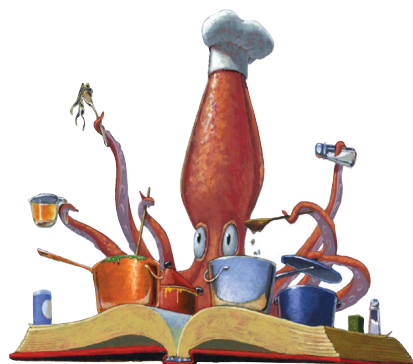


**June 6 & 7 - The Amazing Arthur:** This yo-yo master performs magic and juggling while keeping the kids rolling with laughter.

## The Ever-Evolving Library by Jon Walker

Public libraries are not the same today as before. Such change is not new. Libraries have long been evolving. One

reason libraries have been able to survive and prosper through the ages (the earliest known libraries date back to antiquity—think: clay tablets and papyrus scrolls) has been their ability to evolve to meet the current needs of their community. The guiding principles for public libraries may endure, including encouraging literacy and promoting free and open access to information for all. However, the specific way these principles are expressed have transformed over time and likely will continue to do so.

I have been professionally involved with public libraries in this country long enough to have witnessed several revisions to service delivery. For example, it was not too many years ago that most libraries contained large collections of specialized reference books and bound periodicals. These books included directories, dictionaries, abstracts and indices, almanacs, encyclopedias and a variety of other reference tomes. The bound periodicals frequently represented year upon year of past issues of magazines, newspapers and other serial publications. With the ascendancy of the consumer Internet, beginning in the mid-1990s, these reference books have been forever and indelibly changed. No longer do many libraries host the row upon row of shelves of reference books and bound periodicals in the vast quantities of earlier times. The Internet—especially the World Wide Web and digitization of content—has made these older formats nearly obsolete. Basically, the reference books we once knew and cherished no longer exist and have been supplanted by a combination of simply-used desktop PCs, the intuitive World Wide Web, nearly ubiquitous high-speed telecommunications, and sophisticated search engines, such as Google, Bing, and DogPile. Libraries adapted to this new order by replacing the reference and bound periodical collections with row upon row of public

access computers and related services.

It is clear that another significant change is occurring now. The consumer market is now replete with wireless handheld devices and networks that are making vast quantities of information more portable than ever before. Technology again is converting learning and information delivery. This change is beginning now to impact the public library. Libraries are evolving yet once more.

This time it appears that libraries are shifting from being warehouses of information to focus on space, place, and equipment. Library customers seek a place to study, learn and collaborate, and libraries now find themselves in the position of meeting this need in new ways. The future library may look less like a repository for books and more like a public space that is conducive and comfortable for information access, use, and the exchange of ideas via devices. A place that facilitates human interaction with appropriate apparatuses and ambience.

Picture this. The customer brings her/his portable information appliance into the library. This device could be a smart phone, a tablet, a laptop, or some yet-to-come technology. Connecting to the local wireless network, the customer finds a quiet place to comfortably attend to her/his study and pursuits. Now, a colleague enters the library and uses a library-provided sharing appliance to connect her/his device with the other in order to form a multi-user, interactive capacity to seamlessly integrate the work of the two. The result offers opportunities to increase yield and bring their exchange of ideas to a new level of richness. A third person enters now and uses a tablet provided by the library to join the meeting. Others also can join their team by connecting, sharing, and learning using joined intuitive, multi-touch user interfaces. Information is highly accessible, meetings are more collaborative, and productivity soars.

Is this the future library? Time will tell. But one thing is certain. As Bob Dylan wrote several years ago, "The Times They are a-changin'."

Pueblo City-County Library District is a good citizen to the people of Pueblo City and County. A good citizen invests in its community and in the people whom it serves.

The Pueblo City-County Library District has been investing in the people of our area for many years by lending books to the citizens. As the needs of our citizens have grown, the library has responded by expanding its many services such as "Books in the Park" or "All Pueblo Reads." We have gone digital as the community has gone digital. We offer DVDs, audio books, and more. Recently we have begun to loan e-readers and e-books. We have assumed that not all citizens know how to use these devices, so we have made training available to all citizens.

