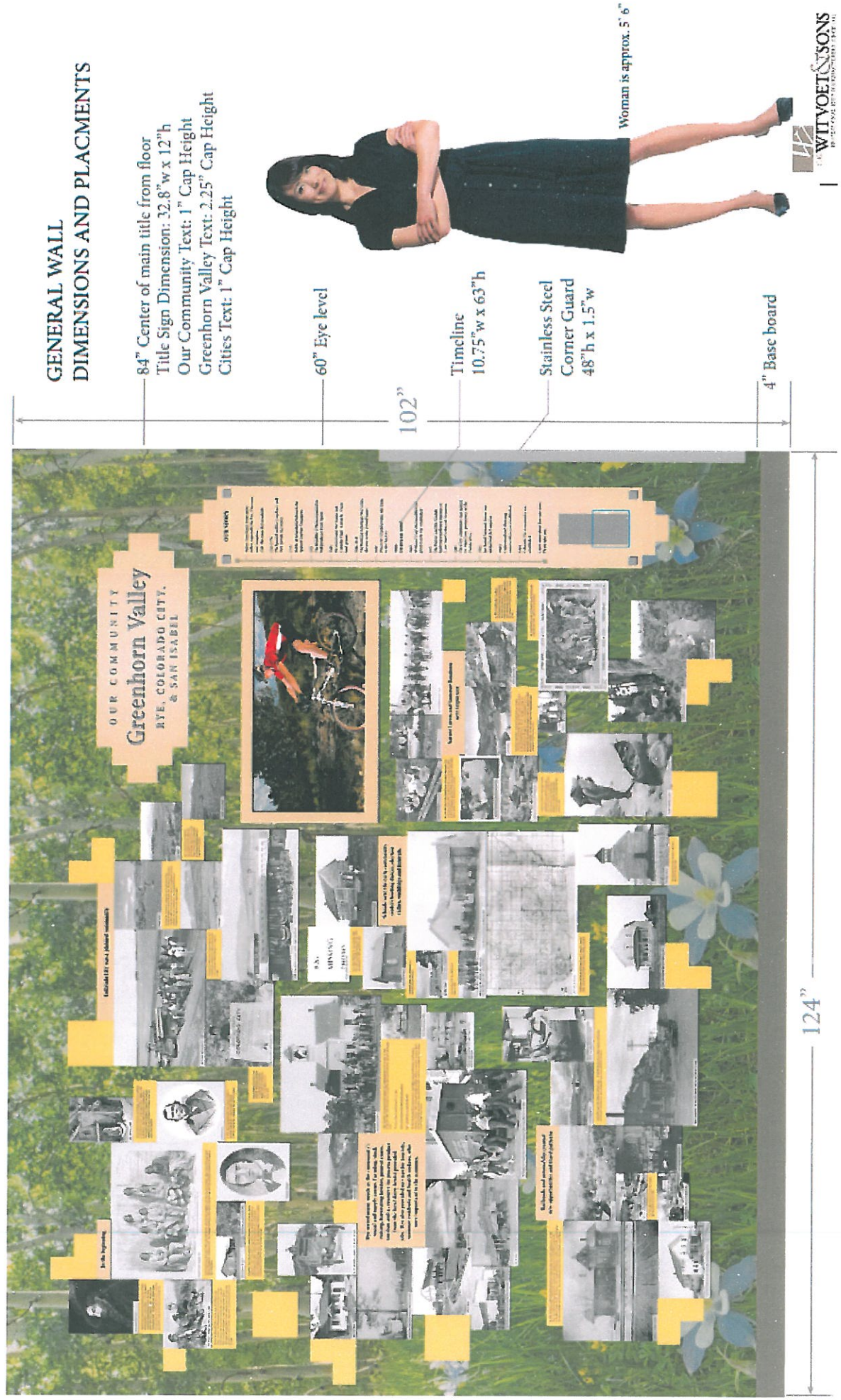
- Permanent interpretive exhibits located in the lobby of the 3 new libraries

