Team Programming: Outreach Specialist Penny Jerman teamed up with Lucero's Outreach Specialist Jessica Blaha to bring forth the cheese! A specialized Charcuterie Program was organized and offered to the community. This program was designed to inform the public about affordable low to non-cooking options available to them. Comments from attendees include; "Jessica and Penny were very approachable, awesome; want more classes like this; fun and hands-on; well-organized; fun; well-planned; and we need more educational cooking."

Giodone Library

Staff Update – Carlos Gonzales, who had been a substitute for the library district for several years, has been promoted to our CSR 2 at the Giodone Branch. We are excited to have an experienced CSR in this role.

Outreach – Lorena conducted a weekly story and craft at Avondale Elementary with an average of 18 students. Lorena presented Storytimes to Ascension Preschool- 48, and Thatcher Preschool.

Program Highlights – Thanksgiving holidays and travel can make programming a bit tricky during the month of November. We had several popular Kits2Go and passive programs available to make sure that we had fun activities for families whenever they had the time to stop by. Some of the kits that were available included: Dia de los Muertos, painted wooden Wicked crafts, Dinovember, Fall Break crafts, Puzzle Swap, Sticker Mosaic and a Turkey Scavenger Hunt. We had a total of 278 participants in our Kits2Go!

In a program partnership with Storytellers of the Ancestral Red Road (SOAR) they presented us with a beautiful sign, that was co-created at a library program, to display.



Our in-person programs were successful as well. For our adult craft class participants made gift cards for their holiday presents.



Circulation Details – Library IQ shows that we circulated close to 40,000 items so far in the last 12 months. That Giodone has less than 1% of items that haven't circulated in 3 years. I included stats for Avondale, Vineland, and County High as those act as hold pick up locations for our area.

Greenhorn Valley Library

Program Highlights:

The team and patrons at Greenhorn Valley Library got to enjoy a fantastic combination of Indigenous Heritage and some dinosaur fun this November (or Dinovember as many know and love). We had story times and crafts that highlighted different Native American cultures and art, and thanks to Karaline and Ashley plenty of literature was provided for future information and education about both the art and the cultures that it came from. We also had a dinosaur story time and a very popular dinosaur terrarium program, as well as a dino themed scavenger hunt with special flexi prizes that we 3D printed in-house just for this month. Karaline took point this month on our Daytime book club's discussion of Fellowship Point, and the Book Club After Dark read Raised by a Serial Killer after wrapping up our indigenous short story collection from last month. As usual we also had our two increasingly popular D&D programs (the kid group played out the Battle of the 5 Armies from The Hobbit), Magic the Gathering, multiple day options of yoga classes, a junk journaling program for adults, and "adult show and tell" where patrons could bring in their treasures and talk about them. A few of our items included an albino lobster, some toy cars from WWII Germany, and a phrenology head. We also got to host a month-long Ute exhibit thanks to the Museum Services department!



Outreach:

This month Ashley continued her outreach at the VFC Community Center, a weekly class at the elementary school, and her monthly visit to the high school. In addition to her usual outreach materials she brought to-go kits of the dinosaur terrarium for the high school students and the students were so excited about it that she ended up coming back to the branch with a wait list of students who wanted one and she ended up swinging by the school again with a dino delivery the next week.



Displays:

For November we made sure to dedicate our main display area to Native American Heritage Month featuring indigenous authors in a variety of genres, another display highlighting Indigenous Wisdom. We also made sure to focus on food, fall, and dinosaurs along with a dedicated display for Newberry Medal winner books, Diane Keaton, dragons, empathy, and more.

Fiber Arts

We brought Melissa back for a class on making and using a lazy kate for its various functions in yarn making, which went really well with a lot of people expressing excitement about us bringing the program series back in the new year. Sharon was able to teach the long requested knitting classes which people seemed to really enjoy. We had most of the crew who attended the first session return for the next,

with a few newer folks jumping in, but they seemed to be able to keep up with the lesson.

Museum Services

Exhibits:

Ute STEM at GHV: This exhibit has been much appreciated by the patrons at GHV. Feedback I have received for this exhibit has been very positive and patrons of all ages have engaged with the material. The day the exhibit went up, I was able to witness some homeschool students immediately gravitate towards the interactives. The staff at GHV have also been helpful in ensuring that during or after programs, that their visitors take a peek. They have reported that patrons have been very intentional about reading every panel.

Pride and Patriotism: This exhibit was in collaboration with District 60 and the Home of Heroes Association. Through this partnership, grade school children were able to artistically express how Veterans day impacts their everyday lives and show appreciation for the sacrifices people have made on their behalf.

Teen/Tween Art Show at Barkman: This is the first time that the annual Teen/Tween Art Show has been held at a location other than Rawlings. Patrons at Barkman enjoyed the display as it encouraged other youth to make art and created a beautiful outlook on the local community

Programs:

Quilt Witch Hats: The quilt witch hat program provided patrons with a fun sewing challenge. Patrons of various skill levels learned about the challenges of sewing, but also experienced the joy of having a final product that is useful and cute.

Closing Reception for Rick Espinoza: Rick Espinoza has been a wonderful addition to our 3rd floor gallery. His artwork brought many people to our library. For this event, participants ate cookies and talked with the artist, but the most special moment was when Rick's dear friend gave a blessing to the library, staff, and patrons, which he did in his native language.

Frybread and Film Night: This event was a bigger success than expected. While we had some technical difficulties with our heating element at the start, patrons were so happy to learn how to make frybread for their upcoming holiday feasts. We even had a very special visit from a local group that helps those with special needs to prepare to be out on their own by attending cooking classes and work ready activities.

Circulation Services

November has been a relatively busy month in circulation as we celebrated Native American History with our displays and posters, made our floor welcoming with Thanksgiving decor, and helped celebrated Dia de los Muertos by lending our staff's hands and talent to support the building's program! Our meeting rooms have been

booked solid through the month with our usual cast of characters and we have recovered well from hosting our very first election polling station. The day of the event went smoothly, thanks to security and the front desk staff as well as our wonderful civic volunteers. We are looking forward to the holiday season!

YOUTH PROGRAMS:

Family Program:

Tween/ Teen:

The "Build It!" program successfully implemented the Makedo kits, providing an openended experience focused on creation and initiative. The program was designed to encourage youth to use simple tools to build anything they imagined from cardboard. This highly engaging format also proved popular with caregivers, who actively participated alongside their children, resulting in a dynamic, collaborative event that effectively promoted critical thinking and hands-on learning. Big Events:

Our annual Día de Muertos Celebration was a vital and well-attended cultural event for the community. The celebration served as a vibrant and respectful space for remembrance, bringing together families to honor departed loved ones through traditional arts, music, and activities. A central feature of the event was the community Ofrenda (altar/offering), which provided a special place for patrons to contribute photographs and memorabilia, deepening the personal connection to the celebration. This annual program successfully provides a valuable opportunity for community connection and meaningful engagement with heritage. We saw 150 in attendance.
