# **Barkman Library**

# **Giodone Library**

Giodone Library graciously accepted a donation from the County Girl Scout Troop that regularly uses our meeting room. The Girl Scouts earned their Tree Promise badge by donating and helping to plant two new Crab Apple trees with the help of PCCLD's Facilities Department and matching financial support from PCCLD's Administration.







Our most popular Adult/Family Program was our first ever Godzill-a-thon. 24 people came to celebrate Godzilla fandom, make crafts, and watch Godzilla movies.

Summer Reading came to a close in August. The celebration pizza party, that Youth Services supported, brought in 32 people who enjoyed their reward for all the reading they did over the summer.

Sandy is hosting a weekly citizen preparation class that averages 6 attendees. This is a very meaningful program that will help people attain their American citizenship, and improve their prospects for employment.

Lorena hosted her monthly adult crafting group, and had 15 attendees. She attended McHarg Park's ribbon cutting in Avondale and promoted our free bookshelf that is available in the Recreation Center.

Many of our regular weekly programs are becoming mainstays in people's lives. The Crochet Club averages 8 people every week, and the weekly Tai Chi class had a recorded breaking attendance one week with 25 people.

In total we had 340 in program attendance. We had 12 public meeting room reservations and 37 study room reservations.

# **Greenhorn Valley Library**

## **Program Highlights:**

August saw our Summer Reading activities slowing down a little, falling back on branch staples with Yoga, Literary D&D and D&D After Dark, Magic the Gathering, Family Friday, Sip n' Stroke, and Story Time. Karaline joined our team and after some training did her first Story Time using the theme of color, and it was a rousing success! She has also added a Story Time Suggestion Box to the children's area and now we all look forward to hearing what the kids want. The first theme request was "Hippos." The finalists from the Tiny Art Show were also selected by popular vote and received their prizes and were displayed with their awards on them until their creators wanted to take them home.



### **Outreach:**

We stayed closer to home with our outreach opportunities this month, participating in the Back to School Carnival in the adjacent park where Ashley was a sensation making slime and the Rye Town Square Faire in Rye featuring Summer Reading samples and sign up forms. Additionally, now that we are fully staffed Ashley has resumed attending the VFC luncheon at the community center and has expanded the offerings from just a selection of adult books to include donated children's books, marketing, a setup to register new patrons, and a take and make craft. Many attendees have visited the library after these events and cannot stop talking about how much they have enjoyed the new offerings and Ashley's enthusiasm.









## **Displays:**

August was a mix of summer fun, harvest prep, Adam Sandler, and two displays promoting IdeaCon in hopes that it would build excitement and draw attention to the upcoming event. It led to a month of great variety with everything from costume making and epic adventures to comedy and recipes, and a nod to the State Faire. The Back to School comedy display was a surprise hit as families prepared for summer vacation coming to an end.





### On Deck:

We are now starting our work transitioning into school visits, welcoming our homeschool group back, and preparing to resume suspended programs as Karaline grows more comfortable in her Librarian and Assistant Manager role. We are of course looking forward to IdeaCon and hope we have encouraged our patrons to visit Pueblo to attend.

# **Lucero Library**

#### Tina

## **Experiential Learning**

### Artist in Residence

Kimberly Sewell was an amazing first artist in residence for us! Patrons really enjoyed her work and her classes, and often still talk about it when visiting the Makerspace since! She brought in cyanotype photography, including one partnering with archives to print images from microfiche and other sources, block printing, and her writing workshops, helping people learn black out poetry and how to make writings that are truly haunting. People have been talking endlessly about how cool it has been, and how great it was having her around even for the open studio hours just to talk to her about her work and process! One patron talked about finding her workshops and her talk about her series she's been working on about grief to be very healing for the losses they've been going through, and found Kim's insights super helpful.

### **Continuing Programs**

While our artist in residence was in house, we did not slow down much for our regular programing. Melissa came back for continuing our yarn making series, Rick returned to fill some gaps with his colored pencil class, ukulele choir is still going strong, and of course needle felting llamas with the few who weren't busy at the state fair that weekend. Our Writers of the Minute this month joined in on the writing workshops with our artist in residence, many enjoying getting to expand some of their thinking about their writing in the process.

## Museum Services

## **Programs:**

- •Rick Espinoza Reception Aug 1: This event, showcasing local artist Rick Espinoza, brought in new patrons and celebrated the power of community. Rick was not expecting anyone to come and was surprised when friends he hadn't seen in years came to see his work. One of Rick's friends who was indigenous also did a surprise sacred drumming performance to honor him.
- •Screen Print Aug 13: This month's screen print designs were fandom themed to prepare for the upcoming Idea Con. Patrons left with Yoda and pin trading bags.
- •Creative Writing Aug 16: Kim Sewell taught this class and utilized excerpts to talk about the various ways people can use ghosts to tell stories that are relevant to the authors. One participant said that their view of writing as an art had changed from this process and inspired them to continue expressing themselves in this way.
- Cyanotype in Archives Aug 16: This program allowed patrons to explore the 3rd floor and learn more about what items are in the Local History and Genealogy department. Patrons also learned a new and easy way to make art and were inspired to play with the medium more.

#### **Exhibits:**

- Expressions of a Native Son: This is the first exhibit to utilize the new rail system in the Hispanic Resource gallery. Rick Espinoza is a local artist in the early stages of his professional career as an artist and this allowed him to get his name out into the world for future opportunities.
- •Banned...Why?: This exhibit was created in 2024 and tells the reasoning as to why books are banned in certain areas of the United States. The exhibit allows people to make their own judgements on whether or not they agree with the banning of books and provides context and history to this trend.
- Artist in Residence: Kim Sewell Solo Show: Kim Sewell was our inaugural artist for this program. She showcased art that has been in galleries throughout

Pueblo and New Mexico that told her story.. During her residency, Kim worked on a series of pieces documenting her grief related to her father's passing.

### Outreach:

- •Youth Astro Net: This program provides training to libraries and educators to facilitate online programs for teens inspiring them to explore astrology. This year, I applied to the program and was immediately accepted. After attending training, these programs are projected to debut in December and will be accompanied with a small exhibit.
- •NASA Citizen Science: This partnership for libraries was pursued to complement the Youth Astro Net programs to expand the audience and provide opportunities for adults. These programs will also debut in December.
- •Colorado Springs Pioneer Museum: This partnership was pursued to expand museum service offerings by utilizing local entities and resources. During my discussion with the curator, I learned more about the ways they tell stories and began brainstorming future collaborative exhibits.
- •James Madison University: This partnership stems from my relationship with my mentor, Fawn-Amber Montoya, who helped me create my first exhibit at PCCLD back in 2018. Fawn-Amber is currently a professor of history in Virginia and is always looking for opportunities to teach her students about the Southwest through non-traditional ways of storytelling, such as engaging exhibits.

### **Circulation Services**

We have been working hard as a department to prepare for IdeaCon next month, so August has been quiet here on the first floor. We featured the Adult Literacy Program this month to encourage our returning learners to participate in the program. As always, the meeting rooms are busy and we have welcomed back our many girl scout troops as school is back in session! Sharon is visiting branch and department staff meetings to review library card creation best practices as well as train in some new call center policies, and we are also busy with the new hotspots!
