# SIGNATURE PROGRAMS

### ALL PUEBLO READS

The 15<sup>th</sup> Annual All Pueblo Reads' featured book was *In the Time of the Butterflies* by Julia Alvarez.

Alvarez was also the young adult companion book author. Students from both school districts received free copies of her book *Before We Were Free*.

For younger readers Roni Capin-Rivera Ashford author of *Miguel and the Amazing Alebrijes,* visited children at Columbian and Villa Bella Elementary schools. PCCLD provided more than 600 classroom copies of the book.

The 2019 All Pueblo Reads consisted of 233 programs and events over a five week period. These communitycentered programs encompassed more than 20 community partners . A few of the key offerings included an exhibit held at Rawlings Library titled Return of the Corn Mothers, a young reader companion book with school visits by the author, and three in-person author events featuring Julia Alvarez.

Alvarez was featured at the November 8 Booklovers Ball, public author talk and

a private reception for 60 members of the Boys and Girls Club of Pueblo County. This year, the Booklovers Ball hosted 246 attendees.

The morning following the Booklovers Ball, more than 110 patrons engaged with Alvarez in an author talk, book signing and photo opportunity that was free and open to the public.

Total participation for the month-long literacy project was 38,826.

## **SUMMER READING**

PCCLD's Summer Reading program had a total program attendance of 21,250 for ages 18 years and under and 3,334 for ages 18 and older. The theme for this year's program was "A Universe of Stories."

Kickoff parties started the district's annual Summer Read Program during the last week of May and the first week of June; more than 1,600 attending the Rawlings Library opener on June 7. On the same day, more than 300 attended the NASA lunar rock exhibit "To the Moon and Back."

High attendance was due in part to automatic registration for Pueblo School District 60 and Pueblo County School District 70, new tween and teen program offerings, more hands-on and collaborative programs, Books in the Park and inclusion of the annual Kids Parade and the first Party in the Park- which served as the reading program's finale on Aug. 10.

## **READ OUT LOUD!**

Author Debbie Dadey was the featured author for the 10<sup>th</sup> annual Read Out Loud program. During the span of two days, Dadey presented to 3,517 school children from 23 area schools at Rawlings Library. She is the author of 166 books that have sold 43 million copies. Her work, *Vampires Don't Wear Polka Dots* is the first volume in her popular Bailey School Kids series.

# 2019 HIGHLIGHTS

### **BALLOT ISSUE 6B PASSAGE**

In the November 2019 election, Pueblo County voters passed ballot measure 6B — an initiative to continue a mill levy in support of public libraries throughout Pueblo County — by a nearly 60 percent 'yes' vote.

Continuance of the 0.6 mill allows the district to expand the collection of library materials — both physical and digital materials — as well as begin the process of refreshing library locations.

### **GROW WITH GOOGLE**

Rawlings Library played host to Google's traveling digital skills education lab, Grow With Google. The all-day event offered attendees free training and resources to help expand and grow their skills, careers or businesses. The event was extremely successful with approximately 400 community members attending.

Pueblo Mayor Nick Gradisar, State Sen. Leroy Garcia and Gov. Jared Polis made appearances at the event.

## **STAR LIBRARY**

In 2019, the District was awarded "Three Star Library" status by the Library Journal Index of Public Library Service.

The 2019 LJ Index derives from data released by the Institute of Museum and Library Services. A total of 6,333 U.S. public libraries qualified to be rated in the index, 261 of which were named Star Libraries — placing the district in the top 3.5 percent of all libraries nationally.

This recognition also affirms the dedication to planning, accountability and service of those involved with the district in recent years plus strong support from the community.

## **XCEL GRANT**

Pueblo City-County Library District received a \$20,000 grant from the Xcel Energy Foundation to create the exhibit "Exploring Steel, Energy and the West: A Touring Exhibition."

The exhibit will feature the history of Colorado Fuel and Iron and Evraz steel manufacturing in Pueblo and the region. It will also focus on the role of energy and electricity in the story of manufacturing steel and iron, and how they played a critical role in the economic and social development of the American West from the 19th century into the future, as well as a more recent look at the energy industry's transition from coal to renewable energy

# 2019 HIGHLIGHTS



The inaugural Southern Colorado ADA Symposium featured 15 breakout sessions throughout the day.

## SOUTHERN COLORADO ADA SYMPOSIUM EVENT

PCCLD and Rawlings Library hosted the inaugural Southern Colorado Americans with Disabilities Act Symposium with more than 150 people attending.

Opening the all-day symposium was a history of the ADA and the independent living movement given by Dawn Russell from Denver's Atlantis ADAPT and Kristen Castor from Colorado Cross Disability Coalition. Throughout the day, participants had 15 breakout sessions to choose from, a vendor fair featuring 25 area agencies, film screenings and an interactive simulation room. A keynote luncheon, sponsored by the Colorado Trust., featured comedian, author and ADA advocate Nina G.

