent in different parts of Texas.

Jock married Leona Moore in Houston during his last two years at university, and she faithfully went with him each time he relocated. Since they were not blessed with any offspring, there were only the two of them to move. In January of 2001, they retired to Pueblo West because they had vacationed in Colorado and decided it was a good place to finally settle.

Jock never did spend much time at a drawing board like one would expect of an architect. Instead, he was in charge of seeing to the myriad concerns connected to a building - supervising custodians, landscaping, parking lots, heating and air conditioning, mail room, motor pool, shipping and receiving, print shop, security and supervising the actual construction of the buildings.

His first job after graduation was as inspector of buildings, mainly at the university. After four years, he was assigned a new job in Clear Lake City, where he was construction administrator for the campus. Here he built his largest facility - a three-story mega-structure of 514 thousand square feet. The roads into the facility had to be built in order to bring in the materials and

equipment, and also several small buildings were needed. This was a \$40 million project in 1973, which was a lot of money at that time.

Jock was either the construction administrator or the director of facility in such diverse places as Kalamazoo, Mich.; Laredo, Texas; Portsmouth, Ohio; and oddly enough, right here in Pueblo where he was vice president for finance at what is now Colorado State University-Pueblo. This position was similar to his other jobs but the pay was better - a good thing for him! While he was here, he hired the first campus safety officer. He moved ATFC television station from PCC to the Belmont Campus. He received permission from the state to air condition the Psychology and Life Science Building. They used PVC pipe and did the labor in house. This was the first time that the state had seen this done.

His entire career connected with education led Jock to continue being around educators after his retirement. He has already served three years on the Friends of the Library board, where he is on the Project Selection Committee. He started the Pueblo West History Association, where he is the historian. He is a member of the Heritage Center, Pueblo County Historical Society and is treasurer of Pueblo West Lion's Club.

I certainly hope the Friends board, and the others in which he is active, appreciate the talents this unique and versatile gentleman brings with him! What an amazing career! What an interesting life! Please, Jock, don't decide that you need to move any further than Pueblo West. We hope you and Leona are here to stay. And always remember, dear readers, that time flies like an arrow, but fruit flies like a banana!
