His early day career also includ-ed a term in the state legislature as senator from the second senatorial district in 1907.

While serving in this capacity he initiated and successfully sponsored the bill to make Columbus day a state holiday in Colorado.

Mr. McCarthy also was one of a group of men who were successful in the sponsorahip of a legislative bill that brought the State fair to Pueblo

TWICE URGED TO RUN FOR GOVERNOR

Altho he never sought higher of-fice than that of state senator, he was twice urged by friends and political associates to become a candidate for governor on the Re-publican ticket, but each time declined to make the

Mr. McCarthy retired from active business participation about eight years ago because of alling health.
