All Pueblo Reads is a literary project designed to engage everyone in Pueblo County in reading and discussing one book at the same time each year. The goals of the project are to promote literacy and encourage community dialog across social, cultural and generational lines.

Read the book in September so you can attend many great events we have scheduled All Put from October 7 through November 4.

The kickoff will commence on Saturday, October 7 at the Rawlings Public Library at 1 p.m. The day's activities will include a brief ceremony, dancing to '60s music and a car show featuring cool cars from the era.

And that's just the beginning. We welcome our continuing and new community partners who have worked with us to create exciting programs for you including the panel discussions Turf Wars: Grappling with Gangs in Pueblo and Inside Outsider Art: Creativity on the Margins.

The Outsiders is also an award-winning movie starring many famous actors including Tom Cruise, Rob Lowe and Patrick Swayze. Francis Ford Coppola directed the film released in 1983.

You'll have many opportunities to view *The Outsiders* as well as many other movies based on S. E. Hinton novels.

Getting Serious About Teens by Jon Walker

We mean business when it comes to teens. It is our strategic goal to engage young people in a positive environment that encourages them to read, study and learn. We do this in recognition that this age group of people clearly represents a vital part of our community, both today and for the future.

The Pueblo City-County Library District took initial steps to beef up services to young adults with the hiring of Michael Cox, in February 2005.

Michael is the District's first-ever Teen Services Librarian. Working under the direction of Jane Palmer (Youth Services Supervisor), Michael has been a leader in helping us establish an active and successful Teen Advisory Board and in increasing the number of activities and library materials of value and interest to young adults at all library locations.

One measure of our success with this initiative is the number of young adult library materials being checked out. It has increased by 24.6% this year when compared with 2004 and 2005.

This gain in checkouts did not happen by accident. We are paying closer attention to the selection of library materials for teens.

We are providing special events to attract this age group to our libraries. For example, this summer we spent more time and energy in crafting a special reading program—called Creature Feature—just for teenagers.

We want to have places in our libraries designed with young adults in mind. This is why you see cafe-style seating, study lounge and a drink vending-machine at the renovated Barkman Library.

We are excited about grant funds from Sam's Club which we will use to establish a special teen space at the Lamb Library.

We are proud of the recent grant from the State of Colorado to help us create a Teen Center on the 2nd floor of the Rawlings Public Library designed with input from more than 200 local teenagers. This space will feature an area monitored by teens which will contain furniture to support group study projects, relaxing music, and eight specially-equipped computers designed to support podcasts plus video and audio editing software.

Finally, our proposed expansion and renovation to the White Library in Pueblo West includes teen study rooms, lots of technology with young people in mind, and, of course, plenty of space for young adult books and other library materials.

Indeed, we are serious about teens!

Playaway digital books

The library is beginning a trial project on a new form of media called Playaway digital books. Playaways are portable digital players that only weigh 2 ounces and permanently contain the audio for one book. The players will be housed at the Rawlings Library in the Adult collection.

These will check out for a period of three weeks, with no renewals. Late fees will be the same as for books. Holds may be placed on these items.

Patrons will not be able to check them out on the self checks as they are housed in locking cases which must be unlocked by circulation staff.

Ear buds will be available for purchase to use with

the player for \$1.00 at the circulation desk or customers may use their own earphones.

The library has both fiction and nonfiction titles including: *The Da Vinci Code*, *Eldest*, *Peter Pan*, *Execution*, *Wizard of Oz* and many more.



Discover the technology of yesteryear: Get to know the Linotype

Fall is here so why not make plans to visit the InfoZone News Museum and learn more about our historical printing equipment and maybe take a Linotype Lesson or two.

Until the advent of the earliest computers in the 1970s, Linotype typesetting machines were used in the process of printing newspapers and books. Three of the InfoZone's volunteers operated and maintained the one-ton machines while employed at *The Pueblo Chieftain*. You'll have great fun visiting with them about their newspaper experience and find their knowledge invaluable.

Linotype Lessons are offered at 10-11 a.m. every Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. School and group tours are also available for all ages and group sizes. Tours can be combined with the Youth Services Department or an overview of the entire Rawlings Public Library. It's an easy and fun way to learn about what your Library has to offer. 