We have invested in bright spacious buildings where our citizens can sit and read or use a computer for whatever purpose they choose. The Rawlings Library and Pueblo West Library are two of the new large libraries. Lamb and Barkman are smaller and recently renovated branch libraries.

Most recently, the Pueblo City-County Library District announced that it will build three new libraries in the city/county area. They will be located in St. Charles Mesa, the East Side of the city of Pueblo and in Colorado City.

These three new libraries are the latest investment in the future of our community. We are investing in brick and mortar so that individuals who currently have limited access to a library due to large distance between their homes and the library can easily take out a book or research a document or meet together in a local community meeting room. We are investing in the economic well-being of these communities. PCCLD is investing in new construction and new jobs in these communities. But most of all, the Library is investing in the people of these communities who now build on their knowledge and skills that may lead to economic independence or personal self satisfaction.

In reality, the people of Pueblo City and County have been investing in the library by their generous support and their willingness to attend our program, to use our services and to recommend to us even more services. These supporters have always been behind us when the clouds darken – remember Prop 101 and Amendments 60 and 61 – had the library supporters not voted against that set of initiatives, the libraries of the State, including PCCLD would have been devastated.

Actually, the relationship between the library and the people of the City and County is that of a partnership – a partnership where both parties support each other to the benefit of all. So, in the end we are all good citizens.

## **Friends of the Library achievements**

"If you go down to the Pub\* (public library you may not believe your eyes. If you go down to pub\* today you're sure of a big surprise - For every library that ever there was, will gather there for certain because, it's the day the Library Friends have their picnic."

I know, it's a poor rendition of *The Teddy Bears Have a Picnic*, by John Bratton, although it is a wonderful time for the Friends of the Library and a celebration of their accomplishments. The Books Again bookstore has achieved over 800 members, and this year they have enhanced library services by providing judges for contests, as well as, gift certificates for student essays, stories and poems. FOL's other achievements include sponsoring the Summer Reading Program and All Pueblo Reads, and donating a considerable amount of money to the Pueblo Library Foundation to help start contributions for three new branch libraries! FOL has awarded grants that benefit PCCLD, and continues to fund the printing of the library newsletter. These are many of the contributions made possible by the FOL memberships and sale of used books. Since Books Again was started in 2005, the used book store had gross sales of over \$184,923.00 as well as its dedicated, local volunteers logging over 7,269 hours! Good reason for a picnic, eh? Also, the FOL presented checks to the library foundation for \$25,000 and \$15,000 which will go toward funding three new libraries.

FOL celebrated these achievements at its annual meeting and gave a special thanks to Melanie Tappen who has served over 5 years as the book store

manager. There was applause for board members Doris Kester and Jim Stuart, for serving 6 years on the Board and to James Amos who served on the board for three years. The Friends of the Year award was presented to Jim Stuart for inspiring others and his dedication to the friends organization.

Attendees received a special bookmark made by Lois Pfof that looked like ancient papyrus paper. The dinner included a wonderful program and dinner, with the famous author and retired Police Chief of Pueblo, Ruben Archuleta. Archuleta spoke of his life as a potato worker, college student, Navy soldier, Police Chief and undercover agent with Organized Crime Strike Force. He attended the FBI National Academy, U.S. Secret Service training and upon retirement he was appointed by Governor Bill Owens to the transition team of the Columbine School Review Commission. Being a hard worker by nature and spirit, he also wrote the book *From El Valle to Pueblo*. Not being one to shirk, he's also written *The Land of the Penitentes*, *Land of tradition*, *Penitente Renaissance*, *Manifesting Hope*, which was a finalist for the New Mexico Book Awards. He wrote a book called *Juan de La Burra*, about the renowned weaver Eppie Archuleta, a recipient of the NEA award for her weavings and, as you will read, a great storyteller. You will want to, and can, read these books, because they are at your library and Ruben has donated copies of these books to Books Again Bookstore.
