Barkman Library

Programming of Interest:

Halloween Storytime: Getting ready for the in-building Trick or Treat. A special Storytime allows children and family to gather together for a special costume Storytime gathering to enjoy a brief spout of Trick or Treating inside the library and enjoy creating craft together.

Barkman Halloween Craft Bash

Over 50 attendees showed up to make a variety of crafts which included self-portrait ghosts, and slime. It was so popular that next time we'll just focus on a wide variety of slime. It also took 90 minutes to clean it all up from the tables.

Musical Busted Canvas

Program presenter Penny Jerman demonstrated different busted canvas cut styles. Instead of using an asterisk type style, you can use other cuts like an "I" to display it as if curtains are opening up from the canvas to display some amazing different colors and musical styling.

Idea Forge Makerspace shenanigans:

Included many musical designs such as Popsicle Stick Harmonica, Paper Towel Rain sticks, and Pan Flutes. All "instruments" designed from household items, brought great joy and interest in all the program attendees, and a few well-meaning noise complaints from fellow patrons.

Community Outreach and partnerships:

We continue to partner with Jordan Residential and had over 50 participants this last month having a good time with Fall Themed Crafts. Our attendance has grown from the usual 40 to almost 60 people attending!

Haaff Elementary Preschool has joined our monthly visiting storytime line up. It has been several years since we've been invited to visit. It was very exciting to be back visiting them.

We have created a new contact/partnership with Shannon Shatzer who presented "Spooky Folklore." Very knowledgeable, folk lore, legends of the world, their origins, and cultural impacts. It was such a great program we are trying to invite her back for more.

Giodone Library

Staff Update – Daniel Vigil who has worked at Giodone for close to 4 years was promoted to the Technology Trainer position at Rawlings. He will be missed greatly at Giodone, and we will be conducting interviews for the CSR 2 position in November.

Outreach – Lorena conducted a weekly story and craft at Avondale Elementary. Kayci gave out candy to 127 kids that came out to Pueblo County Parks Trick or Treat Trail at the St. Charles Mesa Recreation Center. Lorena presented storytime to Ascension Preschool and Thatcher Preschool. At Thatcher Preschool Lorena reported that the 3-year-old class kept asking for more books, and she read through all 10 books that she brought!

Program Highlights – Our annual Chile Ristra program is always popular. We bought a bushel of chiles from Musso's farm and showed people how to tie them up to make a Chile Ristra which is traditionally hung as a decoration that symbolizes good luck and hospitality, and also used for cooking.



We hosted several guest speakers in October. The Story of the Stradivarius of the West was well attended with people enjoying this program at the Giodone Branch. Things That Go Bump in the Lore had a staggering 21 people in attendance thanks to our guest lecturer that spoke about spooky traditions around the world.

Patron Details – Library IQ shows that we had an increase in new people registering for library cards over last year at the Giodone Branch.

Greenhorn Valley Library

Program Highlights:

October was a big month for us at Greenhorn Valley Library as the valley embraces spooky season. This month we had two murder mystery programs, one run by Ashley Swald where patrons had to solve a murder at sea and the other run by Aspen Pounds where the murder was on a train. Both programs were an amazing time and fully attended, and most importantly the murders were solved! We also had the centralized sugar skull program thanks to Youth Services which everyone loves, themed Family Fridays, a Spooky Storytime, Pajama Yoga, an in-game Murder Mystery with the adult D&D group, and the kids D&D group fought the Headless Horseman as special Halloween characters. Our Daytime Book Club covered the All Pueblo Reads book, but the Book Club After Dark read Never Whistle at Night which is a spooky indigenous story collection.



Extra Special Program:

Credit goes out to Ashley Swald who added a spooky twist by sending the Stuffed Animal Sleepover attendees on a ghost hunt and wrote a full story book about their adventures for the kids to bring home!



Outreach:

The biggest event of October in Rye is always Halloween Town, and the library has had the honor of being a big part of it every year. This year was no exception, and Karaline got to experience her first Halloween Town by handing out books and treats to the at least 700 attendees that visited our booth.



Additionally, Ashley provided weekly Yoga classes as an outreach event at the Elementary school, has started bringing materials and activities to the High School at lunch at least once a month, and continues to visit the Community Center bi-weekly for the SRDA luncheon with books, library marketing, and crafts.