- Approved budget: \$45,000



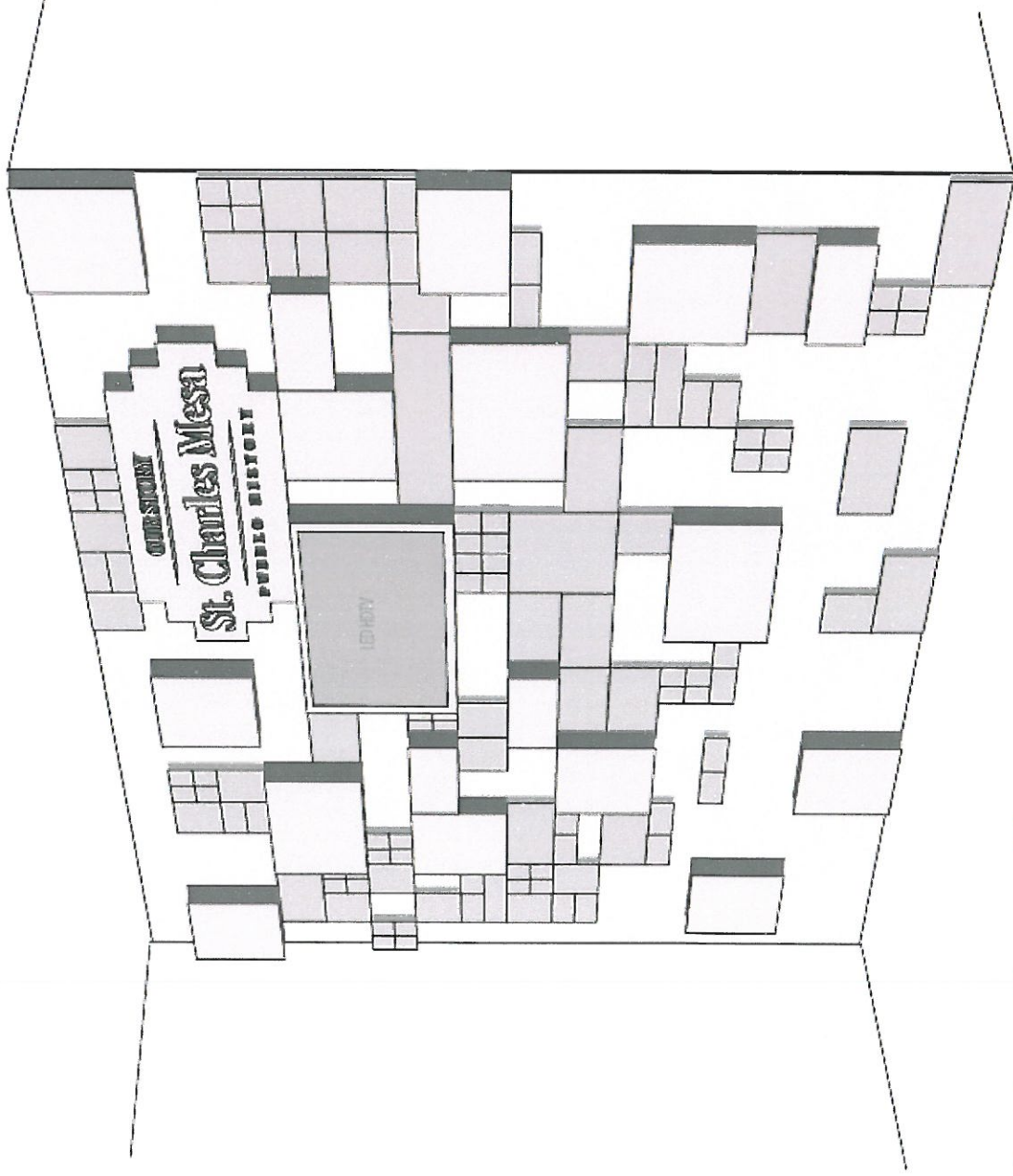

This view is to provide a visual explanation of the layers. By removing the photos from the design, you see how the multiple layers appear.

