A. L. Dickerman died at his late home, 708 Summit street, yesterday afternoon after an illness that lasted but little more than a week. He was 75 years old, but in spite of his advanced years had enjoyed remarkably good health until quite recently. Mr. Dickerman came to Pueblo at the time of the building of the union depot and was employed on that structure during the time of its erection. He then went with the Pueblo smelter where he held a responsible position until a short time ago. Quiet and unassuming in his manner, kindly and genial in his relation to his fellow men, he was a person who was liked by all who knew him. He was born in Topsum, Vt., and was a member of the Fourth regiment of volunteers from that state during the civil war, but was not a member of the local post of G. A. R. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. P. M. Lord of Los Angeles and Mrs. Luna D. Pelton of this city, also one son, George H. Dickerman, of Price, Utah. His wife, who died eight years ago, was the sister of ex-Governor James H. Peabody and the aunt of Mrs. F. W. Cooper and Mrs. M. D. Thatcher of this city. The funeral will be held from the Whiton chapel Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Rev. Clarence W. Wayer, D. D., will conduct the services and the interment will be in Roselawn cemetery.
