in order to find out the 'who,' " Klismet said. By focusing on why such crimes were committed, investigators gained insight into the patterns and traits of those behind the murders and sexual assaults.

Noting that he worked on some very high profile cases during his time with the FBI — and assisted numerous law enforcement agencies throughout the Midwest

— Klismet's expertise
in the profiling field
became superlative.

"Does profiling work all the time? No, it doesn't. But I was never wrong," he told the students.

Klismet's appearance at PCC also served as a pep talk of sorts. Noting that his ascent to multiple college degrees as well as a career with the FBI and later as a college instructor began at a community college, Klismet told the students, "You are me. I respect what you're doing. You want to better yourself and so did I.

"It's a marathon and it's not run in six months. But I hope you stay with it because the rewards are well worth your time."

When property values in a PURA zone increase, the authority takes that initial increase in property taxes as revenue to pay for further improvements during the life of a development area, which is typically 25 years. But the taxing districts also get a larger share over time because of the growth in property values.

Even so, taxing districts have complained about losing needed revenue. PURA has argued that without the urban renewal area and the resulting investment, there wouldn't be any growth in property values and revenue. The

two sides have been at an impasse for years. PURA's Executive

Director John Batey said an unwelcome twist in HB1348 is that it calls for an outside arbitra tor to oversee a financing agreement if PURA and the other taxing governments cannot come to terms.

Speaking as president of the Downtown Colorado business group, Batey protested that the major sponsors of HB1348 are lawmakers from affluent areas like Boulder.


"They don't need urban renewal areas to spark growth," Batey said. "Cities like Pueblo do."

Jon Walker, executive director of the library district, said the bill — if Hickenlooper signs it — will be a step forward.

"Right now, the district has \$250,000 in revenue diverted to urban renewal and we haven't had a voice in that," he said.

Kathy DeNiro, D60 board president, said she was pleased with the legislation and called it a positive step. "It will be nice to have a seat at the table in making decisions about our revenue."

#### Governor will sign bill shaking up urban renewal

Gov. John Hickenlooper will sign House Bill 1348 this afternoon — a far-reaching measure that will force the Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority to consult and negotiate with Pueblo City Schools (D60), the Pueblo City-County Library District and even the Pueblo County commissioners in creating new renewal districts and the revenue they create.

When he was in Pueblo a week ago, the governor acknowledged he was being lobbied heavily on all sides of the urban-renewal question. His office confirmed Friday that he will sign the legislation at 4:30 p.m. today in his office.

How urban renewal authorities deal with other local governments has been a contentious issue for several years. The purpose of a renewal authority is to generate new development in blighted areas by recruiting investment. As property values increase, the authority typically keeps a portion of the growth in property taxes as funding for more development in that zone.

D60 and the library district have challenged that traditional financing method, saying they don't get enough of the growth in property tax revenues during the 25-year life of a renewal zone. PURA's response over the years has been there wouldn't be any growth in revenue without the authority and its investment ability.

HB1348 says renewal authorities must make room on their governing boards for representatives of the taxing districts they affect and all of the parties must negotiate how to share the tax revenue created. If a sharing agreement can't be reached, then a third-party arbitrator is consulted.

The prod in the bill to encourage cooperation is the bill says that if no sharing agreement can be reached, the surrounding city must also match the revenue contribution of the other governments involved. Given that city governments appoint renewal boards, that is a strong incentive for Pueblo and other cities to see that a revenue-sharing plan is agreed upon.

County Commission Chairman Terry Hart said the bill was a good compromise for all the parties involved.

"This gives us a voice at the table when new zones are created," he said.

Jon Walker, executive director of the library district, credited PURA with trying to be more cooperative with local governments but said the new law guarantees cooperation.

"This year, we've had about \$250,000 in property tax revenue go to PURA projects that we never had a say in," he said. "This has to be a step forward,"

#### Unnecessary changes

GOV. JOHN Hickenlooper late last week signed into law a bill that increases bureaucracy and could slow the process for critical urban renewal projects.

Newly signed House Bill 15-1348 changes the way urban renewal organizations negotiate the terms of Tax Increment Financing, or TIF, districts.

Ostensibly, the law was intended to level the playing field for special taxing districts that could have a stake in urban redevelopment. It did so by reserving a seat at the table for schools, libraries, counties and other taxing bodies that could be impacted by the redevelopment, but for which the fiscal benefits wouldn't immediately be felt.

To explain, TIF districts are a financing tool that allow for the redevelopment of blighted urban areas. Here in Colorado, urban renewal authorities like our Pueblo Urban Renewal Authority, may issue redevelopment bonds and then repay them by collecting the incremental tax increases generated by the redevelopment, according to documentation released by the Colorado Legislative Council. Governmental agencies that tax the TIF district — say, local school districts — would not see the taxing increase until the bonds are repaid.

More simply put, when the property in a TIF district is redeveloped, its value and the taxes it generates increase. The urban renewal authority collects the boon to repay the bonds, while tax rates levied by the governmental agencies in the district remain flat. It's a formula that has worked for Colorado since 1975, according to the legislative council.

But HB1348 unilaterally changes the time-tested approach by adding legal hoops and bureaucratic red tape.