Displays:

We kept up with the spooky and fall theme with our displays, along with some tributes to Artober, unique magic systems, musicals to go along with All Pueblo Reads' musical theme, and of course the greatness of bats!

Highlight: Fear Factor Food Challenge

Description: The Fear Factor Food Challenge during the week of Halloween. 41 Children participated. Tina purchased a variety of foods to challenge the kids after school with and see who could eat all of the items in order to be named Fear Factor Champions (and receive a small plushie for their efforts!). The food was creatively named for the spooky week- for example “Werewolf Meat” was sardines, “Bioluminescent Fish Eggs” were popping passionfruit boba and we had seaweed, jellybeans and real flavored grasshoppers! Elementary aged kids to middle school had a blast. Many kids who at first wouldn’t even look towards the choices were intrigued once their peers dove in and everyone who came in the room tried at least two items. Parents were laughing along with the kids and two Boys and Girls Club teachers thanked us for the “highly entertaining program” that helped break up their afterschool activities across the street. OUTREACH

Aaron welcomed Congressman Jeff Hurd into the department, accompanied by Sherri Baca, Nick Potter, and local House staff. All received a tour of the department, including highlights of materials and services offered. We toured the vault and explained services. Hurd appeared impressed with the department and his staff took several photos of the Congressman interacting with staff and collection materials.

LHG staff welcomed 50 middle school students from Villa Bella Expeditionary School, and learned about archival/history research and how to use newspapers on microfilm to find information.

SPECIAL PROJECTS, INITIATIVES, NEW PARTNERSHIPS

Shared Memories

- Arrangements were made to install equipment and train staff at Pueblo West.
- Blake continued work on the Shared Memories Omeka sites, getting each site for each partner institution up to a usable state that the public will be able to interact with and contribute to. This included the creation of webpages, graphics, and collecting forms for each site.

Genealogy Projects

- Checked in periodicals: 33 issues (from mail + donated + found unprocessed in vault)
- Prepared fourth bindery shipment for 2025
- Completed Sons of the American Revolution book donations
- Reviewed donation offering from Books Again and checked items against catalog. Accepted 81 books and submitted them to Tech. Services for cataloging and bindery
- Shelved 72 returned items from bindery
- Finished incorporating census indexes into reference collection and shifting collection.
- Completed moving Hispanic genealogy periodicals in vault into reference collection.
- Joy worked with LHG manager and TS management and staff to increase discoverability and browsability of Genealogy materials in the open stacks of LHG. New shelving locations were planned to better accommodate locating and shelving materials by region.

Digital Archives

- The Digital Memory Lab Photo station was used for five sessions during the month by a patron scanning/preserving their family photos.
- The Digital Memory Lab AV station was used for six sessions among three different patrons where they digitized and preserved VHS and 8mm film materials documenting their family history
- Blake completed metadata for Umatic tapes digitized with FOL grant funds and published them to CONTENTdm. This work increases access to historical films documenting the work of the PCCLD organization.

Physical Archives

- LHG staff welcomed CSU-P students and Pueblo Historical Society volunteers into the reading room to access John Korber history binder materials for the purpose of history article writing.
- Our DU intern began working in the Department, arranging historical materials found in a large collection of papers from Aguilar, Colorado. Aaron R. has been mentoring the intern in archival practice and guiding the work which is working towards increased access to collection materials.
- LHG/PCCLD bid farewell to Librarian Archivist Alisha Cunzio through outboarding processes and hosting a going away reception where Rawlings staff participated.

Makerspace Services

All Pueblo Reads Programming

The necklaces at our station ended up being a big hit at kick off! All month, people have been wearing them around town. Lots of folks who came up to our table asked us how much it costs, and were surprised when we said it was free! It's something that has been happening more and more lately, folks asking how much it costs when we do programs or events, and we've been telling them it's free, but donations through official means are always appreciated.

New Programs

Alyssa hosted a few new and original ideas in the Halloween theme, as well as Melissa returning with her fiber series. Alyssa's programs were pretty well attended, and Melissa brought in a decent number herself. People really enjoyed learning to ply their yarn, and are very much looking forward to our more refined series we're doing starting in January!

Craft-along audio book club

Craft-along audio book club saw a bit of an explosion in attendance this last round, with lots of new faces coming in with crafts as we continued listening to the Hafling Harvest. Seems as the weather is slowly cooling down, folks are enjoying as many cozy vibes as we can create!

