

#### 2010 Revisited by Jon Walker



Last year was a great year @ your library. In fact, 2010 was Pueblo City-County Library District's best year ever. There were several landmark accomplishments. In

2010, we checked out 1,680,484 books and other library materials to members of our community. This is a new all-time record for checkouts, representing a healthy 16.5 percent increase compared with the year before, and nearly doubling the number from not too many years ago. The total number of library visitors in 2010 was 1,096,484. This is the first time we have had more than one million visitors to our libraries, and, of course, it is another record number. Attendance at library programs and events was 97,604 in 2010. This is yet another alltime best, representing a huge 28.3 percent increase compared with the prior year. The numbers clearly show people are engaged with the library and 2010 was special.

Last year was important for other reasons.

- We continued to venture further into digital formats by adding language learning on USB drives and video games to our collections.
- The library participated in a statewide advocacy campaign for libraries. The yearlong effort concluded in September with a presentation at the Rawlings Library by Dr. Camila Alire, immediate past president of the American Library Association. This program was presented in collaboration with El Pueblo Adolescent Community.
- The Adult Literacy Program pilot was successful, and is now a regular part of library services. This program is a partnership between PCCLD, Project Literacy and AmeriCorps.
- The Friends of the Library announced they will endow an annual children's author program for our community. The first annual celebration of children's literature, Read OUT LOUD! featured *Zorgamazoo* by Robert Paul Weston, who visited Pueblo in February and touched the lives of 2,913 children in our community.
- Pueblo West Library was awarded a Gold LEED certification in 2010 by the U.S. Green Building Council for its environmentally-friendly design and operation.

- A collaboration with the Senior Resource Development Agency resulted in a database of services for 2-1-1 for Southeast Colorado.
- In July, the first Voices of the Valley Chautauqua Festival was held in collaboration with CSU-Pueblo and Colorado Humanities.
- The Pueblo West History Collection at the Pueblo West Library was established in collaboration with the Pueblo West History Association.
- In April, the library celebrated the opening of a new branch on the YMCA campus on the west side of Pueblo. The new Library @ the Y branch is a partnership between the Pueblo City-County Library District and the YMCA of Pueblo.
- Our Hispanic Resources Center leveraged a grant from Colorado Humanities to sponsor the writing of a 102-page monograph entitled *History of Hispanics in Pueblo County, Colorado* by Dr. David Sandoval. This is a landmark history of the influence and key role Hispanics have played in our community. The history is set to published for sale to the public in 2011.
- The library was nominated as a finalist for the El Pomar's Awards for Excellence, and received a \$7,500 award as a result.
- Our Summer Reading Program continued to be a hit, with a record number of 17,015 young people impacted.
- All Pueblo Reads continued its recordbreaking ways with 28,337 participants who celebrated Sherman Alexie's book, *The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian*. The highlight of the month-long series of programs and events was the Booklovers' Blacktie Ball, featuring special public presentations by Alexie.

This only touches on some of the library's services and programs available in 2010. The list is long, and also includes the InfoZone News Museum, Western History and special collections, Doris D. Kester/Southern Colorado Community Foundation Nonprofit Resource Center, Books a la Cart, Books in the Park, Homebound Delivery, Nuestra Biblioteca: The Hispanic Resource Center, the R.M. Watts Business and Vocation Center, and more. Last year was an exceptional year for your library. Our best year ever!

#### VITA tax preparation

Wednesdays Feb. 2 through April 13 from 1-5 p.m. Rawlings Library, Training room - 3<sup>rd</sup> floor

VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) volunteers will be present to prepare and E-file both federal and state taxes for 2010, free of charge for low-income individuals and families. The income cap this year is \$49,000 or below. The tax site is located on the third floor of the library and taxpayers are seen on a first-come, first-served basis. Volunteers will be at the library each Wednesday afternoon throughout the tax season.

