

Giodone Library

Giodone participated in multiple outreach events in September. Lorena started back doing a monthly storytime for Ascension and Thatcher Pre-Schools. We continue our partnership with Avondale Elementary. The library district provides books for the school in exchange the community can pick up holds and checkout books at the school. Lorena hosts a weekly craft at Avondale with an average of 17 students.

South Mesa Elementary invited us to their family night, and Sandy brought our wind tunnel that she received from NASA. She was able to demonstrate how birds fly on wind currents, and it was very popular with the students and their families.

The media tech at the school, Karla Brown, had the following to say about it "Thank you so much for supporting our SME Family Night! We had 101 families attend with a total 478 people in the building for the event! The African Bird craft and wind tunnel were a huge attraction for our families. Thank you so much for your continued support of our school. "



Sandy got a lot of use out of the wind tunnel, and also took it to Vulture Day at the Nature and Wildlife Discovery Center. Where she spoke to 58 people about library services.

Lorena's monthly Coffee & Crafts program had a huge turnout. To celebrate Hispanic Heritage month they made Hojalata, or tin art is a form of Mexican folk art made by pressing delicate lines into metal and adding vibrant colors.



Candance created a September Reading Challenge that tied in with the Minecraft program, and helped us to check out more books. Kids cook earn tickets by checking out books, and win a Minecraft prize at the program. We gave out 3 prizes, but the best prize was encouraging more kids to read!



In total we had 498 in program attendance. We had 6 public meeting room reservations and 26 study room reservations.

Greenhorn Valley Library

Program Highlights:

September has been a bit more relaxed in the branch as we recover from all our Summer Reading activities and instead focused on supporting IdeaCon and All Pueblo Reads. Other than an IdeaCon Costume Workshop the weekend before the event we stuck with our staple Story Times (one of which had a special chicken guest), Yoga, Family Friday, passive Scavenger Hunt, Magic the Gathering, and Dungeons and Dragons programs while supporting the return of the Happy Hookers fiber arts group, the Science Wednesday homeschool being back in session. One of the regulars at our kids' Dungeons and Dragons group had to move away, but has continued to participate virtually through laptops with webcams. Daytime Book Club discussed Braiding Sweetgrass, and Book Club After Dark wrapped up Final Girls Support Group and worked on selecting our books for next year. Our visit from Hickenlooper's office was not well attended but did have a couple grateful participants.



Outreach:

The Greenhorn Valley Branch really hit outreach hard this month as Ashley began teaching Yoga classes at the elementary school and bringing in library information as well as visiting the middle school and high school at least once a month to spread information about library resources and bringing in some to-go activities. We have continued to attend the SRDA luncheons with Ashley providing crafts and activities for the seniors there, Karaline is working with teachers at different grade levels about the possibility of starting in school book clubs, and I am working with Tech Services to try to figure out a way we could get holds on books for students marked to go to the schools. Additionally, I participated in a ribbon cutting ceremony for Congressman Miles Lucero's weekly remote office hours out of Colorado City.

Displays:

This month we had several light Fall reads (and puns), unique magic systems, emergency preparedness, staff picks, and of course Banned Books Month and Hispanic Heritage Month. We are starting to integrate digital materials in our displays when possible. Karaline also suggested we move one of our displays previously used for DVDs and set it up in the children's area for a youth mixed media display which has been an exciting change. Rain had some days with lower attendance, but much of their programs and open studio times saw people who were quite excited and told me that they're art and classes were just wonderful! Rain taught people not only how to work with Posca markers, but also some basic drawing techniques for getting your drawings to come out more the way you envision them. Even when their classes only had a few people, I saw those few eagerly asking questions and utilizing their expansive knowledge of art and drawing to further their own craft. I have even had some patrons emailing me questions about drawing and various mediums that have kept the conversation going beyond the class! Rain truly captured the imagination of several of their students, and the end of their residency was bittersweet. We will have to bring them back for some more classes here and there come next year!

IdeaCon

In the early moments of the event, we were a bit worried about attendance numbers, but fortunately they picked up in the afternoon. It was loads of fun, the variety of events we had on offer meant there was something for everyone and lots of people went out of their way to let me know that the event was super awesome! We had some of the vendors report really good sales, and Sydney reported that over a thousand buttons were made at her station, with the button making and pin trading being quite popular! The community partners we were able to bring in for the event really enjoyed it, and I saw lots of them have deep conversations with passersby. Over all, I received a lot of positive feedback from various folks that were a part of or just attending the event. I did get some suggesting that we offer it in November so that it would be easier for our folks from the farms to participate since their work is pretty done for the year at that point and they can focus on costumes and fun a lot easier then. One conversation I had with a local teen was especially notable. This teen in particular always comes to the library and this year was her first year entering the cosplay competition. She was so excited to tell me about her outfit and show me other art that she likes to create. She was very inspired by the event. There were many other teens who I saw having the time of their life in the library and this was especially touching considering this was who the event was originally intended for when I worked on this event when I was a teen. The vendors were also equally as appreciative of our efforts for putting this on and Sharon and I received a kind, heartfelt letter following the event.

3D Printing Classes

These went really well. The first one had a lot of attendance, and while figuring out how best to help everyone learn has been a bit of a learning curve, Jeremy from Thinker's Alchemy has been doing an amazing job and patrons have been talking about his class all month saying that they really learned a whole lot from him!

Museum Services

Programs:

9/6/25 Dia de los Abuelos (Tortilla Demonstration): With the Tortilla Making Kit based out of Museum Services, I provided demonstrations of traditional tortilla making to include a brief history of traditional cooking tools. In addition to the demonstration, participants were able to take home a baggie full of ingredients to make their own at home. This was a great multigenerational activity and allowed grandparents, parents, and children to bond and share their own stories of tortilla making.

9/18/25 Ristra Making: This fan favorite class filled up immediately and nearly everyone showed up for this event. In the planning of this event, I was very fortunate to meet Rocky Musso from Musso farms, who kindly gave us a significant discount on the supplies for this program. The participants were so happy to take home this year's ristra made with Pueblo chiles and even learned a new method compared to the method used last year.

9/20/25 Leather Basics with Sonya: Sonya has consistently filled up her leather basics class. Every participant has left not only with a new pouch or card holder, but with skills using heavy duty hole punchers for grommets and hammers. Participants have appreciated the opportunity to make something new.

9/25/25 Latino/a/x Book Festival (Zine Making): While many participants were locked in with the amazing author talks on the 4th floor, my part of the program was intimate and fun. One patron, who was at the library for a whole other reason, came in as she felt drawn to my presence and activity. She sat and we talked, as we talked I learned that she was a part of a coalition in Colorado dedicated to encouraging youth to go outdoors.
