

How does the library stack up? by Jon Walker

We are currently considering what matters most when it comes to counting how the public library is

used. This is an important task. If we do it right, we will know better what is important for the library to be doing in order to best meet our community's needs.

Abby Koehler, one of our librarians, is helping lead this analysis. She is looking at what others say is important about today's public libraries. In doing so, she is finding some commonalities. She is examining some of the standard reporting tools that librarians use, such as the Institute of Museum and Library Services Public Library Survey, the Library Journal's Star Ratings, the Library Research Service's Annual Report, the Colorado State Library's Public Library Standards, the Public Library Association's Public Library Data Service, and Hennen's American Public Library Rating. Some interesting areas of overlap are emerging among these various and sundry reports. Some areas that all the reports agree are important include how much money a library spends on new materials to keep the collection current, how many times individual books and other

library materials check out from the collection, the number of times people visit the library, and the number of staff employed by the library. In addition to this, Abby's analysis makes a good case that there are a few more things that libraries should be watching carefully, such as how many times people use library public computers and how many people attend library-sponsored programs and events. Finally, Abby sees some areas emerging that libraries should consider counting in the future: how much digital and online materials are being used and how much library public meeting rooms are used.

I want to thank Abby for her good work. I believe if we follow up on this by focusing library resources into areas that help increase these numbers, then your library will be doing a good job. This will help insure the library survives and prospers well into the future. But, most importantly, it will mean the library is making a positive difference in the community it serves.


Art exhibition featuring J.K. Holst

Trustee Talk by Dr. Phil Mancha



Early this year, a former senior administrator of a local public school district published an article in the Pueblo Chieftain (January 2, 2011) lamenting how difficult and really unwise it is to have a citizen board

of trustees at the head of such an important part of our community as a public school district. He proposed that a school district board be filled with educational experts.

The author tells the story of a cardiologist who proposes to his patient that his heart be repaired by surgery. He tells the patient that the operation will not kill him, only incapacitate him temporarily. The decision for surgery is made by the patient.

Weeks later the cardiologist tells the patient that the hospital board decided that there was a slight level of risk and that the patient may die and they were worried that hospital insurance would not cover such an outcome. I now quote the author directly:

"Now add to this story that the hospital board was made up of a retired postal worker, a pastor, a local owner of a dry cleaning business, a local real estate agent and a farmer. It becomes even more ridiculous."

My belief is that a board of medical doctors might have come to the same conclusion as the lay-board. Experts can and do differ.

"Local control" the author writes is the problem. He asserts that local control really means local control by adults with agendas at the expense of the students. He points out that in many countries that compete with the U.S. in education have state or federal curriculum, assessment and employees, all at the local level.

My observation is that parents and adults care very much about the quality of education their children receive. Indeed, the quality of their child's education is most likely more important to parents than to experts who may make school policy from the state capitol or the nation's capitol. There is a community interest in the quality of our schools.


Likewise, there is a community interest in what a local library does and how effectively it serves its community. The population demographics impact the makeup of the collection. In a community like Pueblo, a high Spanish speaking population must be reflected in the language of the books and magazines the library buys.

The community of the Pueblo City/County Library District pays property taxes to receive library services. Library trustees have a responsibility to ensure that public money is spent consistently and fairly for all interests in the community.

The key to success with lay boards is data and the ability of the lay trustee to digest and analyze mounds of data. Fortunately for all of us, our staff consists of highly trained librarians who make day to day decisions and provide lay trustees with the data they need to make good decision, and maintain a community focus.

The lay nature of public libraries has proven to be a very successful model in our country, our state and, I believe, in our local Pueblo community.