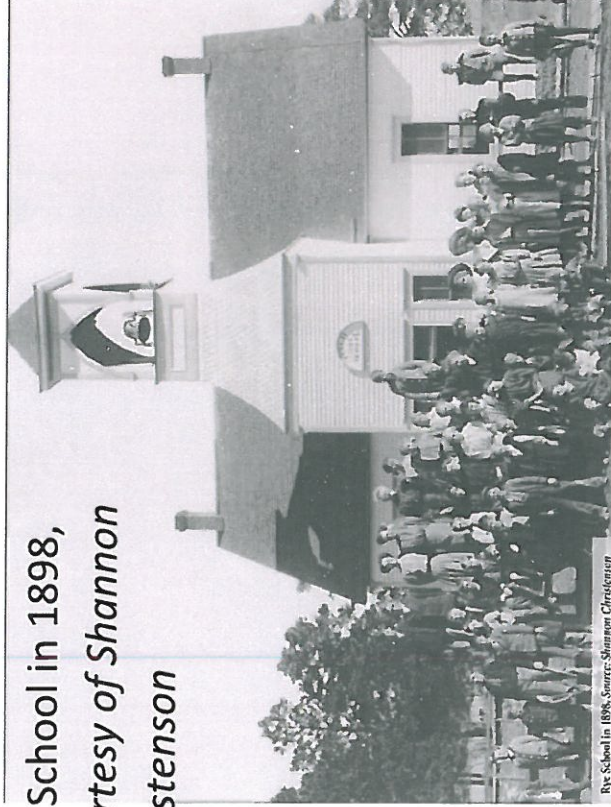

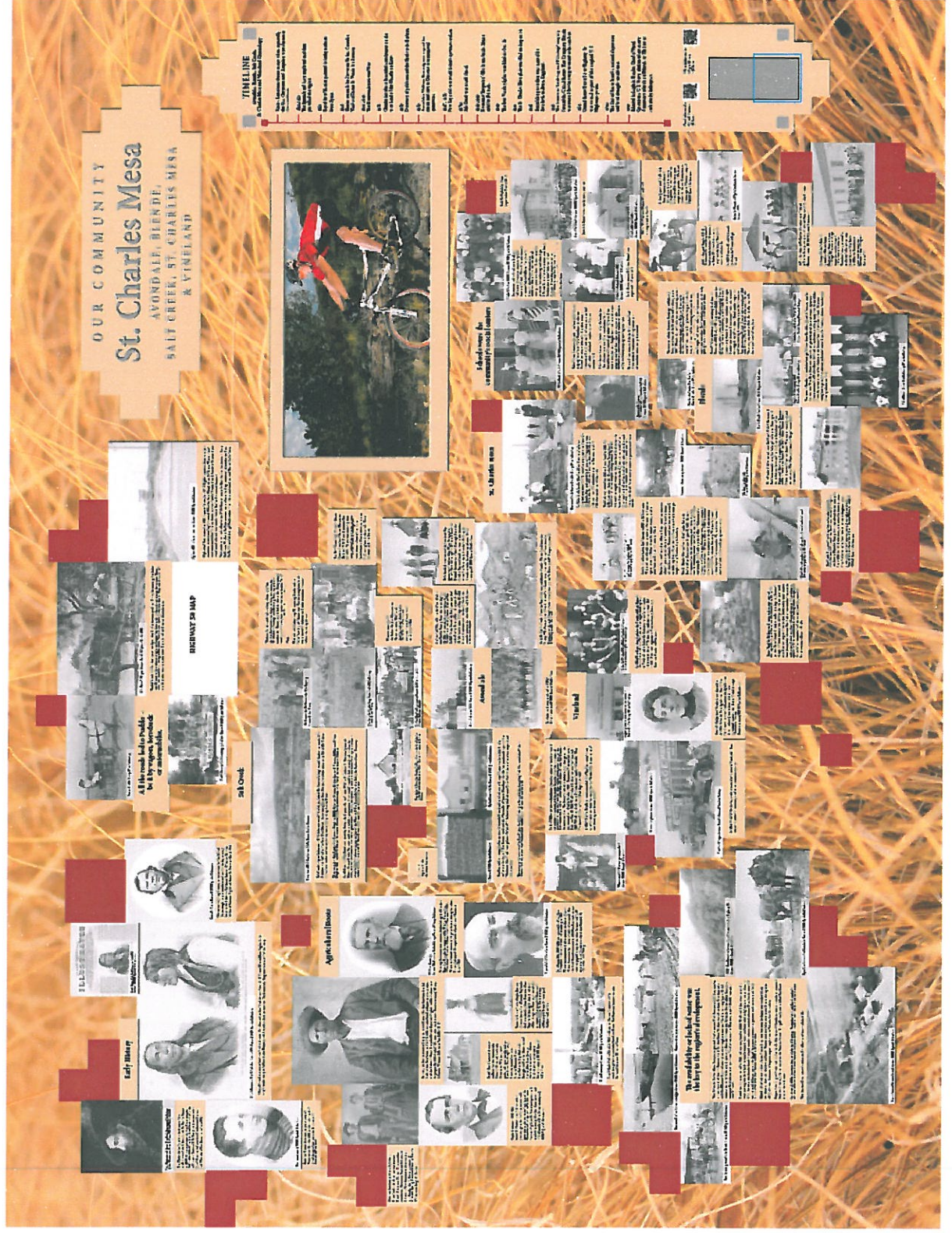

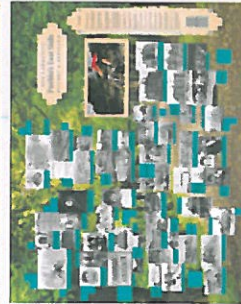

Greenhorn Valley History
by Joanne West Dodds

Physical features:

Greenhorn Peak is 12,347 feet, the tallest in the Wet Mountains.
North Peak (commonly called Baldy and sometimes Turtle Mountain) is 12,220 feet.

