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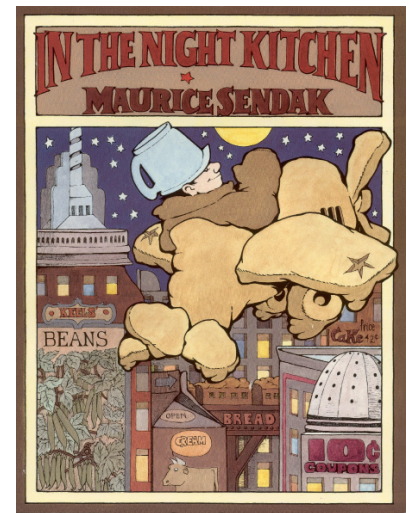
## Maurice Sendak exhibition at the InfoZone

May 14 through June 24  
Rawlings Library, 4<sup>th</sup> floor

*In a Nutshell: The Worlds of Maurice Sendak*, is a national traveling exhibition for libraries which explores the influence of the Old and New Worlds in the work of renowned illustrator Maurice Sendak.

Sendak is best known as the illustrator of more than 100 picture books, including *Where the Wild Things Are* and *In the Night Kitchen*. He was born to Polish immigrants in Brooklyn in 1928. He became fascinated as a child with the worn black-and-white photos of his European relatives and the influence of both of these worlds. His threads of Jewish family, geography and culture can be seen in his imaginative works.

*In a Nutshell: The Worlds of Maurice Sendak* was organized by the Rosenbach Museum & Library, Philadelphia and developed by Nextbook, Inc., a nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting Jewish literature, culture and ideas and the American Library Association Public Programs Office. The national tour of the exhibit has been made possible by grants from the Charles H. Revson Foundation, the Righteous Persons Foundation, the David Berg Foundation and an anonymous donor, with additional support from *Tablet Magazine: A New Read on Jewish Life*.

## Coming soon: Public centers for new information technology

PCCLD is working on an important new initiative. This year, we will establish Public Centers for New Information Technology. Library staff are working diligently to see that this project is up and running by mid-year. The goal of the centers is to expand community access to current broadband wireless information technologies, such as tablets and eReaders, and to the burgeoning world of downloadable eBooks and related eContent.

Why is this important? Simply put, because libraries are changing.

For example, experts today are talking about the impact on libraries resulting from the current transition from the codex (bound paper manuscripts—some now refer to these as “tree books”) to the eBook. This was a major topic at a recent gathering in Washington, D.C., of more than 2,000 librarians and information scientists from around the world. These experts cited several interesting facts. For example, it took only six years for DVDs to supplant VHS for delivering video (and, of course, this is changing again as DVDs are replaced by streaming video). Another example, 15 years ago the back files of periodicals and traditional reference books were digitized. Rows of bound periodical back files and reference books have now been replaced by rows of computer terminals. Where librarians once taught patrons how to navigate the broad world of information found in the bound volumes; now librarians teach customers to navigate an even larger universe available via the Internet and digital reference services.

The consensus at the Washington conference is that what took place before with periodicals and reference is now happening to books and monographs. For example, Google has been working since at least 2002 to put all books of the world into digital format. Google announced in 2010 that there were about 130 million books, and that it intends to convert all of them by the end of the decade. Google has scanned more than 15 million books to date. There are other efforts to digitize book back files, too, such as Project Gutenberg, Europeana and the Internet Archive. Such initiatives

clearly will offer unprecedented access to human knowledge, and have tremendous implications for libraries. If one can simply print on-demand or download the contents of any book, what impact does this have on the physical library as a warehouse of books?

In addition to the work to digitize back files of books, today's publishers offer downloadable, digital formats of books for personal eReaders, such as the Nook, the Kindle and so on.

In fact, with all this new technical capability available, some are calling for the creation of the Digital Public Library of America. This idea has interest from a number of academic, government and philanthropic organizations. The various backers of this new national library, and a number of interested parties, met in late 2010 at Harvard's Berkman Center for Internet and Society, which is coordinating the project. Representatives from technology companies like Google and Apple also attended.

Clearly, libraries are on the verge of change. But this isn't new. Libraries have always been evolving, and our project to establish the PCCLD Public Centers for New Information Technology is only another step in providing our community with 21st century library services. With this initiative, we will provide portable eReaders preloaded with high-quality books, tablets and laptops, and we will teach you how to use them.

We will provide additional eBook content to download onto your own personal eReader, tablet or computer, and we will teach you how to do this, too.

This is what librarians have always done. We help you navigate access to information, whether it is from a clay tablet, a papyrus scroll, a codex, a vertical file, a newspaper or periodical, a microform, a CD, a cassette tape, a VHS tape, a DVD, a preloaded MP3 or USB drive, a hard-wired computer, or, now, a wireless eReader or tablet. The formats change but the public library's role in providing free and open access to information does not.

## **Friends of the Library's Impact by Jeannine Semrau**

Although the library district collects its own tax revenue and has its own budget, library services are greatly enhanced due to funding from the Friends of the Library. What's that all about you may wonder. Here is the scoop.

The funding for library service is for basic library service, such as staff, insurance, utilities, maintenance—what many consider the basics. We are very fortunate to have a friends group, which provides support for items other than basic services, such as author programs, summer reading programs and other library enrichment programs that would not be in the library budget.

Each Friends group is unique to its area. One example includes a Friends of the Library group in California that supported a docent training program. Docent trainees took classes and learned to provide assistance for library staff. These classes covered the Dewey Decimal system, an overview of Reference, Children's and Adult Services and tours of the library. A national overview of library services, such as the National Friends of the Library and American Library Association, were also covered. Again, the docents were Friends of the Library supported, and this helped free up the

librarians to do what they are trained to do and what they do best!

Another Friends-supported program was a program called Volunteens. This program was for teens who wanted to learn more about library services, meet other readers their age and perform better in school. They learned to shelve books, run for magazines and find age-appropriate materials. Another California library had a teen group write book reviews and personal opinions about library issues, such as the first amendment. They called this, "Back Talk." Can you believe?

Local examples include purchasing furniture and fixtures for teen areas, magazine racks for Rawlings, the Read OUT LOUD! program, downloadable audio books, sponsoring library contests and providing scholarships for library employees studying library science. Remember authors brought as part of the All Pueblo Reads project—Amy Tan, Sandra Cisneros and Sherman Alexie? Guess who's a partner in All Pueblo Reads? The Friends of the Library does much more for PCCLD than is detailed within this article.
