

• Featured Program: Spice Up Your Life! Kickoff Party - 48 participants

Patrons were able to come and celebrate while enjoying free spice-tasting on popcorn/fresh steamed veggies/rice, listening to music, and planting a herb starter. Spices can be cost prohibitive for people to purchase, especially if they are not sure that they will like the flavor. Spice Library gives people the chance to try a spice without having to purchase it at the grocery store. The ultimate goal is to give the opportunity for patrons to explore an array of spices that may not be typical to their food repertoire. This builds on the Lucero branch's desire to increase the community's access to arts and culture through library programming. The library will open up the world of global cuisine to library patrons in the comfort of their own home. The Spice Library was funded by the Friends of Library Grant, in addition to a one-year database subscription of A to Z World Food. The database features 7,000 plus recipes from 174 countries. Community partners included: Cooking Matters and Pueblo Food Project.

Recovery Solutions – 30 participants

Clients from Recovery Solution visit the library twice a month to participate in making a craft/activity along with discovering the library.