13,060 B.C. to A.D. 1900 - Native American occupation and trails included Prehistoric cultures such as the early to late Folkson and people making parallel-baked points, Archaic, Woodland, and Puebloan. Later tribes included Plains, Apache, Cheyenne, Ute, Arapaho, Comanche, Kiowa and Pawnee.

1541-1779 - Spanish explorers whose routes passed through what is now Pueblo County included Francisco Vazquez de Coronado (1541), Don Juan de Arce (1644), Diego de Vargas (1606), Don Juan de Chabarra (1776), Gov. Antonio de Valverde (1779), Col. Don Pedro de Villaseca (1720), Gov. Juan Bautista de Anza (1779).

TIMELINE

1850s - The region is part of the Santa Fe Trail, a major trade route between the East and West.

1860s - The region is part of the California Gold Rush, with many miners settling in the area.

1870s - The region is part of the cattle industry, with many ranches established in the area.

1880s - The region is part of the agricultural industry, with many farms established in the area.

1890s - The region is part of the mining industry, with many mines established in the area.

1900s - The region is part of the oil industry, with many oil fields discovered in the area.

1910s - The region is part of the Mexican Revolution, with many battles fought in the area.

1920s - The region is part of the Prohibition era, with many speakeasies established in the area.

1930s - The region is part of the Great Depression, with many people migrating to the area in search of work.

1940s - The region is part of the World War II era, with many military bases established in the area.

1950s - The region is part of the Cold War era, with many nuclear power plants established in the area.

1960s - The region is part of the Civil Rights Movement, with many protests and marches held in the area.

1970s - The region is part of the Environmental Movement, with many conservation areas established in the area.

1980s - The region is part of the AIDS crisis, with many people dying from the disease.

1990s - The region is part of the Clinton administration, with many policies implemented in the area.

2000s - The region is part of the Bush administration, with many policies implemented in the area.

2010s - The region is part of the Obama administration, with many policies implemented in the area.

2020s - The region is part of the Biden administration, with many policies implemented in the area.

Scope of Work

The scope of this proposal is to solicit recommendations from a qualified architectural or design firm for programming; schematic design; design development including furniture specifications and information/directional signage; and construction documents for remodeling the 2nd floor of the Rawlings Public library. Considered in the plan are the arrangement of greeting, information, circulation and technology areas that tie into the newly designed brand awareness and facilitated customer service model incorporated on the Rawlings Library's 1st floor and PCCLD branches. Also considered are shelving and display units; furnishings and signage; and design elements that will simplify workflow, convey a welcoming environment and improve customer service. All things considered, the outcome of the project is expected to create inviting atmospheres that attractively highlight the library materials and service areas and provide better supervision on the floor.

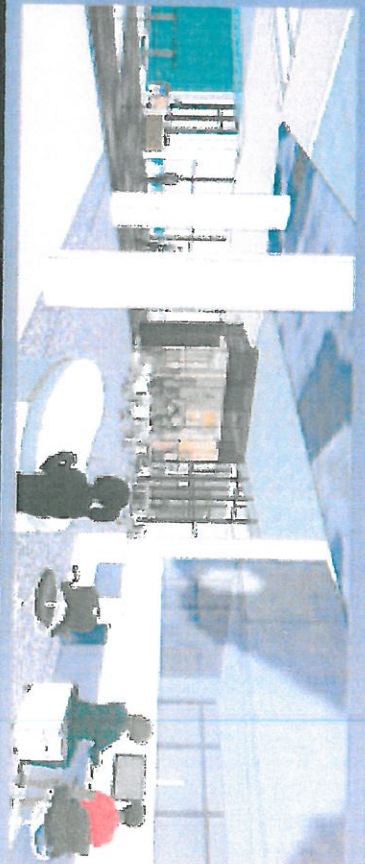
1. Selection of Architectural/Design firm and Contractors:

