





Experiential Learning

Makerspace:

- Thad Stelter has taken over visiting PDI for monthly crafting outreach. We had 37 students at the program for August.
- <u>Kathy Kearney</u> has taken over outreach kits for Creative Aging under the Seniors Make! Grant from the Next 50 Initiative. She works with SRDA and housing to distribute over 200 kits per month.
- Monthly Creative Aging programs with Shannon Miller from Sizzlen Stampers continue. We had 8 attendees this month at her programs.
- Maker Mania continues as a virtual program at this time. We average over 100 views per month, and our resident maker Jeremy remains popular! There were 111 views of Maker Mania this month.
- We plan to continue offering pastel painting classes at the Greenhorn Valley Library every other month, with local artist Jill Starkey of the Steel City Art Gallery instructing. The next class will be on the 24th of September.
- Thingiverse data: 0 views, 43 downloads.

Museum Services:

- Bree Pappan curated the second month of the Staff Art Exhibit. We had excellent participation in the works from our staff around the district, and everyone really enjoyed getting to know everyone's work and display their own.
- Bree has worked very hard to bring an immersive Living with Wolves experience to PCCLD. The exhibit will run through October at the Pueblo West Library, with supplemental programming throughout the district, and with our community partners. Huge thanks to the Sierra Club, CSU-Pueblo, the Sangre de Cristo Art Museum, and all our community sponsors for allowing the library to host such an amazing event!
- Bree has finished and submitted her application to Art Bridges for the museum to host an amazing
 piece of art! Untitled (Portrait of Ross in LA) is by Felix Gonzales-Torres and is an interactive art piece
 that brings awareness to the LGBTQ+ community, grief, transformation, and rebirth. We are anxiously
 awaiting news of our application's approval, so we can begin planning the exhibition and related
 supplemental programming!
- There were an estimated 481 people who viewed the Rawlings exhibit this month.

Concierae:

• Jan Reed and Chris Sturdy are doing very well with our meeting room use! They continue to approve bookings for internal and external events in the Bret Kelley B and Friends of the Library meeting rooms at the Rawlings library, and are working with security and Amy to fine tune our before and after hours

meeting room policies. There were 87 bookings for meeting room spaces in the Rawlings library in August, split between staff and community use.

Materials Handling:

- We have begun the hiring process for two new 20 hours per week MHT positions, to replace the vacancies left by Filadelfio Trujillo and Hannah Plummer. We hope to make offers very soon.
- The staff are adjusting well to their new workflows and duties.

Tech Services SUPERVISOR

- Elizabeth spoke with the Freegal rep about upcoming improvements to the service.
- Sherri Baca, Missy Mantelli, Theia Bravo, and Elizabeth met to discuss the high amount of money being spent on devices each month. Some solutions include:
 - o Updating circulation reports to accurately track device check-outs
 - o Using the updated circulation numbers in the ECF request for reimbursement
 - o Turning off devices that are lost, missing, or no longer working
- Elizabeth met with Sharon Rice to discuss weeding workflows and procedures.
- The Tech Services budget worksheet for the 2023 budget proposal was submitted to finance.
- Keith Beam and Elizabeth met to discuss the role of Tech Services in the library as part of Keith's onboarding.
- Elizabeth and other staff met with Kayci Barnett about the Niche Academy.
- Elizabeth attended the Public Services Manager meeting and shared information about coming changes to Overdrive's app services and the library's device lending policies.
- The Public Library Grant Eligibility Form from the Colorado State Library was submitted for 2022-2023.
- A teacher from the Cesar Chavez Academy contacted the library about a need for books so that kids
 arriving early to school have access to reading materials. A donation of 50 picture books and chapter
 books was provided to the school.
- Daniel Gaghan and Elizabeth met regarding Connect Ed and device lending.

