London, Eng., Aug. 28.—General Polivanoff, Russian minister of war announced that Russia is raising another 2,000,000 men and that the fate of the campaign will not be decided before some time next year, according to the Petrograd correspondent of The Times.

LARGE POWDER SHIPMENT FROM U. S. TO RUSSIA

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 27.—One of the largest shipments of smokeless powder ever sent from the United States will be taken to Russia on the Russian steamship Voronej, which will leave tomorrow for Archangel, via Glasgow. The shipment consists of nearly 2,000,000 pounds of the highest grade of this type of powder and is shipped in cases holding 200 pounds each.

Besides the explosives the Voronej has on board twenty-five automobile trucks shipped at New York, which were stowed in the bottom of the vessel to give her stability.

Russian military officers superintended the loading of the vessel as well as the manufacturers of the powder.