A generous gift from the Friends of the Library also provided captioning and American Sign Language interpretive services for the event. The day was a celebration of accessibility, diversity and inclusion in Pueblo County and was further recognized by the Pueblo City Council and the Board of County Commissioners, who issued a proclamation declaring August 2019 as ADA Awareness month in Pueblo City and County.

## **CORN MOTHERS**

A traveling exhibit, The Return of the Corn Mothers: Inspiring Women of the Southwest is a collection of portraits and stories of those multi-generational and multi-cultural women who embody this spirit of community. They work and live throughout the Southwest, Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and northern Texas.

## **NEXT FIFTY INITIATIVE**

The Next Fifty Initiative awarded PCCLD a \$10,000 grant to fund a new project geared toward adults age 50 and over named, Creative Aging. This project creates maker and artsbased learning opportunities for residents of Pueblo County.

Funds from this grant are used to hire local artists and makers to facilitate weekly workshops, as well as to purchase materials and equipment to create maker kits.

The 6<sup>th</sup> annual Latino Book Festival featured authors. Kali Fajardo-Anstine, Juan Morales and Steven Antonuccio. Library locations throughout the district created displays for Hispanic Heritage Month and the book festival.

## **IDEA CON**

IdeaCon 2019 took over the four floors of Rawlings Library for the day, filling the public spaces with of comic book and superhero themed fun.

More than 900 attendees were able to enjoy a cosplay costume contest, vendor booths and demonstrations ranging from robotics to medieval battle skills.

## EDUCATIONAL AND RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES

• Judged 1,290 entries in the 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Scary Story Contest. The winners received a booklet of the winning stories, and a gift certificate to Books Again.

Sponsored the Friends of the Library Youth Creative Writing Contest with 35 entries.

• Sponsored the Create Your Own Dr. Seuss Character Contest by providing Books Again gift certificates to the winners. Winners also received a booklet of the winning entries. There were 1,366 figments of students' imaginations received!

• Judged the 23<sup>rd</sup> Annual Poetry Contest and awarded winners with Books Again gift certificates, a booklet of the winning entries and a certificate of achievement. This was the first year this contest was held online only, due to public health safety and closures.

• Judged the Up with Reading Bookmark Contest and awarded the winners with Books Again gift certificates, 20 copies of their bookmark and a certificate of achievement. This was the first year this contest was held online only, due to public health safety and closures.

- Donated \$6,500 to Pueblo City-County Library District's Summer Reading program.
- Donated \$5,000 to the youth reading program.
- Donated \$11,500 to the library district for the All Pueblo Reads program.

## INFORMATIONAL AND CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

• The Project Selection Committee of the Friends awarded funds that totaled \$23,935.68 to fulfill 28 grant requests from library employees.

• Provided \$3,000 towards the printing and postage of News & Events. The newsletter is an important communications tool for informing the community of library programs, new services and Friends' activities. The newsletter reached more than 20,000 people and organizations last year.

• Selected Leslie Carroll and Evelyn Clayton as their honorees for the Outstanding Women Awards in celebration of Women's History Month.

Awarded five scholarships to library district employees seeking a Masters of Library Science.

## GENERAL FUND revenue and expenditures

NOTE 1: Revenues and Expenditures are reported for each of the governmental fund types. Fund-based financial data is focused on reporting current financial resources. These are resources that are generally available for and spent on current year activities. The Library District maintains a General Fund for operational revenues and expenditures and a Capital Projects Fund for facilities, improvements and expansion.

NOTE 2: The Statement of Net Assets reports current and long-term financial resources of the Library District as a whole, representing the Library District's Balance Sheet for primary government activities. Net assets invested in capital assets represent the net book value of facilities, furniture, equipment, computers, vehicles, software, books and audiovisual materials. Restricted net assets represent emergency reserve requirements. Unrestricted net assets represent cash and other net assets available for operational expenses and capital improvements. Amounts reported are net of applicable debt.

**Note 3:** As of Dec. 31, 2019, the District's proportionate share of the Colorado Public Employees' Retirement Association (PERA) net pension liability was \$7,780,649 and the District's proportionate share of the PERA net OPEB liability was \$652,981.


#### CHARGES FOR SERVICES, SALES, FINES, INTEREST \$213,471

Fines charged for overdue materials, photocopy charges, meeting room rental fees, sales of flash drives, ear buds, book bags, etc. and interest earnings on investments.

#### **OPERATING CONTRACTS, GIFTS**

\$358,190

E-rate reimbursement is nearly half of this revenue, also considered federal funding. Rent received from Friends for the book store, as well as miscellaneous grants and gifts, including significant contributions from the Friends of the Library, are also included in this line.

DEBT SERVICE: PAYMENT ON BUILDINGS \$810,700 Semi-annual payment of principal and interest for the COP financing for three new libraries and refinance of Pueblo West Library.

**OPERATIONS:** CONTRACTS, ADMINISTRATION, etc. **\$915,423** General operating expenses such as library and office supplies, professional memberships, contracts, county treasurer's fees, postage, couriers and photocopier expense.


### INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY: COMPUTERS, etc. \$410,942


