Teen+

This month our new CSR Aspen Pounds hosted his first program by running the centralized teen Kokedama program, and the weekly teen and up Saturday Night Magic program welcomed a few new first timers and introduced them to Magic the Gathering.

Adult

This month was Jess Driscoll's first time hosting the Daytime Book Club, discussing the book Visual Thinking with our steady group of 16. Participants enjoyed the insight into how different brains work and learning about different thought methods which lead to a healthy discussion that tied in well with April being Neurodivergence Acceptance Month. Meanwhile Book Club After Dark discussed Bunny, which our attendees agreed was one of the strangest book experiences they've ever had and no one could decide if they liked it. For National Poetry Month we hosted a Poetry Meditation Beads adult craft which was a great time, and we will be doing it again, and a couple of our regularly scheduled Yoga classes which range from 5-14 attendees had an 80's theme for added fun!

Highlight: Earth Day Dirt Cups

Description: Make a yummy chocolate pudding treat with a parent or caregiver. Celebrate Earth Day with a dirt cup!

On Friday, three groups of mentees came in to make delicious chocolate pudding dirt cups, inspired by Earth Day earlier in the week. Two groups of tween/teens came from MiKids, a mentor-mentee program that frequents El Centro and Lucero programming as well as two adults with special needs and a caregiver. Everyone was encouraged to crush up graham cracker-bunnies and hide gummy worms in the mix. After they were finished, we played two rounds of trivia ranging from questions on math, science and history. The games had kids laughing and playing around with staff for longer than we all expected- we went a bit over time and had a blast.

Jessica

Highlight: Seed Starting 101

Description: Adult patrons were invited to come to the Lucero Library at El Centro del Quinto Sol to start planting their own seedlings with Pueblo Food Project. Instruction, materials, and seeds were provided. This program was once again a very successful program, in fact, this collaboration is a yearly recurring program for the last three years. The collaboration is facilitated by Jessica Blaha and Allison Elliot from Pueblo Food Project. We had a total number of thirty participants. Some quotes to share: "Thank you again for providing everything from the tray to organic soil to seeds to get my garden started!" -Bob; "Wow I had no idea that every library has a seed library!" -Trisha; and "I am so excited and nervous to start my garden"-Emily.

- Additional programs during the month were: In honor of April being the Arab-American Heritage month, we highlight four unique spices that one can discover in Arabic recipes. In addition to providing easy recipes using these spices.
- **Fenugreek Powder**: Powder from the fenugreek plant has a stronger, more bitter flavor than its seeds—you will find most recipes call for fenugreek seeds versus fenugreek powder. However, you can add the powder to many soups and stews with a Middle Eastern or Indian flavor profile, as the mix of other spices evens out the strong bitter aftertaste.
- **Saffron**: Saffron is the most expensive spice in the world. It is earthy and spicy, with a metallic bitterness, but it can also taste like honey and hay.
- **Lebanese Za'atar**: This is a versatile spice blend typically made from dried herbs (like oregano, thyme, marjoram, etc.), toasted sesame seeds, and sumac powder. Lebanese za'atar will often have dried orange zest in it, as well— giving it more of a citrus flavor.

Tarragon: This is a leafy herb with a sweet licorice/anise-flavor.

Chris

Highlight: Shaving cream Easter eggs

Description: We dyed Easter eggs with shaving cream and food coloring. The kids really had a good time and the eggs came out looking good. We had Kids First come to the program and even their staff members dyed some eggs. After making the eggs the kids stayed around and played with the shaving cream and had lots of fun. I also had a day where we planted Red Clover for earth day. The kids really enjoyed it and we were able to also rub the program with the East side child Care group and they had fun and upon speaking with them a week after most had said that their Red Clover was starting to grow. We made Easter egg wreaths, tissue paper bunnies, and played bingo as well. I made giant bubbles with the kids and had a steam project of making tornados in a jar which was well received.

Highlight: Servicios de la Raza (Dia de ninos)

Description: Outreach event 300 people attended. The branch was asked to attend a community event hosted by servicios de la raza for dia de ninos. The first event was cancelled due to rain. So they postponed the event until 5/09/25. This event was well attended and the branch was able to connect with the community and share library resources and a free book.

Experiential Learning

Tea Cup Crafts

For Afternoon Tea month, we used old China to create jewelry and dice boats! We acquired equipment for creating stained glass for our China Jewelry craft this month, which found our regular crafty patrons using grinders and soldering irons to create their pendants. We also brought out the UV resin with some high-powered UV lamps for filling tea cups with the resin as well as glitter, mica powders, and real tea for creating the fun illusion of a cup of tea, while being perfect rolling dice without losing it off the edge of a table or storing your findings!

Ukulele Choir

This month, our Ukulele Choir (that has been a program twice a month in the Makerspace for some time now) bravely performed at an open mic night at Walter's Brewery! Aside from some technical difficulties, they had a <u>wonderful performance</u>, especially considering that it was their first time performing the songs they had rehearsed in front of a live audience like that. I'm so proud of our Ukulele Choir, and this progress from them is proof of our programs going beyond our Makerspace and into the lives of people in our community, inspiring them to take what they learn from us further into creating opportunities!

New - Knit Along Audio Book Club

This month, to try to attract folks to our Fiber Frenzy concept, we experimented with adding listening to an Audiobook as an Activity. While the turnout was still small on the first one, we saw our numbers double on the

second time we offered it this month and the patrons offered lots of positive feedback on getting to listen to a book while working on their knitting/crocheting/sewing/etc and hanging out with fellow crafters at the library!

Museum Services

April 7: Nature's Palette - This program was in collaboration with the Pollinator poster exhibit from the Smithsonian. Attendees from this program experimented with natural materials in addition to everyday household materials to make watercolor paints. This class was multigenerational and saw people of all ages. One little boy was so excited to mix together steeped flowers, alum, baking soda, amongst other things and made the most amazing colors! Some adults were especially jealous of the green he achieved. This was a great community building event where people asked each other how they got their colors and shared paints with each other. People were grateful that they were able to take their paints with them so they can continue to create.

April 12 and 18: Pretty Plastic - This collaborative program between youth services and ELD was a success! People of all ages enjoyed watching how plastic bottles could magically transform with heat guns. They especially enjoyed making colorful Chihuly inspired bowls which were super easy to achieve. Kids who participated wanted to make more and more throughout the program.

April 16: Screen Printing - This month's designs were Earth Day inspired. Patrons expressed how the designs for this month were even better than the previous month! Since the program, attendees have returned to other programs and have shown us how they have embellished their bags to make them even more unique!

April 24: D60 Art Show Reception - Over the last three years, the D60 Art Show reception has seen a dramatic increase in attendance. In 2023, the reception saw only 185 attendees, in 2025 the reception saw 428 attendees. This event was an amazing opportunity for young artists to celebrate their talents. Year after year the teachers have said that they appreciate having the show at Rawlings.

Circulation Services

We are working hard to revitalize our old call center documents, along with our other call center locations at Giodone, the YMCA, and Greenhorn Valley so that we have a good standard of phone services across the district! We also continue to see record high use of the Rawlings meeting rooms- 220 people and/or organizations used our spaces in April which is the highest number ever. We have been very busy! We celebrated Earth month and our pollinators, April Fools, and spring time with our first floor displays and as always, our regular patrons really enjoyed the pop of color and fun facts.