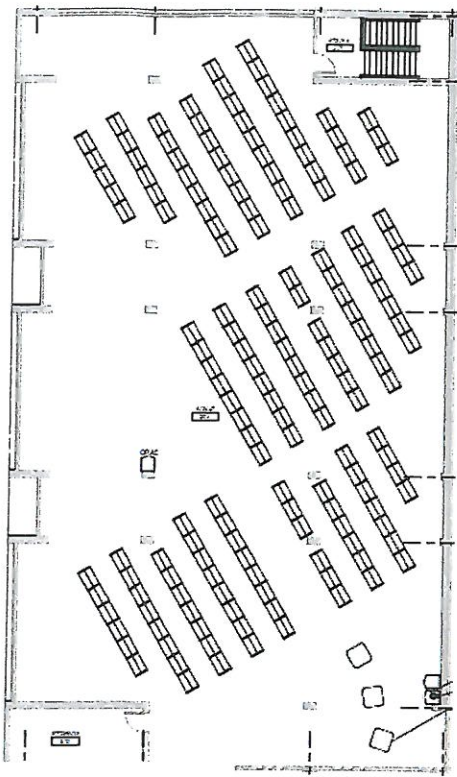

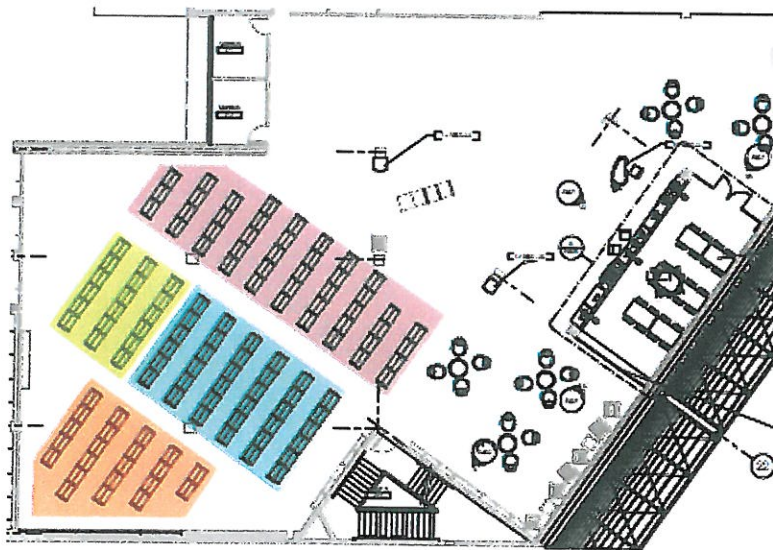


New Floor Arrangement

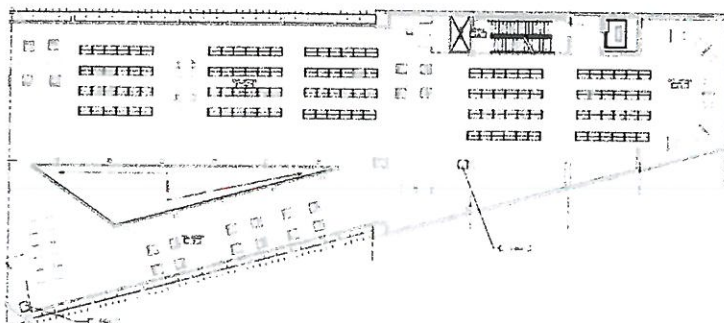

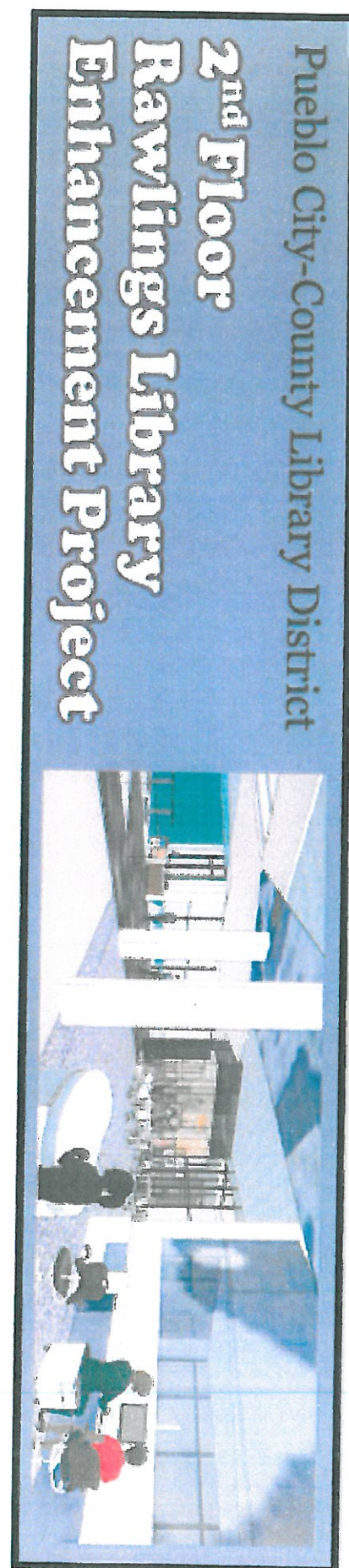


COMING SOON!

- Newly organized “sky wing” with Large Print and Fiction collections.
- Additional space for customers to sit, read and use their own devices.
- A remodeled Non-Fiction section with a newly carpeted, attractively arranged area for browsing.
- A spacious technology/media center where computers, iPads, DVDs, CDs and other media can be found.
- New Teen Central area.
- A glassed-in Makerspace used for creation, collaboration, innovation and entrepreneurship.

In order to complete these renovations, the second floor of Rawlings Library will be closed in February. Computers and often-requested materials will be temporarily moved to meeting rooms on the first floor for continued browsing. Staff will be available to facilitate holds for access to additional materials.

Watch for the announcement for the grand opening of the exciting, new area of this library.

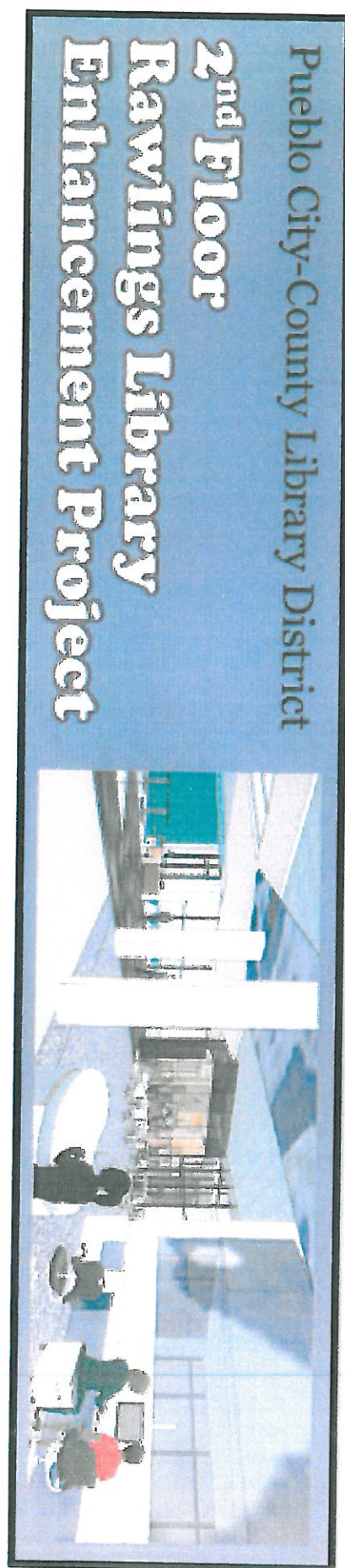


What's Next?

Movin' and Construction

Rawlings 2nd floor will be closed to the public on Monday, February 3, 2014. Limited materials, computers and services will be moved to the 1st floor – Circulation and YS Departments.

- ✓ January 27th – OPAC stations, RRA staff computer, copy machine and change machine set up in temporary area on 1st floor.
- ✓ January 27th – Fiction, Non-Fiction, Large Print books returned to the library will be shelved in the Thurston Room on the 1st floor.
- ✓ January 31st (after closing) – Public computers (30 stations with print release station) relocated to Bret Kelly Room B and other areas of the library by IT Department.
- ✓ February 1st (after closing) – DVD collection, Fiction Audio Book collection and device charging carts relocated to Bret Kelly A by RRA staff.
- ✓ February 1st (after closing) – Small desk items and ready reference resources located to Bret Kelly A and RRA workroom.
- ✓ February 3rd – Reference and Readers Advisory services offered on the 1st Floor

- ❖ Improved greeting and information areas that tie into the Dedicated Customer Service Model