It does so by requiring that the special taxing districts get a place at the table in the contract negotiation process. That's fine and good, until you consider that the law also dictates that the various parties go to mediation if all parties' goals are not met. Which, in all likelihood, will just increase the cost while slowing down a critical revitalization process

Moreover, these obligations are in place despite the fact that urban renewal authorities are not required to make any sort of special provision for special taxing districts in their TIF contracts.

So it's easy to see why HB1348 raised the hackles of more than two dozen cities, towns and urban renewal authorities from across the state, including the Pueblo City Council and the Colorado Municipal League. Here's what the municipal league, a nonpartisan lobbying and advocacy organization representing Colorado's community governments, wrote earlier this month in a letter asking the governor to veto the bill:

"HB 1348 is flawed legislation that will create significant problems as all stakeholders seek to interpret and implement it. ... Existing projects worth millions of dollars in jobs and infrastructure, as well as future projects that will widen the tax bases of all taxing entities, are in jeopardy."

Or, as City Council President Steve Nawrocki pointed out in a similar letter:

"The third party mediation provision can be expected to be time consuming, with greatly increased potential for arbitrary results and a high likelihood of public controversy over the decisions to be delegated to unelected persons. ... The ambiguity of the language will inevitably lead to unsatisfactory results for all parties — cities, counties, and districts."

Sadly, the governor did not heed those woes, and instead signed the bill in a quiet ceremony in his offices at 4:30 on Friday afternoon. Given the controversial nature of the new law, it's no surprise that even the signing was conducted away from the media and outside of the public eye.

Here's hoping that the dire warnings of the city of Pueblo, Colorado Municipal League and agencies most effected by TIF programming across the state don't come to fruition. Only time will tell.

#### Sensible urban renewal reform

When Gov. John Hickenlooper vetoed a bill reforming the state's urban renewal process last year, he said it went "a step too far."

So legislative proponents this year presented him with a somewhat milder measure, and to the governor's credit he signed it Friday over the objections of cities and urban renewal officials.

As a former mayor himself, Hickenlooper no doubt appreciated the opposition. The status quo works to cities' advantage and they would prefer to leave it alone.

But it was high time to give counties, schools and special districts a bit more leverage when urban renewal projects affect their bottom line by diverting property tax revenue to pay off infrastructure needed for the municipal development.

House Bill 1348 was a bipartisan effort that mandates mediation when the parties can't agree on a tax formula for the project. It was a sensible change in the law.

### Steamboat's downtown Urban Renewal Authority comes at the expense of local schools

Colorado citizens may be surprised to learn that over \$770 million in property tax money has been redirected away from schools to locally formed Urban Renewal Authorities (URAs) across the state. Recent trends are even more concerning, with nearly half this amount occurring in just the last 5 years.

How do a select few city council members override the thousands of ballots that allocated this money to local education funding? To combat what Colorado law defines as "slum and blighted" areas which "contribute substantially to the spread of disease" and are "injurious to the public health."

Areas like Vail's Lionshead Village, where skiers can pay up to \$145 for a lift ticket before retiring to \$500 a night hotels like the "Country-Club style" Marriott. Declared as blight and slum by the town's city council in 2003, a URA was created that has cost Eagle County schools over \$10 million in local property tax revenue.

Shortly thereafter the Steamboat Springs City Council declared its ski area base a slum and formed a URA in 2005. Some of the first redevelopment projects included the razing of Ski Times Square, which remains demolished to this day, and One Steamboat Place, which faced foreclosure a year after opening.

A more recently proposed project is the "Iconic Barn Entry Sign" which bears the Steamboat Ski & Resort Corporation's logo at the taxpayer's expense.

Some say the URA created as much blight as it eliminated. It currently diverts over \$400,000 a year in local property tax revenue away from the school district while also increasing property taxes outside the URA to cover the school mill levy overrides and bond payments that are not paid for by new development within the URA or backfilled by the state.

The Steamboat City Council is now looking to enact a second URA downtown. Most council members have questioned the existence of actual blight and slum, with one member calling such a declaration "ridiculous." And for good reason. Over 200,000 square feet of downtown redevelopment has occurred in the past decade with city tax reports showing between 8.6% and 12.3% retail sales growth across both winter, summer, and mud season.

Despite the area being so obviously popular that it fails to even remotely match the legal requirements for enacting a URA, a public hearing has been scheduled for June 16th to charge forward.

The original project scope included \$350 per square yard pavers, \$200,000 in art, and a restroom costing more than the average single family home in the area. To pay for this, at least \$500,000 in local property tax revenue will be redirected away from the schools to a city who recently counted more than \$10 million in excess cash reserves on hand.

And just like with the mountain, property taxes outside the URA will increase for the mill levy overrides and bond payments.





These are local examples but they impact schools across the state, including yours.

Every dollar the state spends backfilling diverted property taxes is a dollar that can't be divided among all of the other school districts. The \$773 million in cumulative URA backfill represents \$4.3 million per district. Just the \$82 million spent last year is nearly a half million dollars per district. What could your schools have done with an extra \$500,000 last year?

All of this insanity in the fight against blight, real or contrived, is at the expense of our children's education.
