PUEBLO'S 'GRAND OLD MAN' DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

before its consolidation with Central Pueblo and South Pueblo, and following the consolidation in 1886 he named mayor of "greater Pueblo."

Later, Mr. McCarthy served two terms as sheriff of Pueblo county. The present county jail was erected under his administration.

His entrance into the work that was to occupy much of his time for more than half a century was in association with the late W. H. Sweeney. Their mortuary was operated under the name of Sweeney and McCarthy.

The present McCarthy building at 112 North Main street was completed in 1891 under his supervision.

Mr. McCarthy had long been regarded as the dean of Colorado funeral directors. He was one of the founders and a past president of the Colorado Funeral Directors' association, and a member of the National Funeral Directors' association.

WAS ACTIVE IN ALL CIVIC UNDERTAKINGS

Active in all civic undertakings, he was one of the organizers of the city's early day volunteer fire department, serving as a member of the James N. Carille Hose company No. 2, which was stationed on the site of the present McCarthy building.

His early day career also included a term in the state legislature as senator from the second senatorial district in 1907.

While serving in this capacity he initiated and successfully sponsored the bill to make Columbus' day a state holiday in Colorado.

Mr. McCarthy also was one of a group of men who were successful in the sponsorship of a legislative bill that brought the State fair to Pueblo.

TWICE URGED TO RUN FOR GOVERNOR

Altho he never sought higher office than that of state senator, he was twice urged by friends and political associates to become a candidate for governor on the Republican ticket, but each time declined to make the race.

Mr. McCarthy retired from active business participation about eight years ago because of ailing health. Two of his sons, Henry M. McCarthy and Raymond T. McCarthy, had been associated with him for many years in the firm which bears his name.

Always in the forefront of civic undertakings, he was a charter member of the Pueblo Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. McCarthy also was a charter member of the Knights of Columbus, Pueblo lodge No. 537.

WAS OLDEST MEMBER OF ELKS LODGE

At the time of his death he was the oldest living member of Pueblo lodge No. 90, B. P. O. Elks. He held membership card No. 8 in the lodge,

was one of its honorary life members, and for many years served as chairman of its memorial committee.

Mr. McCarthy was one of the organizers and a past president of the Southern Colorado Pioneers' association, and was an honorary life member of the recently organized Pueblo County Half Century club.

He, too, was a member of Sacred Heart church, the Holy Name Society and the Security Benefit association.

Mr. McCarthy was married Sept. 1, 1880 to Miss Katherine McLaughlin in a ceremony here. The celebration of their golden wedding anniversary in 1930 was a notable occasion with a host of friends and relatives participating in the event. Mrs. McCarthy preceded her husband in death, passing away Nov. 13, 1936.

HAD LIVED 56 YEARS IN SAME HOUSE

At the time of her death, the couple had resided for 52 continuous years at the family home, 817 North Grand avenue. Shortly after his wife's death, illness forced Mr. McCarthy to the hospital and much of his remaining years were spent there.

Surviving him are seven children: Henry M. McCarthy, Raymond T. McCarthy, George F. McCarthy, Mrs. J. L. Tomlinson, Mrs. Charles R. Woessner, and Mrs. Paul J. Reitermeier, all of Pueblo; and Mrs. Ferd H. Scheld of Sacramento, Calif.

Two sisters and a brother also survive him. They are Mrs. Elizabeth Harper and Mrs. August Caron, both of Oak Park, Ill., and Justin H. McCarthy of Taos, N. M.

Twenty grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive him.

Burial will be made in the family lot at Roselawn cemetery.
