Summer Reading for Young People by Jon Walker

Each summer the Pueblo City - County Library District sponsors program special а young people to for encourage the joy of

reading. This year, the program begins in June and stretches into mid-August. We are so pleased and proud at the library to have seen the summer reading program continue to grow in popularity over the past several years. A record number of 17,015 young people were positively impacted by the library's summer reading program in 2010. We hope this year will be even bigger.

Why is this important? Because of what educators commonly refer to as "summer This is the phenomenon setback." whereby, during the summer break away from school, young people tend to lose the learning momentum reached during the prior school year, and begin to forget significant pieces of what was learned. There is scholarly research to back up this notion, and, also, that this decline can be very pronounced with reading skills. Evidence shows that those who are better readers are those who read more, and when reading slows or stops during the summer, skills atrophy. Dr. Richard Allington, a professor at the University of Florida, points out that the "best predictor of summer loss or summer gain is whether you read or not during the summer."

In order to help prevent this setback,

each and every summer, the library district presents programming, events and activities designed to promote and encourage summer reading among our youth. Our goal is simple. We aim to keep kids reading all summer long. We don't focus on assigned reading or reading as work. Instead, we emphasize reading for fun. In fact, I often say things like: "Read the comics." "Read Manga." "Read graphic novels." "Read fun magazines." "Read whatever is entertaining." "Just read."

Look for our announcements elsewhere in this newsletter about the dates and times of special programs and events designed to make reading fun this summer. Information also is available at your local public library, in the newspaper, on the library's website (www.pueblolibrary.org), and on television.

Please, get your children involved. Research indicates that participating in the library's summer reading program can make a positive difference in a young person's long-term reading and academic achievement.

The library's summer reading program is free and it's fun. Most importantly, it will help establish a foundation for young people that can last a lifetime.

Hennie Comfort is the best storyteller in Middle Swan, Colo., a gold-mining town high in the Rockies. After 86 years, she's accumulated plenty of tales from losing one husband in the Civil War, and another in a mine explosion. One wintry afternoon in 1936, 17-year-old Nit Spindle turns up on Hennie's front porch. A transplant from the South like Hennie, and a new bride who has just lost a baby, Nit yearns for a little company and guidance. So begins Sandra Dallas' sentimental eighth novel, "Prayers for Sale," about the redemptive power of women's friendship.

Siblings grapple with troubling events from their childhood. Now scattered, the family keeps in touch via emails and phone messages. Each individually complains of a dilemma and begs to be rescued. Brother Mark is the outcast-a physicist in a family of artists who must bail the youngest sibling out of jail and look after their father while Mary goes to fetch a sister from a Greek island who is pregnant. Eventually, the whole family reunites, along with a homeless woman, a skeptical girlfriend, a tattooed runaway and a shabby mutt, to hash out their disturbed past.

The making of a library by Sherri L. Baca, CPA



What's in the making of a library? Because our library district has "always" been here, I've never given much thought to that question. That is, until last fall when I was charged with the creation of the

library at El Pueblo, An Adolescent Treatment Community. El Pueblo, where I work, is a mental health treatment facility for adolescents. Approximately 100 students attend school at El Pueblo and have a need for library services on our campus. We found ourselves blessed with the same library square footage as the Library @ the Y. I found out very quickly that 1,000 square feet houses many books! Among the first steps was to find a qualified librarian, and then inventory our start-up collection of books previously donated to El Pueblo. Next, we had to create a computer database to catalog our books and then separate the books into the Dewey system. There has been a long process of entering, labeling and shelving hundreds

of books. We then analyzed our collection to determine the gaps in the important areas. We interviewed our teaching staff to determine their curriculum and research needs for the classroom. We interviewed the El Pueblo students to determine what books they wanted to read. We've written grants for the purchase of new books - many thanks to our community which has been very generous. The outcome is a dynamic and functional school library for the students at El Pueblo. Our librarian Karla said it best in that many of the books are new when checked out by our students but they are returned worn and well-broken in---not in a bad way, because we can see that these books have been held often and loved much.

There is much work to make a library relevant, useful and fun to use. It takes countless hours of work and attention to details. If you haven't thanked the PCCLD staff lately for their hard work and dedication at our Pueblo City-County Library District, please do so soon. The kuddos are well-deserved. Believe me, I know!

Friends of the Library Spotlight: Lois Pfost via Dewey Decimal by Jeannine Semrau

Living in South Carolina was an interesting contrast to Idaho as well as to Boulder. In South Carolina, she experienced the fascinating world of American folklore (390) and music. Bluegrass (780) is one of her favorite styles of music, of course. She learned snippets of German from her husband and his family. Also some Spanish, while living and working with Spanish-speaking patients. She has a good ear for and a love of words(400).

Lois and her husband, Don, are owned and trained by two Labrador dogs. They are doing quite well on walks but have a little trouble wanting coffee and reading the newspaper-before the walk. They are both learning about the priorities of dogs (636). Aside from the dogs, Lois has an interest and talent in wood turning! She is talented in this art and is most definitely a pro! How did this get started? Her husband built a lot of cupboards and bookcases. She browsed through the woodworking magazines and was struck by wood turning. This is a most fascinating hobby. Finding information about this can be difficult. It borders on woodworking (640) and art (700). I've seen pictures of her works and also her gifts and donations during library events. Just when you feel you know this person, she comes in 5th in a 5K Festival Walk for healthful walking (613) and sport walking (700). In the area of reading, Lois loves mysteries and is interested in Western authors which coincides with her interest in Colorado history and lore. She likes Wallace Stegner, who is a writer for all interests. Actually, she reads eclectically since joining the Friends of the Library and Books Again! New Mexico's Crypto-Jews

Saturday, June 4 10 a.m. to noon Rawlings Library, Ryals Room

Former New Mexico historian, renowned author, and Fulbright Fellow, Dr. Stanley M. Hordes, will make a presentation on the history of the Crypto Jews. The Crypto-Jews were Jews who fled from the Spanish and Mexican inquisitions and were converted to Roman Catholicism once they arrived in New Mexico. Dr. Hordes' presentation will deal with the history of the Crypto-Jews of New Mexico, from their origins in the forced conversions of Spain in the fourteenth century, to the recent past.

Dr. Hordes' book, To the End of the Earth: A History of the Crypto-Jews of New Mexico, was awarded the Gaspar Pérez de Villagrá Prize for outstanding historical publication of the year.
