Flexibility to add eContent

- In 2009 we had VHS, Books on Tape, Books on CD, and DVD's
- In 2012 we're also purchasing Blu-Rays, Videogames, Playaways, and devices like iPads, laptops, and eReaders
- In 2009, PCCLD eContent mostly databases and a few older ebooks
- In 2012, eContent included OverDrive eBooks and eAudiobooks, Freegal books and music, and databases



eContent

- 2009 Print 53%
 AV 34% (DVD and Book on CD)
 Digital 12 % (Databases)
- 2013 Print 37%
 AV 31% (Playaways, Blu-Rays, Videogames)
 Digital 28% (databases + ebooks, eaudiobooks, emusic, emagazines and evideo)

Increases self-service

 Use of holds increased by 9.3% since floating was implemented in 2011. In 2011 we filled 124,397 holds, in 2012 it was 135,981



Refreshing collections

Currently limited to anecdotal evidence.
 Frequent customer comments about always seeing "new" materials at their branches. Also frequent similar staff comments. A new product (CHQ) will allow us to be more specific in our analysis in this area.

Reduces courier travel

 Courier handling reduced by approximately 30%, as measured by the number of totes travelling throughout the district on any given day. In 2011, it was approximately 38-40 per day, now it is approximately 28-30 per day



Reduces staff handling

 No need to return materials to their "home" location when returned to the library. Less staff material handling equals fewer repetitive stress injuries, and wear and tear on materials.
