Cisneros' novel The House on Mango Street, 1984, is celebrating its 25th anniversary in print. The novel won the Before Columbus Foundation's American Book Award in 1985 and is required reading in middle schools, high schools and universities across the country. It has sold more than two million copies since its initial publication and is still selling strongly.

Both events are part of The Big Read/All Pueblo Reads 2009: A

Celebration of Latino Literature featuring The House on Mango Street by Sandra Cisneros and Sun, Stone, and Shadows: 20 Great Mexican Short Stories.

The Big Read: All Pueblo Reads is a literary program designed to get everyone in Pueblo County reading and discussing one book at the same time each year. The goals of the project are to promote literacy and encourage community dialogue across social, cultural and generational lines.

Downloadable Audio Books: Coming Soon by Jon Walker

An objective for the library for 2009 is to "provide access to downloadable audio

books via the library's website." (p.2, http:// www.pueblolibrary.org/pld_about/2009_ Approved_Budget.pdf). Library staff members have been working diligently to make this new service a reality. We feel confident it will be ready for launch before the end of 2009.

The new service will be a collaboration between the library district and an organization called NetLibrary/Recorded Books. They will provide much of the backend technology and content necessary for this service.

This new service will allow customers to download an audio book to their own portable MP3-type player simply by going to the library's website and clicking. The downloadable audio books will be compatible with many different portable music devices. A full list of devices that have been successfully tested is available at http://www.oclc.org/audiobooks/ techspecs/devices.htm.

We expect downloadable audio books will offer an exciting new way to expand library services to our community. In time, we expect to provide an expanding selection of 1,000's of downloadable audio book titles in numerous subject categories in both unabridged and abridged formats, including current best-sellers, book club favorites, classics and award- winning literature. Another advantage of the new service will include its self-service availability on your home computer 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



Byki online language-learning system

The Pueblo City-County Library District is pleased to announce the introduction of byki® Online, a powerful new online language-learning system designed specifically for use by public library customers. Byki, short for "Before You Know It," is a rapid language learning system that takes users through a series of simple steps to memorize words and phrases in a new language, including their meanings and proper pronunciation. Users will have a variety of high quality learning options that build listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills. There are over 70 languages available, including Spanish, French, Russian, Hebrew, Italian, Brazilian Portuguese, Japanese and many, many more.



Library cardholders can begin learning a new language anytime, from inside or outside of the library, by going to the library's website www.pueblolibrary.org, clicking

on "Online Resources," clicking on "Language Learning" and then clicking on "byki Online." The first time you use byki Online, you will need to register by entering your first name, entering your library card number as your username and creating a password that you will remember. For subsequent uses of byki Online, you will just need to log-in by entering your username and your password. This registration allows byki Online to keep track of what you have already learned. This is the criteria on which this award is based:

- Demonstration of noteworthy customer service
- Community outreach and programming that results in significant increases in circulation, library visits, and/or library card registrations
- Creative and effective partnerships with teachers, faculty, or others working within the same institution
- Innovative ideas and contributions that enhance the library experience
- Significant leadership in support of Colorado libraries
- Creative use of resources such as staff, money, community contacts, supplies, volunteers, etc. which allows the library to provide excellent service.

An award of this nature can only be won by team work. Every single employee of the District has contributed to the Library District receiving this award. And, I don't mean just by showing up for work.



This takes dedication, it takes caring for each other, it takes caring about every library user that comes through our doors, and it takes constant striving for better ways to serve the public's needs. As a Library Board Member I, and my fellow members, are constantly reviewing the activities of this organization. I am always amazed and delighted at how every member of this team are continually working on ways to be more relevant and responsive to the needs of our community.

Congratulations, on behalf of the Friends of the Library. I want to commend each and every employee of PCCLD for this prestigious award and thank the Colorado Association of Libraries for recognizing the ongoing journey of our Library District to achieve the highest level of service to the citizens of Pueblo County.

Good stuff about Friends of the Library by Edna Shoaf

Good fall morning to all of you good people out there. Don't the pumpkins look neat growing out in the fields? I went by a field just this morning, and it brought back good memories of my mother cutting the tough rind off a home-grown pumpkin and cooking the pulp to make pies. I don't recall that you could buy pumpkin in a can, but we never did.

I want to welcome all the new members who have joined FOL recently, especially during the October sale. We appreciate each and every one of you. Some of you have asked just exactly what FOL is and what does Books Again have to do with FOL. Perhaps I can enlighten you.

The Friends of the Library is composed of a group of people who are dedicated to assisting the Library District in any way possible to serve the public more easily and with more projects than are currently included in the Library's yearly budget. Books Again is the only way we raise funds, other than the dues paid by the members. The books which are on the shelves at Books Again have all been donated, either from people who no longer need nor want the books, or from the library when they remove older books from their shelves. Libraries have a limited amount of space to store books, so if a book has not been checked out very often, or is in rather less than mint condition, they pass along those books to Books Again. run totally by volunteers. No one, at any time or for any reason, receives a salary. The total volunteer hours at Books Again for 2008 were 6,762. I think that is quite impressive considering that we have only 25 to 30 regular volunteers. Those volunteers also are gone now and then on vacation or on various and sundry other matters. So, if we have 30 regulars, then that would make 225 hours for each person, which would total 37 days if each person worked a full 6 hours, which is how long Books Again is open each day. Wow! That is dedication!

At any one time we estimate that there are at least 50,000 books on the shelves of Books Again. During the last bag sale on October 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, we estimate that 10,000 books were sold for a total of \$6,497. Books Again presents a check to the FOL at the end of each quarter of the year. The check for July, August, and September totaled \$15,059.91. We also pay rent to the library for the use of the building, and for the same quarter the amount for rent was \$4,391.00.

Books Again opened in July of 2005. Prior to that time, the books were sold during one weekend at the University. Books had to be sorted, boxed, toted to the University, unpacked and placed on tables with leftovers placed under the tables still in their boxes, which people had to look through on their hands and knees. After the sales, the books not sold had to be

boxed and carried back to the storage building. You can't believe the work all this took, and you absolutely would not believe what the storage area looked like with only pathways between stacks of boxes of books. We have come a loooooong way, Baby!

Since April of 2006, Books Again has provided nearly \$106,000 in funds for library district projects. The projects have varied from \$438 for Youth Services signs to \$18,000 for a downloadable books program. We have funded cordless drills for the maintenance department and Audio/Visual Equipment for Lamb branch meeting room.

I hope this provides you new members, and maybe even some older members, a nice overview of who and what we are. Books and libraries are our passion and our reason for expending all that energy for the hours and hours that we sort and stack and arrange and rearrange. I would encourage you to visit us often, even to come in and say Howdy if you are in the neighborhood. Happy Reading and we thank you for your patronage. It is our privilege to serve you and also the Library District.