Table Top Gaming Club (TTGC)

The Table Top Gaming Club continues to be pretty Magic The Gathering focused, with lots of attendees advocating for becoming more serious about training for big competitions. They seem to be having a lot of fun and attracting new members with this strategy.

3D Printing Classes

The 3D printing classes are remaining strong with new attendees each class, and lots of people are enjoying getting to learn and experience the fun of 3D printing without having to commit to doing a whole big print. Most enquiries are more the curiosity of the cool tool than serious orders, and the class seems to be working to satiate that for people.

Ukulele Choir

Ukulele was back and forth on attendance this month, likely due to the uncertainty around scheduling as Claire got married this month. They did perform for Kickoff and everybody really loved their performance!

Bookings

We are seeing an increase in bookings from the community, both during the week, and people utilizing open hours for projects. Since I usually help folks during these, I've been counting them as one-on-ones since that's been how it's been going. SCA is really discovering the space and taking full advantage of it, but also we seem to be getting more entrepreneurial folks who have been excited to expand on things they learned in our programs, with one coming regularly to use equipment as she starts her business and slowly acquires the tools she needs herself!

Museum Services

Exhibits

Boys and Girls Club Art Show: The boys and girls club had their first annual show at the Rawlings library that featured over 100 pieces by local youth. The reception took place on October 14th and many of the BGC branches brought their students to view their work. Many students smiled with pride to see their art. The reception even featured a mandolin player that brightened the kids' days. Throughout the show, the community informed me of how inspired they were by the kids' art and couldn't believe how creative our community was.

Programs

October 8 - Braids and Tradition: This multigenerational program was put on to support activities around Hispanic Heritage Month. Through this program, grandmothers, mothers, and daughters were able to learn about Oaxacan braiding while facilitating open conversations about traditions in their family's lives.

October 8 & 25 - Leather Basics: Sonya, our new facilitator, has forged amazing connections with our patrons. Every class she held, she filled with patrons of all ages. One of the best parts of her classes is that she builds skills in her patrons. Once they attend one class, they are able to attend the next class with more and more vocabulary and expertise.

October 9 - Bootiful Bookcraft: This program was in partnership with Adult Services and encouraged patrons to find beautiful ways to create their TBR lists. The first half of the class, patrons were encouraged to learn about the library's databases, specifically novelist.

October 21 - Villa Bella Expeditionary 3rd Grade: This group of students came to the library to learn about various challenges found in learning. During my tour of the building and InfoZone, students asked many questions about how the library worked. Their favorites were definitely exploring the AMH room and watching historic TV moments.

October 23 - Victorian Hair Art: This program told the story of how historically, people without money would create displays to remember their loved ones with their loved one's hair. While disgusted at the thought, patrons used faux hair to learn the challenging art of creating hair flowers. While we faced a few bumps in this activity, many patrons worked hard to perfect their pieces and left with beautiful displays. They even went home to try and make more.

Outreach/Professional Development

October 1 - El Pomar Conference: El Pomar is the organization that provided me with the opportunity and scholarship to attend Leadership Pueblo earlier this year. At the conference, I volunteered and welcomed guests from all over Southern Colorado. My main takeaways from this conference were about AI in leadership. The keynote emphasized how AI is every changing and to grow and be an effective leader in non-profits, it is essential for staff to understand how to prompt AI. It is projected that staff who don't learn AI now, will not grow in comparison to those that do.

October 22 - History Colorado/Ute STEM Exhibit: On this day, I picked up the Ute STEM exhibit to be put up at the Greenhorn Valley branch at the beginning of

November. While there I was welcomed by the History Colorado staff and talked about upcoming changes to their exhibit spaces. They informed me that for next year's 150/250 celebration that they would be producing a traveling exhibit that we would be able to print off and use for free.

Circulation Services

As we do every year, we celebrated the spooky season in fine style with decorations, costumes, and handing out candy as a support to the costume parade! We love Halloween and Dia de los Muertos in ELD and deeply appreciate supporting the celebrations at Rawlins. We also hosted a polling place here for the first time as a department and have a new appreciation for the work that goes into organizing and controlling an election! We also made new friends and connections with our polling place staff.

The Reference Librarian will be launching a new Book Recommendation service that is available on the PCCLD website now! This includes personalized book recommendations based on a questionnaire that patrons can fill out online.