Taxpayers should bring Social Security cards for themselves and each family member, a photo identification, correct birthdates, correct spelling of each dependent's name as it appears on their SSN card; all wage and earning statements including 1099s for contract work, the Tax Identification Number of the daycare provider (if daycare was used), the bank account number and routing number if they choose to have their refund direct deposited, and a copy of last year's return if possible. If married, filing jointly, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms before the return can be E-filed. A 14-day turnaround is expected from the time of filing, to receiving the refund.

The VITA program was established in the late 1960s by the IRS (Internal Revenue Service) as a way to assist low-income taxpayers in preparation and filing, and eliminating the cost involved with a private tax preparer. Low-income taxpayers are encouraged to use this free service, saving sometimes hundreds of dollars in preparation fees. VITA will not prepare tax forms that include rental properties, inheritances, small businesses or partnerships. 

#### Trustee Talk by Phil Mancha



I recently had a conversation with Jon Walker, Executive Director of the Pueblo City-County Library District, about the library's plan to make

e-readers and e-tablets available to the public by the end of 2011. I want to share part of that conversation with you.

I was reminded that our library is participating in a "wireless" revolution that will change how information is delivered to the public. Libraries are not considered to be "revolutionary," yet, libraries have a long history of change. Remember from your world history class the stone tablets of Babylon, the great Egyptian library of Alexandria that contained papyrus rolls, the highly decorated Bibles made of vellum carefully guarded by the Roman Church in the Middle Ages, and the numerous great libraries of books, an important consequence of the printing press. Great academic libraries in the important centers of Europe and America and more recently, the development of the public libraries in this country that were provided a great boost by the vision and money of Andrew Carnegie in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Even in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, public libraries were revolutionized by the appearance of the computer in the 1990s and followed rapidly by multiple connections to the Internet. In the 21st century, libraries are being revolutionized by digital and wireless technology.

Three conditions must exist, in Mr. Walker's view, for the wireless revolution to take place in public libraries. First, there must be a commercial commitment to wireless – a commitment that creates a large public interest in all things wireless. Cell phones were pushed and popularized by commercial interests; business sees wireless as a major profit center and continues to drive the market.

Second, the culture of much of the world sees value in wireless devices. Christmas sales of 2010 saw a public hunger for wireless e-readers, e-tablets and many similar devices. The public is increasingly demanding to receive information via wireless, and they are becoming increasingly sophisticated in how to use wireless devices.

Third, the technology is here to deliver information via a wireless format. Mr. Walker reminded me about Leonardo da Vinci's drawings of an airplane. A revolutionary concept for the 16th century, but technology did not exist to make da Vinci's vision a reality. Today, wireless technology exists and has been refined by cell phone developments. In addition, companies such as Google, Barnes & Noble and others, including a Web portal financed by the European Union, have been digitizing books, maps, photographs, film clips, paintings and music. For example, Google's mission is "to organize the world's information and make it universally accessible and useful." These efforts provide an enormous gathering of digital data and a large potential source of data to be downloaded to e-readers or e-tablets.

But, why should a public library care about wireless to the extent that it chooses to lend e-readers and e-tablets to the public? Quite simply, Mr. Walker said, a public library can continue to be viable only as long as the community sees the library as viable and if its willing to adopt new technology and ways to deliver information in formats that are convenient. The days when the library was all about papyrus has long since disappeared. Would the public support a library with their taxes if it had only Egyptian papyrus rolls? Probably not. Libraries must be relevant to their communities. Yes, our libraries today have books and not papyrus rolls, and books are not going to disappear because of wireless. But today books exist in our libraries along side PCs and connections to a worldwide Internet. The wireless revolution has, in PCCLD's view, reached a tipping point where our library must begin to offer a wireless service model that addresses changing information needs. A committee has been formed and PCCLD has received a \$115,000 grant to expand broadband technology to the underserved. An important goal is to provide public access to information regardless of the customer's economic status. The underserved cannot be allowed to fall behind better-served individuals in our society. Expect to see e-readers and e-tablets at PCCLD by the end of 2011.

The InfoZone News Museum is hosting Discover Space, an exhibit designed by the Space Science Institute, providing


a fun, hands-on environment for individuals to learn about science and technology.
