Developing the Whole Collectionby Jon Walker

We are looking forward to another great year at the Pueblo City-County Library District. In the year just ended, members of

our community continued using library services in record numbers. We hope to keep up this positive trend in the new year. In order to do so, we will be working toward several new objectives derived from five strategic goals adopted by the Board of Trustees as published in the document Moving Ahead: Building a Community of Readers (December 10, 2009, http://www.pueblolibrary.org/pld_docs/2009_Strategic_Plan.pdf). These goals are to increase use of library materials, improve information technology, expand services to the underserved, improve funding and maintain library district assets.

The following is a list of some, but not all, of PCCLD's 2011 objectives that align with our long-range, strategic goals. We hope and believe that by working toward these objectives, the library district will have even a greater positive influence in the life of our community.

- Improve online catalog searching
- Adopt procedures for systematically culling unwanted items from the Library District's circulating collections
- Allocate 15% of the operating budget to purchase new books and other library materials
- Adopt a communication plan to insure effective publicity for the Library District in order to attract positive attention, create interest and gain support, and connect with the media
- Develop plans and procedures for floating the Library District's collection in order to move materials to locations based upon customer demand and use
- Pilot a program to provide downloadable eBooks
- Implement an all-new website
- Seek grants to help digitize portions of the Rawlings Library's Special Collections
- Offer Summer Reading Online to reach a wider audience

- Unveil Centers for New Information Technology to expand community access to the latest broadband technologies
- Launch an Adult Literacy Program in partnership with Project Literacy and AmeriCorps
- Partner with the Sangre de Cristo Hospice Center to establish a collection of materials on dying, death and grieving
- Establish a Pueblo Library Foundation to provide an alternative funding source for the Library District
- Write security and disaster recovery policies and procedures to protect "business critical" library functions
- Develop plans and procedures to centralize purchasing to insure new purchases are at best costs
- Modify Bret Kelly Room to eliminate problematic support columns obstructing use of the room
- Complete planned update to the InfoZone News Museum
- Implement Integrated Digital Media Unlockers to better secure DVDs
- Implement District-wide recycling program building upon pilot at Pueblo West Library

In the last five years, use of libraries in Pueblo County has skyrocketed. The number of books and other library materials checked out has increased 65 percent. The number of people visiting libraries has grown 60 percent. The number of people attending library cultural and educational programs and events has shot up a remarkable 275 percent. This has taken place during a time when the population of Pueblo County has grown only a modest 4.8 percent. It is our hope that our relevance to the citizenry will continue to broaden and deepen by implementing the objectives outlined above.




