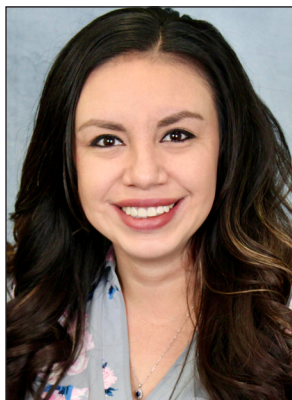

CASA of Pueblo is honored to recognize the quick-witted and charismatic Janis for her work in helping abused and neglected youth in our community. In 2021, the former CASA volunteer from Boulder County originally signed on as a CASA of Pueblo volunteer; weeks later Janis returned to fully immerse herself in our work and applied

for the available, full-time Case Supervisor position, and we are so glad she did! With the increasing number of cases during the dark COVID months, our team was grateful to have an experienced CASA advocate step into the role and take the reins. Her passion and empathy for the children and families she serves is both inspiring and moving. When her kids cry, she cries. When her parents struggle, she feels their pain too. This natural empath holds a master's degree in Adult Education and Human Resource Development from James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA and a bachelor's degree

in Forestry from Virginia Tech, VA. Prior to joining CASA, Janis served in various leadership and education roles, including working as the Director of Education for Boulder Massage Therapy Institute and as Campus Director for Arizona Integral Studies, providing students education and support in the areas of clinical massage therapy, business ethics, and mental health studies. She also spent time in Europe and Germany studying craniosacral therapy, and implementing the high-level therapy into her private practice and her training roles. She used this high-leveled body work with hundreds of adult survivors of abuse, working alongside licensed professional psychotherapists, to release and heal childhood trauma. Janis continues to play a healer role today, coordinating 20-40 CASA volunteers to oversee our record child abuse and neglect cases, providing not only support to her kids, but their families and volunteers, many of which have experienced their own childhood trauma. Thank you, Janis, for the emotional and instinctive gifts that you bring to your work in helping our kids, families, and volunteers, live healthier and happier lives toward healing. Nominated by Mothers Out Front



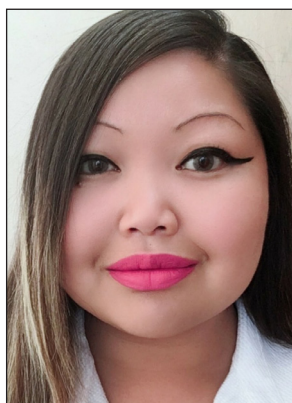

In addition to serving Pueblo families, her professional training in medicine and public health have been invaluable to countless efforts to improve the quality of life in Pueblo. As an unrelenting environmental advocate, she has provided her expertise - and a lot of hard volunteer work - to help others in the

community attain significant goals: improving our community's access to clean, renewable technologies; eliminating toxic waste in our environment; improving water quality; protecting citizens from the effects of pollution; fighting for public safety measures to curb the effects of gun violence and solving the environmental injustices that affect specific groups in our community. Megan cares deeply for each of her students which is demonstrated time and again through scholarships given, gifts and notes of encouragement in difficult times and the investment she makes in her teachers and assistants. Nominated by Lori Unruh and Ellyn Reynolds



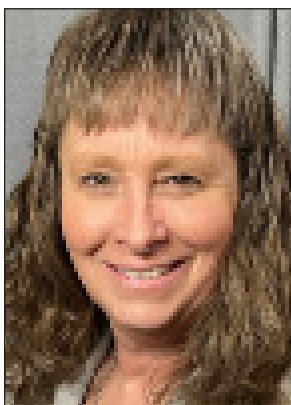

Cindy Lau

Nominated by League of Women Voters of Pueblo



In 2002, Cindy moved to Pueblo. As Executive Director for Pueblo Coalition for the Medically Underserved (PCMU), she merged PCMU and SET to create a new agency called StepUp. StepUp greatly increased the number of children and seniors that received health care and navigation services. She

created a resident driven violence prevention task force for the Sangre de Cristo Apartments. This resulted in a huge decrease in incidents of child abuse/neglect (189 in 2014 to 1 in 2017). To increase Pueblo awareness, Cindy conducted training on domestic violence and the effects of childhood trauma. Cindy has helped countless residents of Pueblo in her career as well as her volunteer work that she is still engaged in. She presently sits on the board of our local league and we are proud to have her as a member of our organization.

Nominated by Jill Kleven and Nick Potter



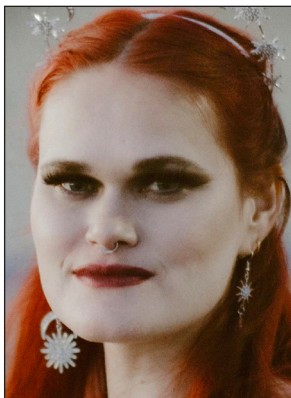
