The Pueblo Library Foundation by Jon Walker

The Pueblo City-County Library District continues to do well. In fact, last month. I met individually with the members of the

Pueblo City Council and the Board of County Commissioners to deliver a very positive and upbeat report regarding the library. Certainly, the overall use of library services is increasing. In 2010, we saw record numbers of people visiting our libraries (more than 1 million people in 2010 alone), checking out books and other library materials (nearly 1.7 million check outs in 2010), utilizing library public-access computers (nearly 370,000 logged-on at libraries in Pueblo County in 2010), and attending library-sponsored events (almost 98,000 people in 2010). We are well on our way toward the goal of insuring ours is a community of readers.

Of course, it takes money to provide these services and programs, and, in this respect, the library is no different from any other institution. Fortunately, library funding has remained steady in recent years, and there have been years with moderate increases in revenue. Nevertheless, pressure on the library budget continues to grow. This is despite some modest, but necessary reductions to employee benefits and compensation, and our best efforts to moderate other operational

In the future, the library's finance office is projecting a decrease in library revenues of up to \$330,000. In order to cope with this decline, it is important for the library district to focus on stabilizing revenue in other ways. This is why we are working now to stay ahead of the curve by establishing the Pueblo Library Foundation. The purpose of the foundation will be solely dedicated to supporting public library services in Pueblo County. In fact, I expect it to be established as a not-for-profit public charity for this purpose,

and in line with applicable federal and state laws and regulations. The foundation will exist as a separate organization, and it will provide an alternative source of funding for the library district. At this time, a group of library supporters—including friends. trustees and staff—are working together to craft a formal mission statement, articles of incorporation and create the framework for the foundation. The group has been working with experts in the law and charitable giving to establish the foundation as a legal entity that supports our mission. Our goal is to have the Pueblo Library Foundation up and running before the end of the current year.

The Pueblo Library Foundation will seek giving from a large variety of people and institutions. We hope to build a mass of assets to help sustain the public library and its services for the community. This endowment will help especially during times of economic downturn, but also allow the library to enhance and build upon what is clearly a strong set of programs. The foundation will serve as a means for fundraising toward significant capital goals, such as library facilities. Studies show that great public libraries enhance a community's quality of life. The library district has stated goals to establish more libraries in such places as the St. Charles Mesa, Pueblo's East Side, the growing North Side and in the mountain communities. The Pueblo Library Foundation can help us attain this, and more.

The vision for a Pueblo Library Foundation has been coming into focus for a number of years. 2011 is the time for the foundation to come into being. Look for additional information on this exciting development in the coming months.


Vigil family's journey from Spain to America

Reflections on retirement by Marlene Bregar



When asked what I plan to do with my time after retirement, one of the first things I say is that I have more time to dedicate to my role on the board of trustees of PCCLD and more

time to advocate for the library and the new foundation that is being formed to support library plans and projects far into the future.

There may be another avenue for involvement with the library in my future. At PCCLD's May board meeting, Amy Nelson, literacy librarian, gave a presentation about the adult literacy project that the library is involved in. This relatively new project is already showing promise as a way to directly impact the community in a positive way. The adult literacy project made me reflect a bit on just what reading has meant to me throughout my life.

My earliest memories are of crawling into my grandpa's lap while he sat in his rocking chair so he could read to me. Also, I knew what the bookmobile was before I went to school. We lived in rural Minnesota, and the bookmobile delivered books throughout the year.

Mom would take us a mile down the road to the one-room schoolhouse every two weeks and we picked out books. The teacher at that school house was Ms. Middlestadt. She not only taught us to read, she read to us every afternoon. All of the students, grades 1 - 6, stopped what they were doing and she read. I can still hear the lilt of her voice and see her turning the pages as she read Alice and Wonderland, The Wizard of Oz and other novels. She not only taught us how to read and write, she taught us to love books and the places they could take us, the people we could meet and the ideas that were outside of the farming community we were a part of. Books taught us that the world wasn't quite as homogeneous as we thought it was and challenged us to think in new ways.

I continued my love of reading into high school. I read to learn academically, to keep up with current events, for entertainment, to get away, to imagine and to laugh! I explored the deeper meaning of life by reading. I taught myself to knit using a book. I explored my ancestors using printed materials. It was in college that I decided that paperbacks were the best! They were affordable, portable and you could trade them in and add a dollar for another book at the used-book store!

Throughout my adult life, books have always been there. Once you have children, you rediscover the wonder and fun of children's literature. Off to the library we went, coming home with about as many books as the library would allow us to checkout! There really isn't anything like making memories reading with your children. Even though the boys are grown, I still can't resist periodically perusing the new "kiddy lit" at the library or at a library conference. As a teacher, I found I didn't always have a lot of time to read books during the school year so I had my Biology II class read a novel during the genetics unit. And during the summer, I could read and read!

My boys got me a Kindle and although I still love the feel of a book in my hands, I have to admit that it is pretty nice to not have to pack six or seven paperbacks for the trip back to Minnesota! And while it is nice to never lose your place in the ebook, clicking isn't quite the same as turning the page!

Soon, PCCLD will be introducing ebooks. The world of electronic access to information is rapidly expanding and in keeping with the purpose for public libraries, free access to information for all citizens, we are pleased to see our collection and services expand in this way.

I can't imagine a world without books! I can't imagine a life struggling to read. That is probably one of the main reasons I expanded my teaching career to include special education, and why I spent about half my career teaching strategies to use when learning to read and educating teachers on teaching strategies to use with their students. So, I guess it is pretty natural that my retirement plans include continued involvement with the library.

Possible award attributes:

A. Devoted an extraordinary number of volunteer hours to Books Again, Friends of the Library Board, "Friends" causes or library advocacy.

- B. Donated an unusually large sum of money to the "Friends."
- C. Brought significant innovation to one of the "Friends" activities that made a lasting change in the organization.
- D. Outstanding advocate for the "Friends" and/or PCCLD.
- E. Over a long period of time the nominee consistently gave time, energy and devotion to the "Friends of the Library."
- F. Committed to a particular aspect of "Friends" activities, such that a lasting impression has been made on a particular area of interest, such as youth programs, seniors, events and literacy.
- G. Outstanding performance as an officer or committee chair person which brought higher levels of achievement and expectations to the job.


