2022 Library Highlights

Sherri Baca named executive director

The Pueblo Library Board of Trustees named Sherri Baca as the new executive director and librarian for the Pueblo City-County Library District (PCCLD) by unanimous vote. She took over the position on October 1, 2022 after the retirement of long-time director Jon Walker.

Baca has served seven years with the library district, most recently serving as the associate executive director. She previously served as the district's chief financial officer and human resources manager. Baca also served as a library trustee. She is the first Hispanic woman to serve in the role.

Baca holds a master's degree in library science from the University of Kentucky as well as a master of business administration from Colorado State University Pueblo. She previously served as the executive director for El Pueblo Boys and Girls Ranch and Roselawn Cemetery & Funeral Home.

Walker, who retired September 30, served nearly 19 years as the district's director, beginning shortly after the completion of the Robert Hoag Rawlings

Public Library in 2004. During his tenure he oversaw the addition of three new libraries, championed the successful passing of ballot measure 6B in 2018, and elevated the library district to achieve state and national recognition. In 2018 alone, the district received the Institute of Museum and Library Services National Medal, was named Colorado Library of the Year and won the **Engaging Local Government** Leaders Lesley B. Knope award as the Best Public Library in America.

\$12.5 million Rawlings Library renovation in full swing

Renovations to the Robert Hoag Rawlings Public Library started in August 2021. The \$12.5 million project involves significant interior work to the four floors including refreshing furniture, flooring and fixtures; replacement of the building's HVAC systems and equipment, and creation of a terraced outdoor amphitheater and mobility plaza.

The first major project to be completed is the revamped InfoZone Museum, now located in an expanded space on the first floor.

The interactive exhibit examines the three primary communication revolutions and their impact on our lives. The print, broadcast and digital eras produced historic change in American society because of the freedom of speech guaranteed in the 1st Amendment, technological advancements and mass cultural impact.

Integrating national and local content, this exhibit helps each visitor have a historical context in which to understand how important it is to be a knowledgeable, critical and skilled consumer of information.

Floor-by-floor renovations continue throughout 2022, with a completion date of 2023. Rawlings Library remained open throughout the duration of the project, with little disruption to library services.

The 110,000 square-foot main library has hosted more than 8 million visitors since opening its doors and more than 14 million books and other materials have been checked out since opening in 2003.

Partnering in the Rawlings renovation design are two firms, Denver-based Anderson Mason Dale (AMD) Architects and HBM Architects of Cleveland, Ohio. The Rawlings Library was originally designed by internationally renowned architect Antoine Predock with AMD serving as the primary firm overseeing the project. Pueblo's own H. W. Houston Construction is charged with managing construction.



Framing has begun for the new teen area study rooms, located in the former nonfiction wing. Public access to the second floor is restricted; the public can still access other floors via the stair case and elevators.



In mid-July the Second Floor of Rawlings Library reopened to the public. The Second Floor now houses adult fiction and nonfiction, music, movies, public computers and is now home to Youth Services. Four new study rooms were added as well.

2022 Library Highlights

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

Pueblo City-County Library District partnered with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to ensure children throughout Pueblo County encourage a joy of reading at a young age. Each month Dolly Parton's Imagination Library mails free high-quality, age-appropriate books to children in Pueblo County who range in age from birth to five years old.

Parents and guardians can enroll their children for this free program at www.pueblolibrary.org/ DollyPartonsImaginationLibrary. The books are mailed directly to the child's home at no cost to the family and the books are theirs to keep. Each book is personalized with the child's name to create a gifting experience that makes books fun and exciting and to encourage families to spend time together reading. Enrollment in the program



continues until the child's fifth birthday. Inspired by her father's inability to read, Dolly Parton started the Imagination Library in 1995 in her home county in east Tennessee. The Imagination Library's book gifting program aligns with PCCLD's mission to encourage Pueblo County families to develop their child's joy of reading and to support lifelong learning at a young age.

Reading still pays: Reading Pays continues

Reading Pays: Pueblo's \$1 Million Reading Challenge returned for a second year. Pueblo City-County Library District's reading challenge offers Pueblo County youth, age birth to 17, the chance to read their way to earning \$100 during the summer. More than 9,000 kids successfully completed the program, earning a community-wid total of\$900,000. After earning their \$100, many kids continued reading throughout the summer by taking part in the district's traditional Summer Reading program. Kids earned prizes and coupons upon finishing the Summer Reading program.

Funding for the program was provided by the city and county of Pueblo through the American Rescue Plan Act to help the county rebound from the effects of COVID-19. All funds directly impacted area youth; the library district did not charge an administrative fee so all funds would go back to the community.

Reading Pays began a successful inaugural campaign in 2021 with more than 7,000 kids completing the program.

Summer Reading: Sea of Discovery

During Summer Reading, 5,500 youth successfully completed PCCLD's annual program, making it the highest number of completions.

An all-branch kickoff started the district's annual Summer Read Program during the first week of June with more than 800 attending the carnival on June 3. Due to ongoing renovations, the event was held at Rocky Mountain SER, 330 Lake Ave,

High completion numbers were due in part to a second year of the Reading Pays program, with many participants earning \$100, then continued to read their way through Summer Reading's ocean-themed "Sea of Discovery" program.

2022 Library Highlights

2022 NEA Big Read All Pueblo Reads

The 2022 All Pueblo Reads marked the 18th consecutive year for Pueblo City-County Library District's annual

literary project. Three distinct authors were featured in 2022: New York Times bestselling author Kristin Hannah, National Endowment for the Arts sponsored-poet Ross Gay and award-winning children's author Alicia Ortego. Gay is the author of a book of poetry, Catalog of Unabashed Gratitude, and Ortego is the author of the series, My Superpower Values.

The six-week long project consisted of 150 Ross Gay author programs with nearly 20,000 participants.

In a surprise move, author Kristin Hannah donated \$20,000 to go toward the purchase of 3,900 copies of her All Pueblo Reads featured book. The Four Winds as well as four other of her bestselling titles.

Due to renovations

at Rawlings Library, both the Booklovers Ball and public author talk were a virtual affair.

More than \$65,260 was raised during the Booklovers Ball, benefitting the Pueblo Library Foundation.

May 2022 to April 2023 Accomplishments

The Friends of Pueblo City-County Library District mission is "to help the library system make educational, informational, cultural and recreational services available to the public." Friends memberships and bookstore sales from the Books Again bookstore have allowed the Friends of the Library to donate more than a \$1.5 million to PCCLD for facilities, materials and enrichment programs.

Educational and Recreational Activities

The Friends had a direct, positive impact on many Pueblo County youth by sponsoring and judging creative writing and drawing contests. Contest winners received a Books Again gift certificate, a booklet of the winning entries, along with a certificate of recognition.

patron level and serves on the Friends of the Library board. She and her husband, Darrel, donate their time and money to Books Again. She often stavs late and comes in on the weekend to work on her multimedia section while also helping to manage the store.
