After more than three years of hard work researching, planning, designing, fundraising and number crunching, the expansion of the library in Pueblo West is set to break ground.

Building a green library by Jon Walker

The Pueblo Citv-County Library District is breaking ground in Pueblo West on Nov. 16 for an extensive library

expansion project. The new library will be 28,000 sq. feet; large enough to serve the community today and in the future.

The new library is being designed by the architectural firm Humphries-Poli. In recent years, Humphries-Poli has designed numerous public libraries in Colorado, including Adams County, Granby, Dolores, Louisville, Phillip S. Miller, Highlands Ranch. Mamie Doud Eisenhower and Lone Tree. The principal architect for the Pueblo West library is Dennis Humphries, the 2005 American Institute of Architects Colorado Architect of the Year. This honor is in addition to 19 design awards Humphries-Poli Architects have won in their 10 years of existence. In addition to their stellar reputation and experience with public libraries, Humphries-Poli Architects was selected to design the Pueblo West library because of their qualifications to design a sustainable building.

The goal of making the Pueblo West library a sustainable building is of growing interest due to issues such as global warming and spiraling energy costs, which have been in the news more and more frequently of late. The library district believes it is simply the right thing to do to make the newly expanded library a public demonstration of responsible, energyefficient construction and design.

This library project is the first public building in Pueblo County to be registered with the U.S. Green Building Council. This is significant because they support a nationally-accepted benchmark for the design, construction and operation of highperformance sustainable buildings.

The benchmark is called Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED). LEED was created to transform buildings by providing consistent, credible standards for sustainable building. LEED has been designated by federal, state and local governments as the standard for environmentally-friendly construction.

It was important to the library district that the architectural firm selected for the Pueblo West expansion be certified to build Humphries-Poli Architects have green. earned LEED Professional Accreditation, a designation that distinguishes building professionals with the knowledge and skills to successfully steward the integrated design process that results in a green building. LEED Accredited Professionals have a demonstrated understanding of green-building practices and principles, and familiarity with LEED requirements, resources, and processes.

All of the work in selecting and collaborating with the proper architect has paid off. To date, all requirements for a LEED-certified building design have been met. When you build green, the project must be planned with six major areas in mind: a sustainable site, water efficiency, efficient use of energy, environmentally sensitive selection of materials and resources, indoor environmental quality and innovation in design. I am proud the Pueblo City-County Library District is taking the initiative to demonstrate that green buildings can work in our community.

Today, there are 32 LEED-certified green buildings in Colorado. We are pleased that the new library in Pueblo West will be added to this list as the first green public building in Pueblo County.

The second Side Door Sale at Books Again was held on Oct. 5-6, and I do hope that each of you were able to take the time to journey over there and see what goodies you could find. The shelves in the back room were packed with books of all kinds - children's books, novels, self-help, biographies, how-to, reference, religious, and so on. I worked inside the store, and I saw lots of bags of books being carried away by satisfied new owners. I could tell that the Friends would be having more opportunities to assist the library system financially because of the generosity of the citizens of Pueblo.

I was also impressed with the number of volunteers who were there to work in some capacity during the sale. Once upon a time, long long ago, I learned in a sociology class that human beings tend to classify and categorize the objects in their world in order to cope with the enormous amount of information and myriad number of people with whom one interacts every day. This leads to stereotypes, some of which are fairly correct, but others which are totally off the wall.

Please allow me to introduce an extremely unstereotypical volunteer. If you had ever thought that most volunteers are older, retired folk who have hours of time on their hands with nothing much to do, then you aren't even close to categorizing my friend Mary Colletti. While she is working, Mary stated that she might spend a few days in Wyoming and then fly to Dallas or Albuquerque, or Hawaii, or London. She has worked in all 50 states and eight foreign countries during the last 15 years that she has been employed by Skillpath. I am totally in awe of this dynamo, and also totally amazed at the depth of passion that she has for her job, her family, her home, and her volunteer work.

When I asked Mary why she volunteered, she was definitely not at a loss for words. "Because I am passionate about education! If there is nothing new in the brain, then there is nothing new in one's life!" Zig Zigler says that people need "---a checkup from the neck up." If you are not reading, then you are not exposed to all the possibilities and the people who have had the same or similar experiences which you have had." Mary's eyes snapped, and there was a hint of a frown when she continued, "If we form networks, we are more able to get along in life. We need support groups, and when other people are too busy, you can form your own support group by reading. When we volunteer, we are networking, listening, learning from others even while we are busy shelving and sorting. Life has many lessons one needs to learn."

If you should be lucky enough to visit Mary's home, you will find a lovely oasis, (in progress she says.) She is creating a fairyland through the use of trees and flowers, concrete blocks, redwood posts, plants in pots, fountains and bird baths, trellises, pergolas, and concrete figures. Her acreage is being divided into outdoor rooms that move you from one peaceful area to another. And when she removes her sunshade, wipes the sweat from her eyes and smiles that welcoming smile, then you know you are in the presence of one who is in tune with herself and her world. Mary, my dear friend, I shall give my geraniums an extra bit of fertilizer in your honor the next time I water!