- Daniel Gaghan has moved the test self-check machine to the public floor and continues to customize features. The new units are still being built and should be shipped to the library in mid-September.
- The new laptop kiosks have been set up, but the Chromebooks still need to be configured. The goal is to get them ready for checkout by October 1.
- Koha has been having some trouble with holds and indexing. Daniel has worked with ByWater on a fix, but some issues may continue for mixed item type records.
- Daniel is working with Michelle to add a new tab for the databases within the library's website in order to highlight databases featuring underrepresented demographics. This should be completed by mid-September.

COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT

• Theia Bravo continues to identify lost and missing hotspots that can be turned off. She was able to get 250 Verizon hotspots turned off, which will save the library \$11,000 monthly. Theia is now turning off T-Mobile hotspots and tablets that are no longer working.

- Theia is adding new hotspots to the catalog to replace older hotspots that are no longer working.
- Theia is communicating with public services managers about ways to assist patrons with devices that are not working.
- Theia is also communicating with public service managers regarding ILL holds, sharing ideas to help make sure ILL requests are getting checked out by patrons.

ACQUISITIONS

- Lee Vigil has been working on Opening Day Collection items for Rawlings that have needed extra processing. Some of the graphic novels needed records to be merged or new spine labels. Some of the puppets still needed to have RFID tags sewn into them.
- Pat Mascarenas has been helping to add and process items for the new Rawlings ARC and NAACP collections.
- Peggy Bilger has been meeting with the ODC Specialist from Midwest Tape regarding invoicing issues from the ODC account. Midwest Tape made a mistake with the library's account setup, and 207 order lines will need to be manually fixed.
- Peggy has sent out new materials for various library programs, including the Author Talk series and the Wolf Exhibit.
- Peggy provided training to Theia on item records for devices.
- Peggy worked out a process to start editing and relabeling circulating items with the new prefix, LHG. This reflects the department name change of Special Collections to Local History & Genealogy.

August was the first full month that the User Services team, a combination of the youth and adult teams, has worked together. During August the youth area opened to the public. The new Unrivaled interactive display was installed and completed and opened to youth.

The adult and youth groups have begun working together to create programming aimed at families and multigenerational programs.

Both the NAACP and ARC book collections are available, and housed prominently near the stairs. Both collections were sponsored by partner organizations as part of second floor study room sponsorships. There is an additional new Family collection within the family area in front of the new youth area. The collection contains books for both youth and adults on beneficial topics to assist families, some examples are potty training, sharing, and more.

Historically, August is the month that programming staff take a break after the busy summer, and prepare for the upcoming year. Planning is underway for All Pueblo Reads programs, school outreach activities, and we are continuing to work with the Community Relations team to verify Reading Pays submissions.

Earlier this year the decision was made to reduce focus on kits as a program offering and offer more in-person offerings. Kits2Go and kit program offerings have been reduced across the district, as well as within the User Services Team and are listed below combined with program offerings.



Youth updates

August brought sad news for library staff. Kirsten Dees, the Early Literacy Librarian for the district, separated from the district and moved to Arkansas. She will be sorely missed by staff and community youth alike.

Imagination Library enrolled 74 new youth in August for a total of 1,754 participants - that is 18% of Pueblo County's eligible population!

PCCLD had an exciting opportunity to be part of a Ukrainian refugee letter writing campaign through an organization called Colorado Cares during the months of July-August. The goal of our participation was to provide emotional support and hope to Ukrainian refugee children and mothers by collecting handwritten letters and drawings from library visitors. These letters were collected by Colorado Cares and Rotary volunteers and will be distributed to European relief centers by Frontier Horizon, Inc., a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. All PCCLD branches participated in this campaign that was endorsed by Governor Polis and the Ukrainian National Women's League of America and we collectively gathered 98 letters from library visitors in our community.

PCCLD's Reading Pays program ended. In August 259 supplemental activity boards were turned in for ages 0 to 8, 100 for ages 9 to 12. The total for the 2022 year is 5,494 boards. Of these, 3,924 were from 0 to 8 and 1,570 from 9 to 12 year olds.


