## The value of the library with walls by Jon Walker

I recently received an email from a colleague questioning the future of public library buildings. The thrust of the

argument is that as information goes digital will libraries only exist in cyberspace?

Librarians have been discussing the digital age for many years (beginning at least as early as 1945 with Vannevar Bush's article "As We May Think," *The Atlantic Monthly*, July 1945). Librarians frequently refer to this possibility as the "virtual library" or "library without walls." Indeed, some have asserted virtual libraries will replace the physical library. I will make a case for the value of the "library with walls."

First, I should make it clear that I am a strong advocate for library automation. My resume reveals a deep and abiding respect for and appreciation of all library things digital. After all, my professional background includes a lengthy tenure successfully managing a large, public library system's information technology assets and initiatives.

Despite my techno-geek credentials, when I'm asked about the "library without walls," my answer is that libraries will continue to evolve (as they have since those earliest days some 4,000 years ago when they contained clay tablets and papyrus scrolls), but I don't see this as a case of "virtual libraries" instead of physical libraries. Rather it should be considered as the advent of "virtual libraries" in addition to library buildings.

The idea of one thing not replacing the other, but adding another option, is not new. When TV came along, it was not instead of radio. When Amazon gained popularity, it did not replace Target, Walmart and Borders. They all exist together.

This is not to say digital information does not impact libraries. Just like Amazon changed Walmart and TV changed radio, so, too, digital information is changing libraries. Examples of this include the veritable sea of public-access Internet computers available in most public libraries, or the replacement of reference books and periodical back-files with online equivalents. But to say library as a place is no longer important is a sad mistake.

Just look at the numbers. In the last

decade, there's been a nearly 60 percent increase in foot traffic to Pueblo County's libraries, while the total population of the county increased by only 11 percent. So far in 2010, visits to libraries are up more than 20 percent when compared with last year's all-time record. Attendance at library-sponsored programs and events has increased more than 225 percent in the last few years. Clearly, the physical library is only growing in popularity.

In the end, we must acknowledge that the library is more than just a building with information. It's also a community gathering place, a technology center, a forum to share and debate ideas, and a refuge of opportunity. Robust and vital public libraries provide welcoming, well equipped and maintained physical facilities with inviting spaces to encourage reading and learning.

This is why today's library buildings challenge the stereotype of the library as a stuffy, musty place. Innovative architecture, cutting-edge design and new customerservice features are bringing more light, personality and usability to our libraries. And more people.

Libraries are really about people. People are social beings who crave information and the interchange of points of view. The library helps meet this human need by linking people to the human record in all of its formats. The formats may change, but the need for a place to connect—people with information, people with stories, people with ideas, people with people does not change.

The library is that centralized location where new and emerging information formats and technologies can be combined with traditional knowledge-resources in a user-focused, service-rich environment that supports today's social and educational patterns of learning and research. The library as place serves as the centerpiece for establishing intellectual community and scholarly enterprise.

Long live the public library as a place in our communities.

## **Trustee Talk** by Phil Mancha



I believe that the Pueblo City-County Library is one of the best libraries in the state - possibly the very best.

Yet my view of our public library may not be shared by every citizen in our library district. Not everybody recognizes our multiple ways of getting our books to our customers, or the

many programs we offer, or the high quality of service and personnel working for the library.

Enter the word "advocacy" into our conversation. All of us from Board members to the most recently hired employee are advocates and representatives of our library. Advocacy for the library is a community function. Indeed, advocacy is the understood responsibility of the Board of Trustees and senior staff members. But the responsibility for advocacy extends to everybody associated with the Pueblo City-County Library, especially all library and Friends of the Library employees and even our customers.

Do you know what services are offered by the different offices in the library? Are you willing and able to share your knowledge with your friends and neighbors? Can you inform your neighbors about potential threats to our library?

What are some of the threats to the library? Are you aware and can you address the three ballot initiatives on the November ballot that will have a terrible impact on the library if passed? The biggest threat to our library is apathy, indifference and lack of awareness of how our library serves our community. These negative attitudes undercut the public support for the library and after all, we are a "public" library. We counter such attitudes every time we tell our friends, neighbors and customers what we do at the library and the services we provide. Developing and maintaining the health of the library is everybody's responsibility, even recruiting new advocates for the library. Indeed, we are all advocates.

## Mystery reading for the summer by Connie Converse

Does your summer reading recall volumes of "sizzling" romance or "scintillating" sci-fi and you are just tired of the same plot lines? Try sleuthing your way through the summer with a mystery. Yes, I know you have heard of the popular "mainstream mysteries" that are on every book stand in the world. John Grisham, Michael Connelly, James Patterson (does that man ever get writer's block?), etc. Maybe you would rather try a different style of mystery? Here are few sub categories of mystery to consider.

**Cozy mysteries:** Usually a cozy mystery has a woman as an amateur crime solver. The crime takes place in a small village or town. They are "gentle" books with no graphic violence, no profanity and are fast paced with several twists and turns. Some authors of cozies are Susan Wittig Albert, Emily Brightwell, Rita Mae Brown, Laura Levine, Ruth Rendell, plus a slew more.

**Historical mysteries:** This is a mystery or suspense that is about a time period prior to when it was written.

There is usually a hidden history lesson in addition to the crime solving. Authors might include Anne Perry, Ellis Peters, Phillip Kerr, Andrew Taylor, Charles Todd, plus eons more.

**European mysteries:** Many of these mysteries have more involved plot lines than your mainstream mysteries. Authors to look for: Reginald Hill and Ngaio March (British), Henning Mankell and Steig Larsson (Swedish) and Jo Nesbo (Norwegian).
